C. W. GALBREATH LOCAL RANCHER DIES SUDDENLY

Funeral services for Clyde W. Galbreath, 59, were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday from the First Baptist Church with the Rev. J. M. Hays officiating, assisted by the Rev. C. T. Aly, pastor of the Park Heights Church, San Angelo. Music was by the church choir with Mrs. J. M. Hays as soloist and accompanists were Mrs. J. M. Christian at the organ, and Mrs. Hays at the piano for part of the service.

Mr. Galbreath, well known Schleicher County ranchman, died at 3:20 p. m. Sunday in a San Angelo hospital where he had been admitted at 12:30 for treatment of a heart condition. He was stricken suddenly down town Sunday morning, and was taken to San Angelo in a Ratliff ambulance.

Galbreath was born Feb. 28, 1888 in Blanco County, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Galbreath. At the age of 15 he moved with his family to Mason and Brady, living in that vicinity until 1912. He was married to Miss Claudia McDonald on May 16, 1912, at Menard where the couple lived until coming to Schleicher County in 1914. He had engaged in ranching since coming here, and at the time of his death was in partnership with his brother, H. L. Galbreath, the two men having several places under lease. He was also in the garage business in Eldorado for a time.

In 1915, Mr. Galbreath became a member of the Bailey Ranch Baptist Church where the couple were then living. He was well known for his charitable traits, was always ready to help in sickness or trouble, and was a friend to all with whom he came in contact.

Immediate survivors include the widow; one brother, H. L. Galbreath of Eldorado, and two sisters, Mrs. H. S. Snearley and Mrs. W. C. Wegner, both of Brady.

Interment was in the Masonic Cemetery with the Ratliff Funeral Home in charge. The Masonic Lodge was in charge of graveside rites.

County Agent News

The following general guides for saving grain will help livestock producers to reduce costs and increase profits. It is in co-operation with the Citizens Food Committee in saving grains for the hungry in Europe.

Hogs

1. Make maximum use of pasture for growing pigs and breeding animals.
2. Feed ample protein. A pound of protein concentrate, in the balanced ration, saves 5 to 6 pounds of grain. Standing a hog to be fattened in a small pen and feeding maize or corn with scraps is the most inefficient and expensive way to fatten a hog. Here is a simple balanced ration: 90 lbs. of corn, barley or grain sorghum, 5 lbs. of cottonseed meal, and 5 lbs. of alfalfa leaf meal.
3. Ample water and freedom from parasites and diseases will increase efficiency of grains.
4. Limit market weights to young animals to 200-225 pounds. Older hogs selling weight will depend on the size of their frames.
5. Make fast gains by liberal feeding. If pigs and fattening hogs are hand fed, feed every day all they will clean up. If self feeders are used the grain and protein may be in separate boxes, or one box containing the balance mixture. The use of self feeders will not require excessive grain if the hogs are fed only to light weights ranging from 200 to 225 pounds for young stock.

Poultry

1. Cull regularly to eliminate non-layers.
 2. Feed a well balanced ration.
 3. Buy or hatch only well bred chicks.
 4. Sell the roosters, unless you are producing hatching eggs.
 5. Practice sanitation to eliminate disease and parasites.

Finley and Lefty Reynolds, who were also going fishing and who took them to Del Rio, where their facial cuts received a doctor's attention and from where they were brought home.

RANCH HOUSE TO BE BUILT BY J. T. JACKSON, JR.

Ground was broken Tuesday for a new ranch house for J. T. Jackson, Jr., who at present is living in the headquarters ranch house on the J. T. Jackson place.

In charge of the labor is C. L. Martin, while Cameron's of Eldorado has the contract for material. The house will be 38 by 56, and will have porches, large living room, dining room and kitchen, 3 bedrooms and two baths. The completed layout will include also a double garage, and another out-building containing washroom and smokehouse. All the buildings will be finished with stucco.

The new house will be located just off the highway along Jackson's Lane, 1/2 mile toward town from the new Jackson oil test; it will be about two miles or less from the Eldorado business district.

IMPROVEMENTS MADE BY FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

Most of the improvements planned a year ago by the First Baptist Church have been carried out in the period which has elapsed since their campaign was launched late in August, 1946—and some things not included in the original project have received attention.

A year ago this week the congregation were at work on their street paving—the first of four items in their four-point program. The Hammond organ is in use, with several musicians in the church playing it as needed. The choir loft and pulpit have been changed and refurnished. Funds are available for the air conditioning unit which will be installed when delivery can be made. Numerous other smaller improvements have been made as needed during the year.

