## LEGION RIFLES ARE RECEIVED FOR DRILL SQUAD

Rifles for the American Legion firing squad have arrived, according to Arthur Tree, adjutant, and the first practice was held at the school house gymnasium Monday night.

The post, in addition to having a ceremonial squad, which will fire at funerals of former military personnel, will also have a drill team second to none. Rifles were issued at the first Legion meeting of 1948.

## TWO DRY HOLES, TWO NEW TESTS, IN THIS COUNTY

Two dry holes in one week—this is the spot oil news in Schleicher County as operators learn of two places where Schleicher oil is NOT.

The Jackson wildcat, a short distance northwest of Eldorado, has been plugged up and abandoned when salt water was encountered in the Ellenburger which had been topped at about 7165 feet. Location of this Skelly test is in the Sally Renshaw survey 78½, on the south side of Sec. 43-LG&SF.

Salt water also told the story this week in the George D. Morgan trustee No. 10C McBurnett wildcat, ¼ miles SE of the Page field (C SE SE 27-L-GH&SA.)

A new wildcat has been spudded in on Henry Mittel's place, at Hullah.

The test is being made by Standard Oil Co. of Texas, as a farmout from Taylor Refining Co. and Pan American Production Co. The location is nw corner of Sec. 75, block TT, TC Ry. Co., on a 242 acre tract. The rig is located near the highway and the railroad.

The Western Drilling Co. is moving the rig from the McBurnett test to a new test—Page D5, in the producing field. Location is C SE NE 39-L-GH&SA, ¼ mi. south of 3D, a producer. Cooper No. 4-D is drilling at about 4325 feet today.

## Methodist Parsonage Now Free of Debt

The Methodist parsonage, built at a cost of \$14,319, and completed two years ago, is in the clear at last. The last dollar of the debt has been paid.

The parsonage is known throughout the conference as one of the finest in the state. Built of brick to match the church, the parsonage has large living room, dining room, kitchen, bath and two bedrooms on the ground floor, and three bedrooms and bath upstairs.

Members frankly admit that the cost exceeded their expectations, but are relieved over the fact that the church is completely out of the red, major church building repairs having been made three years ago with fire insurance funds. The \$14,319 spent on the parsonage does not include materials from the dismantled old parsonage or the new furniture which has been bought for several rooms.

The debt was down to \$1,000 or less several months ago, and the final donations to put the building in the clear was made last week.

## TEN TEAMS TO COMPETE HERE FRIDAY AND SATURDAY FOR RANGELAND BB CHAMPIONSHIP; CROWD EXPECTED

Ten teams will be here for the fourth annual Rangeland basketball tournament, to be held at the Eldorado gymnasium Friday and Saturday, Jan. 9-10, according to Supt. C. A. Reynolds.

Two games will be played Friday night: Ozona and Sonora compete at 7 p. m., and Eldorado and Alpine at 8:00. On Saturday, Lakeview and Christoval play at 9:00, Menard Del Rio at 10:00, and games continue through the rest of the morning. In the afternoon play-offs will begin at 1:00.

Lakeview of San Angelo is the defending champion. An all-tournament team will be selected at the close of the tourney, and each member will be awarded a silver basketball, suitably engraved.

There will be a volley ball game at 7 p. m. Saturday between the Eldorado girls and a team not yet named.

The public will be admitted to all games. Tickets for the entire tournament are \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students. For each individual session, of which there will be one Friday night and three Saturday, tickets are 50c and 35c.

## Lions Review of Year's Work

The Lions Club has closed an active and successful year in improving the community, according to L. A. Goss, secretary. Roughly \$3500 was raised in 1947 by the organization, all of which was used in local projects and organizations, except that used for state and national dues, which amounts to about \$4400 a year.

Goss also reported that the average percentage of attendance for the year was 51.9%.

The more important projects backed by the Lions in 1947 were:

January: Assisted with 4H Club calf and lamb show; Five club members helped in play to raise funds for high school annual; Worked to secure another physician for this town and community; Gave \$5.00 to March of Dimes; A committee of Lions put on local March of Dimes drive and raised \$250.30. Started movement to classify blood type of as many citizens of county as possible, make record of same.

February: Paid \$1.00 per member for "Texas Night" at International convention; Met San Angelo Fat Stock Show Aerocade at airport and served hot coffee and cakes to visitors; Committee appointed to entertain high school football team.

March: Sponsored the sale of 4H club calf to earn more than \$700 for 4H Club; Lion Tamers, who lost in Melvin Jones birthday membership contest, entertained Twisters with oyster supper. Entertained high school football team and initiated new members; More Lions having blood typed.

April: Furnished and hid Easter eggs for white, negro and Mexican children; Sponsored money gift of appreciation to County Agent Godwin; voted to sponsor town baseball team and gave \$75 to get it started. Moved to give award to highest ranking student in high and grade schools; Conducted bitter weed program and barbecue to educate ranchers on its control.

