LOCAL SCHOOL OPEN HOUSE WELL ATTENDED

In observance of National Education Week, Parents Night was held at the school last Thursday night with several hundred parents accompanying their children to school for a view of various exhibits, a short program, and a social hour with refreshments.

This was the second time parents have had a chance to visit the schools in a body, since the initiation of Parents Night last spring. Introduced and planned by Supt. C. A. Reynolds, Parents Night has as its object the acquainting of parents with the school so that they might understand the system and type of program which the school puts on.

The Thanksgiving theme prevailed in the exhibits and displays shown in the various rooms of the Grade School, with early Pilgrim villages, log huts, Indian tepees, and early American tools predominating. Notebooks, arithmetic, history, spelling papers, maps of various kinds, woodwork, Spanish menus, art drawings of poems, circus books, clay animals, toms, and Pueblo villages were all included in the display showing much time spent both by the pupils and the teachers.

In the high school, parents viewed an exhibit of woolen dresses and baby garments in the home-making department, and in the manual training shop, newest department for 7th, 8th and 9th grade boys, a display of what-not shelves, magazine racks and toys were shown.

Following the exhibits, the group met in the school auditorium for a program which included a short welcome address by Supt. Reynolds; vocal numbers by the fifth grade under the direction of Miss May Burton; a play, "The Circus and the Jungle" by the seventh grade under the direction of Mrs. Carl Stevens and Wyndall Hall; and two numbers by the High School Girls' chorus with Miss Burton in charge, and a song, "I Wish I Didn't Love You So" by the girls' sextet. Emily Ann Harper was accompanist for the musical numbers.

Don McCormick spoke briefly on the part which American Legion played in helping to organize National Education Week, expressed his appreciation to the teachers for the splendid work they are doing, spoke of the pathetic ignorance of World War I soldiers, and how with the cooperation of other organizations, America had now built the greatest school system in the nation and had made great strides in its advancement.

Mrs. Carroll Ratliff, president of the PTA, spoke on the parents' part in education, and the realization of the need for improved education on the part of parents, teachers and children. She quoted the objects of the PTA, and expressed the fact that next to the home, the school has more influence with the child than any other agency. "Now in its 50th year with a membership of two and a half million, these members are ready to guarantee the fact that the school and the PTA will ever be the same fundamentally," Mrs. Ratliff said in conclusion.

Mrs. E. C. Hill spoke on the teachers' part in education, expressing the fact that education for all is a necessity and that technical incompetence may blight forever the life of a citizen. "To teach, encourage and inspire is the job of the educators, on whose shoulders lie all basic skills. Teachers are now better prepared, and more competent. A combination of trained skill on the part of the teacher, cooperation of parents, and a willingness on the part of the student to become friends of the teachers, all work together to make a more successful and influential school system," she stated in conclusion. Refreshments of punch, coffee and cookies were served in both the grade school and high school during the open house. Teachers were hostesses.

THANKSGIVING PUMPKIN PIE

Mrs. W. T. Huber's Recipe
1 envelope Knox gelatin; 1-4 c. cold water; 3 eggs separated; 1 c. sugar; 1 1-4 c. canned or cooked pumpkin; 1/2 c. milk; 1/2 t. cinnamon; 1/2 t. nutmeg; 1-4 t. ginger; 1-4 t. salt.

Soak gelatin in the water. Beat egg yolks, add sugar and beat. Mix all ingredients except 1/2 cup sugar. Cook in double boiler until thick. Add soaked gelatin to pumpkin mixture and cool.

Beat egg whites stiff then add remaining 1/2 cup sugar, fold into pumpkin mixture and pour into baked pie shell. Put in refrigerator until pie sets. Serve with whipped cream. For 10-inch crust.

County Agent Column

It's farm and ranch lease signing time for landlords and tenants and chances are they'll find A&M College's "General Farm Lease Form", no. B-144, helpful in getting together on their agreement.

The form contains 13 major headings and provides for some 50 questions which might arise. Points on conservation practices, rental rates and arrangements, livestock share agreements, hunting and fishing rights, improvements and repairs are covered.

On the basis of 18 months trial to date, the lease form is a protection to both parties and will save time and money. It is not the principal concern of the committee, who prepared the lease, to produce something useful in court, but rather something to keep people out of court.

The lease comes in two copies, one for the landlord and one for the tenant, and can be secured at the office of the County Agent.