The congregation are beginning to talk of need for more classrooms but no official action has been taken as yet on this question. Membership has increased steadily, which accounts for the crowding in existing classrooms of the Sunday School.

Sheriff Wallace Joiner stopped two youths on the Eldorado-Sonora road, near the county line, Saturday night, upon call from the Sutton County sheriff. One of the young men paid \$200 fine and costs, and the other \$47, in the Sutton County courthouse, for hit-and-run driving.

Credit Restrictions Lifted, Says Mrs. Hext

Cautious credit buying was urged today by Mrs. Ernestine Hext, secretary-manager of Retail Merchants Association, on the eve of the removal of government credit controls.

Mrs. Hext said all government restrictions on credit in the purchase of durable goods would be lifted after Saturday, Nov. 1, and that consumers would be free again to work out payment schedules with merchants.

"The lifting of controls should not be the signal for wild spending," Mrs. Hext said. "Credit buying is a fine old American custom, but the use of this privilege to extremes always results in disaster."

"The merchants here and in other sections of the state expect a big demand for credit, beginning next week, especially with increasing stocks of merchandise fast becoming available and Christmas shopping in the not-too-distant future. However, it is to the benefit of the consumer, the merchant, the community and the state that sound judgment be used in buying on credit."

Mrs. Hext said that any rules laid down for consumers to follow in credit buying must be flexible, but she set some general principles of sound family financing which she urged the public to study:

1. Buy only on credit what you can pay for in a reasonable length of time, and pay all bills on date due.
 2. In buying on credit, remember it is to your interest to keep your family on a sound financial basis.
 3. A high credit rating is a mark of good citizenship. Keep your credit rating unblemished and you and this community will prosper.
- "We are certain the citizens of Eldorado will cooperate," Mrs. Hext said. "Every family knows the pitfalls of reckless spending on credit, and I feel sure our people here will use good judgment in their use of deferred payments."

HOSPITAL SUBJECT COMES UP AGAIN AT LIONS CLUB

At Lions Club yesterday it was decided to set Nov. 10 as Ladies Night. The meeting will be held at the high school cafeteria and the faculty will be included as guests.

Lion Reynolds presided over the meeting in the absence of Lion President Doyle. Lion West reported on efforts to reorganize the Eden Club, and Carrol Ratliff appealed to the members for better support of high school football.

Dr. Pennington appeared before the club and urged the citizens of the county to take steps to raise \$100,000 for a county hospital. He suggested that the county float a bond issue for this amount, after which they would become eligible for federal aid in the amount of \$50,000—thereby making available a total of \$150,000 with which to build and equip a hospital. The members took no action on the proposal as a club, but it is understood that many of them are interested in some plan of this sort.

It is understood that Boot Heel will be at the Ozona-Eldorado game Friday night, barking for Eldorado.

SHELL UNITS ARE OVERHAULED BY COMPANY MEN

A major overhaul job on Shell's pumping station units was completed recently in about nine hours, due to hard work on the part of local employees and out-of-town repair men.

To do the required work, the station was by-passed and both of the 300 h. p. motors were cleaned and re-worked. Among those here from out of town to assist were Ed Gauer of Bayou Div., Tex Gilpin of Austin, W. G. Reeder, and others.

Because of the volume of oil which is pumped through Shell Station daily, the repairs had to be rushed through with minimum loss of time.

SONORA TO GET NEW HOSPITAL IN NEAR FUTURE

A hospital for Sonora becomes practically assured with a gift of \$50,000 made by Roy Hudspeth. It is understood that citizens will raise the same amount, assuring another \$50,000 as a federal grant, making a total of \$150,000. A board has been appointed for administration of the hospital and for selection of building plans, site, etc.

The city of Eldorado was listed, with Sonora and some other West Texas cities, to be granted a rating for federal funds. The complete A list, which was published in September, includes the following Texas cities: Dumas, Higgins, Canadian, Panhandle, Pampa, Silverton, Morton, Post, Plainview-Dale, Center, Archer City, Henrietta, Throckmorton, Aspermont, Albany, Emory, Carthage, Groveton, Hemphill, Sierra Blanca, Van Horn, Ft. Davis, Sanderson, Sterling City, Bronte, Crane, Big Lake, Ozona, ELDORADO, Menard, Mason, Sonora, Junction, Goldthwaite, San Saba, Centerville, Llano, Hearne-Franklin, Giddings, Caldwell, Madisonville, Huntsville, Col Springs, Woodville, Newton, Hempstead, Silsbee-Kountze, Anahuac, Edna, Rocksprings, Uvalde, Bandera, Boerne, Brackettville, Poteet-Pleasanton, Carrizo Springs, Tilden, Goliad, Port Lavaca, Rockport, Zapata, Hebronville, and Rio Grande City.

