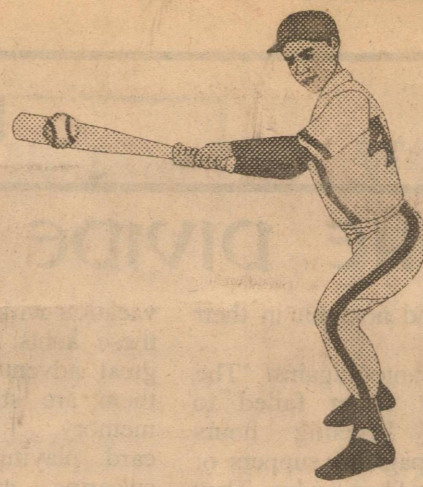

Farmers - Stay In Compliance!

Farmers who expect to continue to receive government financial assistance must have completely applied their conservation plan by December 31, 1994. This means for most farms in Schleicher County, a high residue crop such as milo or small grain must be planted at least once on each acre of land between January 1, 1990 and December 31, 1994.

Important facts the farmer should know to stay in compliance with provisions to the Farm Bill are:

a) STAY ON SCHEDULE
After the plan is finished, the farmer is responsible for staying on schedule and completing it by 1995. The plan can be changed to meet new farming needs. Changes can be made with the approval of your local conservation district if they meet the standards established by the Food Security Act.

b) THE PLAN STAYS WITH THE LAND - Plans are developed for the land. If you rent or purchase farmland, you must follow the Conservation Plan already developed for that land, or you can change the existing plan with the approval of your local conservation district.

c) CONSERVATION PRACTICES - Practices such as terraces, diversions, waterways, crop rotations, and crop residue management are included in these plans and maintenance is required on all of these practices. Failure to carryout or maintain any one of these practices could result in loss of program benefits.

Revival Set For Agape Assembly Of God Church

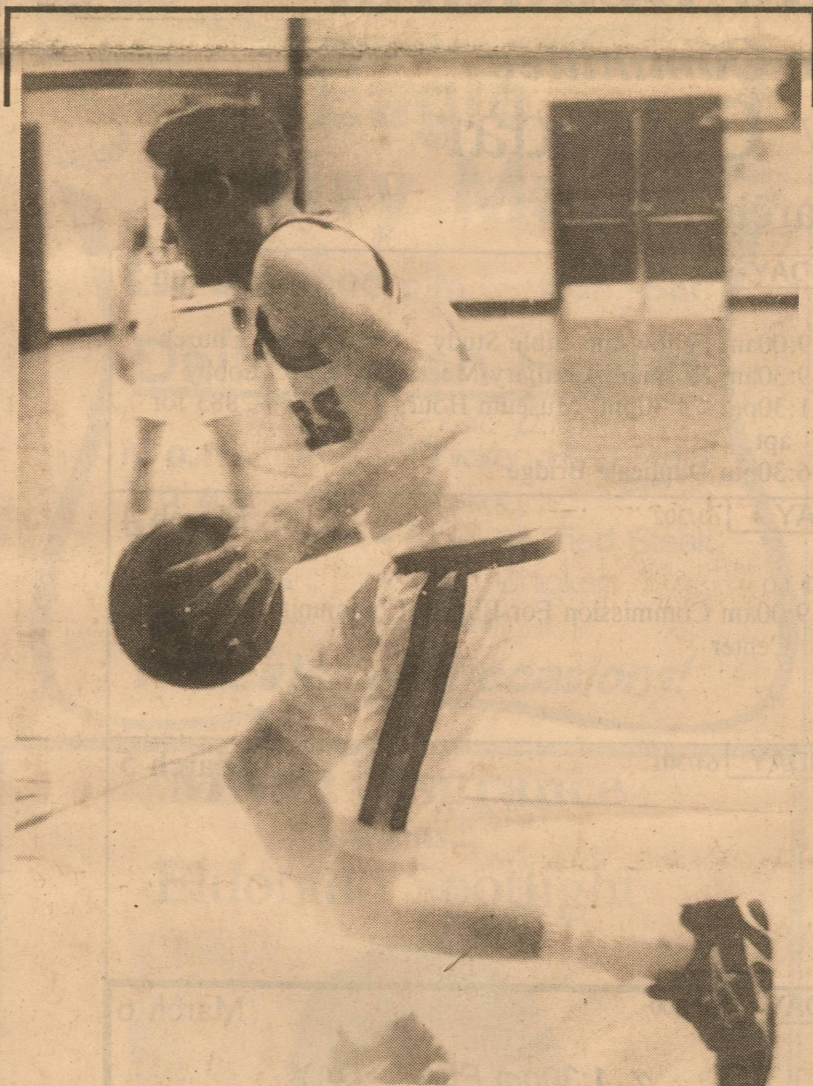

"Corn and sorghum producers with 1993 disaster losses are reminded they must request disaster assistance by March 4th to be eligible for possible forgiveness of advance deficiency overpayment," Grant Buntrock, Administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, stated.

