State To Help Save Nation Millions Of Tons In Lost Foods

Texas may soon provide a hungry world with 2,600,000 tons more food than during the state's bumper crop years.

New refrigerating systems, technical developments and faster transportation will make that goal possible, according to engineers, without increased sowing, labor and harvest yields.

These developments are well beyond the blueprint stage. New techniques will affect meats, fish, fruits, vegetables, dairy products, poultry and grains. They will conserve food and food nutrition and flavor.

The 2,600,000 extra tons of food from Texas are based on U. S. Dept. of Agriculture estimates that at least 25 per cent of all food produced in the country, or 50,000,000 tons, is wasted in transit or in homes.

Instead of adding to grower and processor financial burdens, the increase in available foods should reduce costs for everyone and also prices to the consumer. We have reached that period where, from frozen foods to home equipment, we can build stocks in times of plenty for years of scarcity.

FIRST BAPTISTS LAUNCH \$15,000 BUILDING DRIVE

A Sunday School building to contain 19 class and assembly rooms is in the planning stage at the First Baptist Church, the building program being launched at a meeting last night, according to Rev. J. M. Hays, pastor.

Overcrowding in all seven departments of the Sunday School, necessitating more space, was the report that the investigating committee, appointed a month ago, gave to the regular business session last night. Although no definite floor plans have been drawn or more definite plans made, investigations of tentative plans revealed that a building of 2800 square feet, in addition to the main Baptist building, would take care of the membership comfortably, the cost being an estimated \$15,000.

The following committees were appointed: finance committee, Bob McWhorter, W. O. Alexander and E. W. Mund; chairman of the building committee, J. C. Ratliff. Other committee members are to be named later.

No definite commitments will be made until at least 75% of the money needed has been raised, emphasized Bob McWhorter, chairman of the finance committee, when asked when building would begin. "Although we need the extra room badly right now, we do not want to go into debt," he said. Rev. Hays is asking all church members to assume their share of the responsibility, and cooperate in every way possible in this large undertaking.

4-H BOYS SHOW FANCY SWINE IN TWO SHOWS

Schleicher County 4-H boys will show swine Saturday, Nov. 8 at the fair grounds in San Angelo.

E. M. Regenbrecht, swine husbandman of the Extension Service at College Station will be the judge.

The premium money for the county show held in connection with the district show will be \$30 for showing gilts. The premium for the district show will be \$200 divided the following way for showing of gilts: 1st \$50, 2nd \$40, 3rd \$30, 4th \$25; 5th \$20, 6th \$15, 7th \$10 and 8th \$10. The premium for showing of the males will be the same as gilts.

All prizes are to be in the form of materials that will further swine production for the boy. The following are examples: hog wire, fence posts, lumber for hog houses, cement, sand and gravel, seed for hog pasture, pig brooders, etc.

A barbecue dinner will be served the boys and their parents and the county agents by Sears-Roebuck & Co.

NEW WILDCAT TO BE DRILLED ON MCBURNETT'S

A location has been staked for a wildcat on the McBurnett ranch, on the Ft. McKavett road, about a mile southeast of the old C1 Page, drilled several years ago by Shell and now a small producer. The McBurnett ranch joins Page ranch, on which there are a number of producers.

The rig will be moved from 4C Koy to this new test.

Location is C SE SE 27-L-GH & SA, on a 1600 acre block. The spudder is being moved in for this George D. Morgan et al wildcat, and cellar and pits are being dug.

Cooper Gas Co. 6A Jess Koy, 660 from S. 1980 from W line of Sec. 38-L-GH&SA, is being rigged up in preparation for drilling in the near future.

Jackson No. 1 wildcat was drilled yesterday at 4315 and Koy 4C at 5505.

Care Necessary In Choosing Food Says Doctor

Commenting on the food conservation program now being stressed throughout the nation, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, emphasized the importance of including the proper food requisites in the daily diet, as being important to the maintenance of health.

"Food conservation is an absolute necessity and all Texans are eager to assist in this program; but eliminating needless basic foods will only result in undernourishment and illness, which can be avoided by observing the Texas Food Standard in daily meals," Dr. Cox said. "This food standard will enable Texans to utilize available foods, eliminate waste, cooperate in conserving food and spend their food dollar wisely."

The Texas Food Standard, recommended by Dr. Cox, provides all necessary food elements, and for each individual includes daily servings of: 1 pint to 1 quart milk; 1 egg or substitute; 1 serving meat, poultry or fish; 1 serving potatoes; 1 serving green or yellow vegetables; 1 serving citrus fruit or tomatoes; 1 serving other fruit; 1 serving whole grain products; other enriched cereals or breads; small amount butter or margarine with vitamins added; some sweets or desserts in moderate quantities.

"Good nutrition is based upon the observance of good food habits, practiced every day," Dr. Cox declared. "This is important at any time, but especially now, when it will not only maintain good health but assist in the conservation of food supplies."

Since the train will miss Texas entirely, Lions Clubs throughout the state are assisting with the drive, and are asking for donations of food. These will be shipped out from each town to a designated station to be picked up by the Friendship Train.

Eldorado Lions ask the cooperation of the citizens here, and urge that donations of any kind of unperishable food be placed in boxes at the grocery stores. Date for completion of the drive is Nov. 17, and the local committee will pick up all donations for shipment by that date.

CAPT. BUTLER GUEST SPEAKER FOR FIREMEN

Captain Ray Butler was principal speaker when the firemen entertained their wives and other guests with a banquet and get-together Tuesday night at the Eldo Hotel.

Carroll Ratliff, toastmaster and master of ceremonies, stressed the work of the fire boys in the realm of accident prevention, and introduced the officers of the local organization: Palmer West, chief; Skeet Mace, ass't chief; Marvin McAngus, third chief; Bill Bridgeman, president of the Firemen's Ass'n; Lum Davis, vice president; Joe Wagley, secretary; A. G. Clark, sheriff.

Guests included, in addition to Mr. Butler, the county officers, city officers, superintendent and grade principal of the school, and Chief Biggs of the San Angelo fire department.

The mayor of Eldorado, Jess Thompson, offered the invocation. After the dinner, Chief West introduced the toast master, who in turn introduced the Silver Star Spiritual Singers of Crockett, a group of five negro men, who furnished the music.

In his address, Capt. Butler explained the various provisions of the uniform traffic code, adopted by 38 states. He pointed out some of the provisions of the code: requirement that an accident must be reported and aid rendered; space left between cars to enable another car to pass and cut in; car to the right at an intersection gets right-of-way unless car to the left reaches intersection first; no cars allowed behind fire truck or within block of fire; no glass thrown on highway; stop necessary behind parked school bus, but may proceed at 10 m. p. h.; certain vehicles must stop at railroad crossings; driver of car backing from parking lane solely responsible for finding place in traffic; safety glass required on all new cars and on all old cars where replacement must be made; required lights include tail light, light illuminating license plate, and two head lights; use of dimmers a requirement; stop lights required on new cars; and many other provisions. The captain answered questions informally also after the meeting.

Guests gave the fire boys a big hand for their efficient work in Eldorado and for their hospitality during the evening.