Half of the 62 Texas areas listed as completely without hospital facilities are in the West Texas area, and come automatically at the head of the list. The federal government is launching its program of aid over a five-year period. It is explained that the state needs 54,136 hospital beds to meet U. S. public health standards.

West Side Church Calls New Pastor

Bob Copeland, a college graduate, and minister of the Church of Christ at Turkey, will arrive in Eldorado Friday to take over his new duties as minister of the West Side Church of Christ. He will be accompanied by his wife and three-weeks-old baby.

The members of the church, who called minister Copeland at a recent service at which the pastor preached, have arranged for renting of an apartment at the John Rodgers house until a house can be rented, bought, or built for the minister and his family.

He has been serving the Church of Christ at Turkey, where he has closed out his work this week. He is a college graduate with a degree in engineering.

ANOTHER KOY HOUSE TO BE BUILT SOON

Jess Koy, who is building a large new ranchhouse on the new Menard road, has decided to build a four-room modern cottage near the residence for his ranch help. He had originally intended to use the modern garage apartment for an employee, but recently decided to reserve it for guests, and to build a separate cottage for employees. The main ranch house is going up rapidly and when completed will be one of the show places of the county.

Ground will be broken soon for the cottage, and work on the large and small houses may proceed at the same time if present tentative plans are carried out.

Soil Conservation District News

Two varieties of clover, Hubam and Madrid, will be planted this fall and next spring on several different farms in the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District.

The district supervisors received 300 pounds of Madrid yellow sweet clover last week for the following cooperators: J. W. Davis, Ovid Wade, Will L. Isaacs, L. E. Lloyd, J. H. Wagley, Jack Wade and John Bledsoe.

The following district cooperators have purchased Hubam clover seed for spring planting: W. A. Schuller, Dee Love and Otto Sauer. Several different methods of seeding will be followed, including overseeding of small grain, drilling alone and planting in rows.

Hubam clover that has been planted this fall totals 25.5 acres on two farms. Will L. Isaacs planted 22 acres of Hubam clover with wheat on his farmland, 22 miles northeast of Eldorado. Mrs. F. B. Gunn planted approximately 3.5 acres in rows on her farmland 4 miles southwest of Eldorado.

The soil building properties of the different clovers have long been recognized. A good crop of clover will add to the soil approximately 200 pounds of nitrogen per acre by extracting it from the air and storing it in the roots of the plant. It is also an excellent medium for adding humus to the soil since it makes a good growth and decays rapidly. This humus improves the mulchy condition of the soil and increases the rate and amount of water intake.

KNOWLEDGE OF MEATS HELPS TO BALANCE BUDGET

Balancing the food budget is one of the hardest problems the homemaker faces today. However, there are ways and means to help the budget over the humps. Here are a few suggestions for making the most of your money in buying and preparing meat.

First of all, a few minutes each day spent in learning the large variety of cuts of meat pays dividends in the end. There are many illustrated charts and books on cuts of meat, and the meat retailer welcomes questions about meats displayed in his case. Among these cuts are many that are equal in flavor and tenderness to the more demanded cuts, yet are wiser buys.

Next, in learning these cuts, pay particular attention to the less demanded cuts. Not only learn to know them, but school yourself in the art of cooking them. Among these cuts are pot-roasts of beef and veal, beef short ribs, beef flank steak, and pork and veal shoulder, breast of lamb and veal, lamb neck slices, lamb and veal shanks, brisket of beef and beef heel of round. When properly cooked, all cuts are flavorful and tender.

A type of cooking, known as moist heat cookery is used for preparing these cuts. One of the most important ways is braising. The meat is first browned in hot lard or drippings in a heavy frying pan or Dutch oven. A small amount of liquid is added, and the meat is covered and cooked slowly until tender.

The other method is known as "cooking in liquid". It is used for stews or certain large cuts of meat such as heart, tongue and brisket, in which the meat is actually covered with liquid during the cooking time. Stews, of course, are usually browned before cooking. The meat is covered with liquid, in a closed kettle, and cooked slowly until tender.

Last and most important is a rule which covers all meat cookery. Cook the meat slowly and more servings will result. When braising or cooking in liquid the meat should always simmer, never boil. The meat is tender and more easily carved. Meat cooked at a high temperature shrinks a great deal more than that cooked at low temperature, with a resulting loss in number of servings.