"Even if the disaster loss was not large enough to qualify for disaster payment, it may mean eligibility for some advance deficiency

overpayment forgiveness," Buntrock said.

"Final deficiency payments will not be calculated until early March, but it is almost certain, given current prices, that the final will be less than the advance. To be eligible for forgiveness of any overpayment, the producer must request disaster aid at the local ASCS office," Buntrock said.

ASCS administers all programs without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status.

TOP OF THE DIVIDE

If you did not get to see the Way Off Broadway Players' production of "Daughters" you missed another fine performance. All of the cast were superb. The play was about the lives of four generations of Italian American women from Brooklyn. As an Italian American, I was impressed with their grasp of each character.

I don't know how much other audience members enjoyed the verbal and emotional exchanges but the play brought back memories of my childhood with my Mom and her sisters. My Mom is the youngest daughter of a family of eight sisters and two brothers. Most of these aunts lived in the town of Hammonton, New Jersey, in the heart of what was once some of the best truck farming country in America. They were not farmers but seamstresses. They were women who had worked in "sweat shops" since they were pre-teens, with little formal schooling but lots of drive and a keen sense of the worth of not only a dollar but also a dime. Just play penny anti pinochle with them and you'll soon find out how much a penny was worth. These ladies yelled and screamed at each other over the slightest of slights. They criticized each others' children,

but could find no fault in their own.

They ranted against "The Church" but never failed to work long grueling hours putting on spaghetti suppers or running other fund raisers. They seldom went to church, but were very devout. They were so busy on Sunday mornings getting dinner ready that they often had not set aside time to go to mass. On the other hand, they never missed a funeral or the meal afterwards.

When I was little I got to spend parts of my summer

vacation with one or several of these aunts. These were such great adventures that most of them are still burned in my memory. I learned cut-throat card playing, a little polite swearing, and most of the Italian bad words that exist. There was never a crisis too small that buckets of tears and tons of pasta could not be called up to solve. A big plate of rigatoni, even today, can lighten my mood while it weights my midsection.

This article must end since, if I told you about these

ladies, it would take more than two acts, which is the amount of time it took the Players to bring them back to life.

Stanley was also a person of honor and integrity. He said what he meant and his word was his bond. He made a difference to the people he touched and the world is a better place because of Stanley Frank.

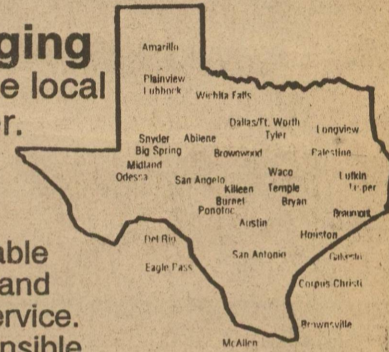

MICROWAVES *are for* COOKING

COMBINING A MICROWAVE AND CONVENTIONAL OVEN IS AS EASY AS PIE

A microwave and conventional oven can actually work great together, each compensating for what the other lacks. For instance, pie filling can be prepared and cooked in a microwave oven, but for the crust to finish browning, use the conventional oven. Here's a good recipe combining the two methods:

APPLE WALNUT PIE

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 6 cups cored and thinly sliced Granny Smith apples, pared if desired
- Pastry for 1 (9-inch) double crust
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Combine sugar, walnuts, flour and cinnamon. Add apple slices; toss gently to coat. Place in pastry-lined pie plate; dot with butter. Place top crust over fruit. Seal and flute edge; cut vents. Microcook at HIGH (100%) 10 to 12 minutes or until filling bubbles. Bake at 425 F. 10 to 15 minutes or until pastry is golden. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

First say to yourself what you would be, and then do what you have to do.

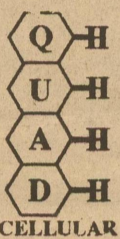
S.C.I.S.D. Board Met
