MRS. W. D. PATTON PASSES AWAY; IS BURIED HERE

Funeral rites for Mrs. W. D. Patton, 83, wife of a pioneer Eldorado doctor, were held at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday from the Methodist Church with the Rev. F. B. Faust officiating, assisted by the Rev. J. L. Ratliff of Ozona.

Special music was presented by Mrs. W. N. Ramsey, who sang "Have Thine Own Way, Lord," and a choir from the various churches. Mrs. F. B. Faust was the accompanist.

Mrs. Patton, who had been a resident of San Angelo for the past six years, died at 9:30 p. m. Sunday at a San Angelo hotel where she made her home with a daughter, Miss Gladys Patton, teacher in the San Angelo junior high school. Mrs. Patton had been an arthritic invalid for approximately 19 years.

She was Miss Belle Short, daughter of Washington and Hettie Short. She came to the west when her parents and brothers sold their farms at Whitesboro and pioneered toward the western cattle country. They stopped at Bowie and later came to San Angelo in 1884. She taught school for awhile at Yandell near Water Valley and was married in 1888 to the late Dr. Patton. The couple lived at Van Alstyne until 1905 when they returned to San Angelo.

In 1908, Dr. Patton bought ranching interests near Eldorado and the family moved here where he practiced medicine until his death in 1942.

Mrs. Patton had been a member of the Methodist Church for more than 50 years, and was active in its work until she became an invalid. She bore her invalidism with patience and courage, and had made many friends throughout this section.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. C. H. Cochran of San Diego, Calif., and Miss Gladys Patton of San Angelo; two sons, Joe W. Patton of Los Angeles, and Jim D. Patton of McCamey, and 8 grandchildren. A son, Walter D. Patton, Jr., died in 1939 from injuries received in World War I. Surviving also are a sister-in-law, Mrs. W. W. Weaver; three nephews, George, Curtis and Alton Short; a niece, Florence Short Self and son Joe Marion, all of San Angelo.

Burial was in the Eldorado Cemetery with the Ratliff Funeral Home in charge.

CHRISTMAS BOXES FOR OVERSEAS TO BE SENT NOW

E. W. Brooks, Eldorado postmaster, reminds all those who have relatives and friends in the armed forces that overseas Christmas packages must be mailed between Oct. 15 and Nov. 15.

The same packaging regulations as in other years apply to all packages. A combined length and girth measurement of 100 inches is all that is permitted. All packages should be wrapped carefully and tightly, and the address of the recipient put inside, in case the outside address gets damaged in shipment.

Anyone needing further information relative to the packing and shipping of overseas Christmas boxes may see Mr. Brooks at the post office.

Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation News

Cooperators with the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District are taking advantage of the time between harvest and planting to construct level closed end terraces on their farmland to conserve soil and moisture.

Construction of 2.6 miles of level closed end terraces on Marvin McDonald's farmland in the Kaiffer group, 16 miles west of Eldorado, was completed this month. The terraces were constructed with a caterpillar tractor and road grader. Terrace end closures were made with a bull dozer.

Construction of 3.1 miles of level closed end terraces was completed on W. A. Blaylock's farmland in the Kaiffer group, 16 miles west of Eldorado, last week.

Construction of the remaining 2.1 miles of level wide base terraces was begun on W. A. Schuller's farm land eight miles west of Eldorado last week. Schuller had 2.4 miles of the 4.5 miles of level terraces needed on his farmland constructed last year. The terraces are being constructed by Bill Parent with a caterpillar tractor and road grader.

Schuller has been a cooperator with the soil conservation district since July 1946, and will have completed all terraces needed on his farmland when the 2.1 miles is completed.

Case Ranch Stock Will Be Exhibited At Knoxville Show

At the forthcoming International Polled Hereford Show and Sale in Knoxville, Tennessee, Nov. 1 through 5, the Case Ranch will be represented by three outstanding heifers. These three heifers which have favorably impressed visitors to the ranch are all daughters of the Case herd sire, Woodrow Mischief 8th, and all three will sell in the sale on Nov. 5, which is the closing event of the show. Two of these heifers were calved in November and one in December of last year.

The Case offering is being shipped to Knoxville by truck together with the offering of Mans Hoggett of Merton, who is president of the American Polled Hereford Breeders Ass'n, and the offering of Joe Weedon of Grosvenor. The Hoggett offering consists of one bull and two heifers, and the Weedon offering two bulls and two heifers. Bob Pruitt of Merton is doing the trucking, and accompanying the cattle will be Joe Weedon and Fred Case.

Reports indicate that the 1947 International Polled Hereford Show will be the strongest in the history of the breed, so this, together with the beautiful location chosen for this year's show, insures those present of an interesting and pleasant visit.
