John Williams and family have gone to Dallas to the fair, where Mr. Williams was a judge of the Rambouillet and Delaine sheep divisions.

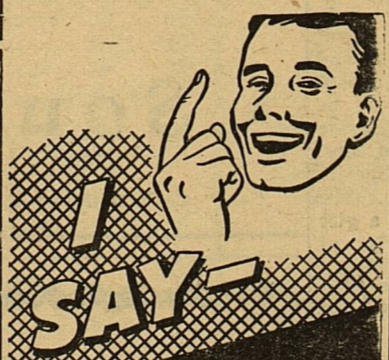

The revival meeting at the Latin American Baptist Church has been postponed because of the illness of Rev. Kelly's wife.

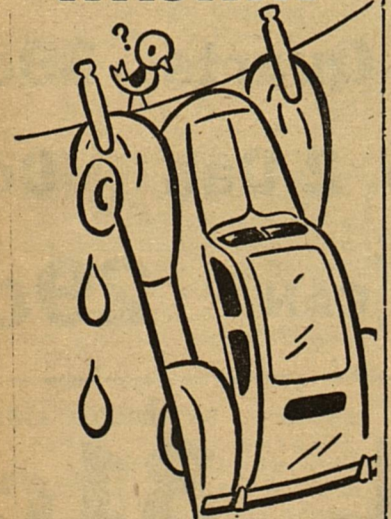

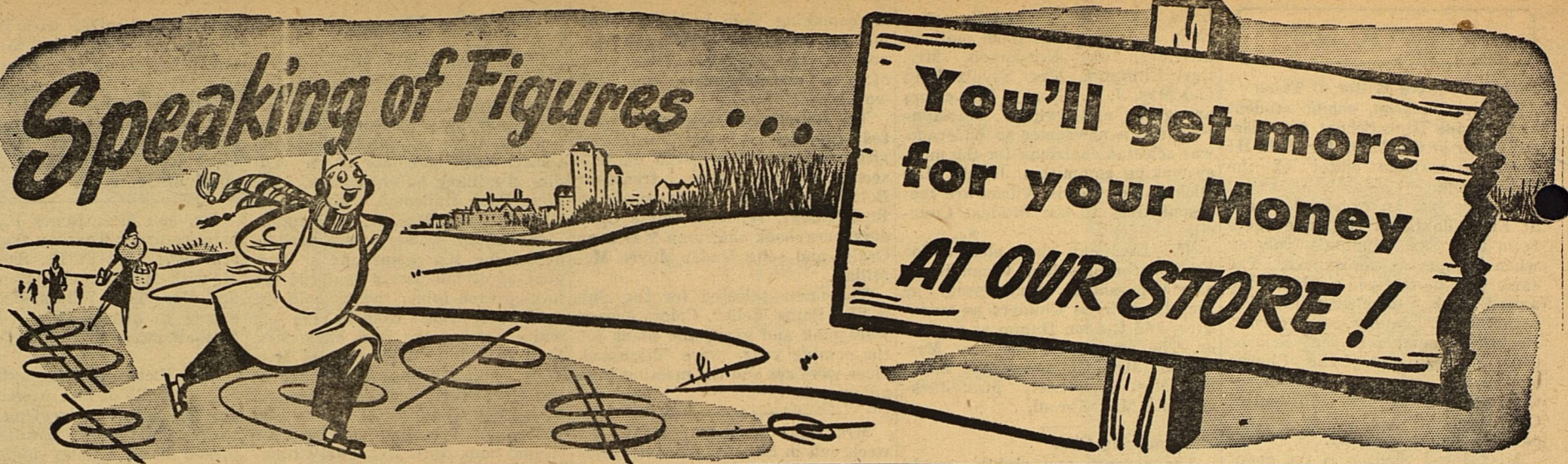

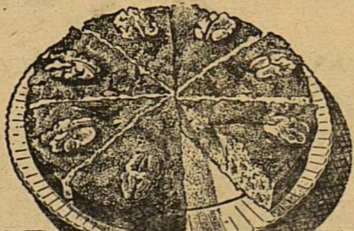

1 cup sifted all-purpose flour ½ teaspoon salt
1 well-beaten egg 1/3 cup Pet Milk
½ cup sugar 1/3 cup water
2 teaspoons baking powder 3 tablespoons melted shortening
1½ teaspoons cinnamon ¼ cup sugar

Grease a heavy 9-inch skillet. Cover bottom with 4 layers of heavy brown paper cut to fit. Grease top layer of paper. Sift together flour, ½ cup sugar, baking powder, ¼ teasp. cinnamon and salt. Mix together egg, milk, water and shortening. Add, all at once, to flour mixture; mix quickly but thoroughly. Pour into prepared skillet. Sprinkle with mixture of remaining ¼ cup sugar and ¼ teasp. cinnamon. Cover; place over very low heat 30 min., or until firm to the touch. Lift out carefully; remove paper at once. Decorate, if desired, with shelled walnut halves. Serve warm or cold. Makes a 9-inch cake.

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
