## PIONEER CITIZEN AT AGE OF 88

Funeral services for Mrs. Annie M. Enochs, well loved pioneer citizen, were held at 2:30 p. m. today (Thursday) from the First Baptist Church with the Rev. J. M. Hays officiating. She was 88 years, one month and four days old.

Mrs. Enochs died early Wednesday morning after an illness of several weeks. She had been in ill health for a number of years, and was confined to her bed most of the time. Loved by all who knew her. she had borne her illness with the same sweet, unselfish spirit which characterized her entire life. A daughter, Miss Chris, with whom she lived, had tended her faithfully and unselfishly during her long ill-

Born in Mississippi, Sept. 11 1859, she came to Texas as a small child with her family who settled at Austin. Here she grew to womanhood, teaching school in Austin prior to her marriage. She was married in 1880 to O. K. Enochs, and the couple came to this county in 1902. At this time, the country was all open range, and wild animals including antelope, deer, and wolves were plentiful. Buying land north of town, the couple reared their family amid the early hardships of this county's pioneer days, and saw the country develop into the now productive ranch and farm

land Mr. Enochs died in 1927, and Mrs Enochs and her daughter had made their home in town since that time. Survivors include two daughters, Miss Chris Enochs of Eldorado and Mrs. Robert Sewell of Salamonica Calif., one son, Jeff Enochs of Eldorado, three brothers: George Wheeler of Oklahoma City, Jack Wheeler and Tom Wheeler of Austin, and one sister, Mrs. Mary Patton of Austin. She is also survived by 8 grandchildren and 8 greatgrandchildren.

Interment was in the Eldorado Cemetery with the Ratliff Funeral Home in charge. Pallbearers were grandsons including Oran, Alvis, Patton, Holvey and Tom Enochs, Ben L. Isaacs, Jr., Evans Etheredge and Hugh Harzke.

BORER TROUBLE

Here's a horticultural tip in regard to an insect that eats Texas fruit growers out of plenty of dollars every year. The borer is an in-sect, and what it takes to kill it is really a mouth full - paradichlorobenzene or ethylene dichloride.