WINTER DISEASES ARE DANGEROUS TO SCHOOL CHILD

"Every mother is familiar with so-called summer complaints which affect small children; but certain winter diseases can be just as harmful and are just as likely to make their appearance, unless proper precautions are used during the approaching season," Dr. Cox said. "These winter diseases are especially dangerous to babies and very young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread from the secretions of the nose and mouth. Children not in vigorous health are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and the first line of defense against them is to build up the child's general health, as a power of resistance against disease," Dr. Cox stated. "The second step is to keep them under medical supervision and the third is to make sure that they avoid contact with those who have coughs, colds or fevers."

Reckless Driving Law Ruled Valid

The "reckless driving" provision of Texas' new uniform traffic code is valid, the attorney general held recently in his first opinion relating to the new safety laws since their enactment by the 50th Legislature.

The reckless driving section of the code makes it a punishable offense to drive "in willful or wanton disregard of the rights or safety of others or without due caution or circumspection, and at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger or be likely to endanger a person or property."

Constitutionality of the section was questioned by Kimble County Attorney Russell Graham, who requested the opinion.

Before passage of the code, the attorney general told the Legislature that the proposed section on reckless driving needed to be more specific to insure its constitutionality. The legislature changed the section to its present form before the code was passed.

As the provision now stands, the attorney general's decision said, "We are unwilling to hold, in the light of the preceding decisions by our Court of Criminal Appeals and our Supreme Court, that the section is unconstitutional."

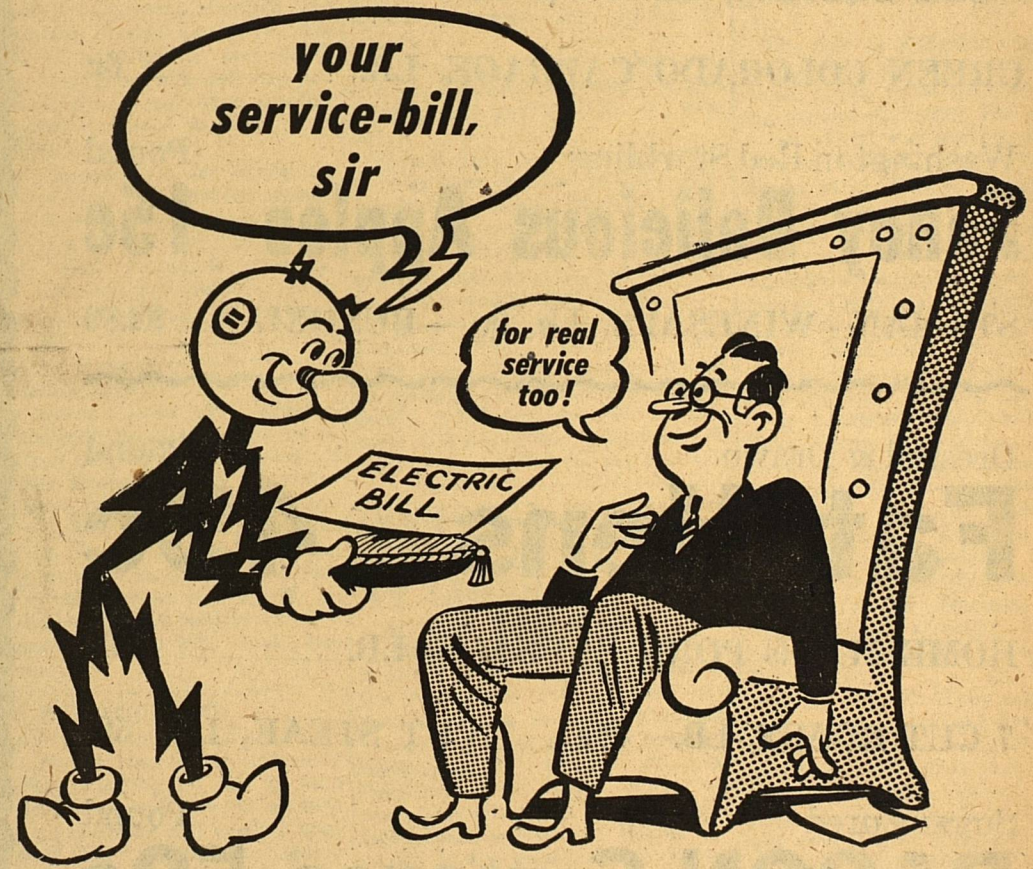