May: Awarded fourteen perfect attendance buttons; Had Ladies

Night at school for benefit of future homemakers club; Moved to petition city to spray alleys, etc. with DDT; Sent seven delegates to District Convention; Started move to give more assistance to Boy Scouts.

June: Sold tickets at gate for town baseball games; Committee contacted County Commissioners to improve road to Station A; Committee went to San Angelo to contact telephone company officials to speed up installation of dial system.

July: Installed new officers; Sponsored musical program and raised \$175 to use toward recreation program for young people; Petitioned State Highway Department to place curve stripes at dangerous curve in road near city; Cooperated in county-wide drive to secure permission to construct Memorial building.

August: Solicited funds for sending school children to Shrine Circus at San Angelo.

September: Annual Lamb Sale cleared \$1200; Raised more than \$800 to improve water system at cemetery; Equipped manual training room at public school.

October: Raised \$600 for Scout work.

November: Entertained the public school faculty; Arranged for high school to send football team on an educational tour; Had highway signs changed to better location; Raised \$232 to pay hospital expenses for boy hurt in football game.

December: Furnished and distributed gifts to children of needy families; Supported drive to establish co-op hospital, and paid publicity expenses for said drive; Contributed to Circle K fund to beautify campus of San Angelo Junior College; Presented two past-president's pins, membership key, and plaque for progress made in soil conservation.

The Eldorado Club is a member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, acting as such an organization in this county.

## NEARLY 200 ARE SIGNED UP FOR HOSPITAL

The board of directors, field captains and other workers of the Eldorado co-op hospital held a meeting Monday night to report progress made in the membership drive, and to make plans for further canvassing of the county. It was found, upon totalling memberships signed by each worker, that 191 people so far wish to buy life memberships in the hospital.

The workers report that they feel very encouraged at this indication of public support, and they intend to continue the drive until they get the 300 memberships needed to get the hospital under way.

It was pointed out at the meeting that another sparsely settled county, Hansford county in the Panhandle, has recently opened the doors of a co-op hospital, similar to the one the group here is planning. Membership in the Hansford hospital costs \$100 in contrast to the \$50 asked by the organization here. The Hansford hospital is housed in surplus army barracks bought from the Dalhart army air field. In addition to life membership dues, Hansford members pay annually for the doctor's care and other services according to a certain schedule, ranging from \$20 annually for one person to as much as \$50, depending upon the number in the family. Members elect the board of directors and help to keep the constitution and by-laws up-to-date. The hospital has 16 beds, and will add more as the need arises.

Eldorado workers report that there are quite a number of people here who are interested in joining the hospital organization, but do not want to do so until the hospital is built. Of course this is "putting the cart before the horse", since the biggest outlay of cash will be required when the hospital is being built; unless sufficient members are assured before work begins, the hospital idea will have to be abandoned entirely. The group does not want to go into debt.

Anyone who is interested in joining the hospital organization is urged to see one of the directors or field captains.

**Ex-Sheriff Sweatt Throws In His Hat For Sheriff's Race**

E. H. Sweatt, former sheriff of Schleicher County from 1941 through 1946 made the following announcement the middle of this week:

"Friends have come to me during the past months, urging me to seek election to the office of Tax Assessor, Collector and Sheriff in the coming July primary. After giving it much thought and consideration, I have decided to seek this office and hereby solicit the vote and support of the citizens of Schleicher County.

I am making this race strictly on my past record as Tax Assessor, Tax Collector and Sheriff of your county for six years and feeling that I am qualified in every respect, I assure you that my campaign will be conducted on the same high plane as before, seeking the office strictly on merit of past performance.

One of the honors that came to me in connection with the sheriff's office is described in the following item that appeared in this newspaper last June, as follows:

"E. H. Sweatt, former Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector of this County has been notified by the Tax Assessor and Collectors' Association of Texas, that he has been made an honorary life member of the Association for his extraordinary service to the organization. Life memberships were awarded at the close of the annual convention in Galveston May 5, 6, and 7th. Notice of the honor came from the secretary, George F. McCullar who extended his personal congratulations to Sweatt and stressed the fact that the membership gives him a standing invitation to all future meetings of the association.

In the Audit of the Tax Assessor-Collector's accounts at the end of Sweatt's term, January 13, 1946, by the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the following taxes balanced perfectly: 1% motor vehicle sales tax; the county ad valorem, and the road and bridge special tax. Under the school taxes,

the school owed Sweatt the sum of \$12.30, and the state owed him thirty-seven cents.

In a recent letter to the ex-sheriff, George H. Sheppard, Comptroller, expressed his appreciation for Sweatt's cooperation with the department.

I am proud of this honor and assure the citizens of this county that if elected, I will give my undivided attention to the duties of the office.

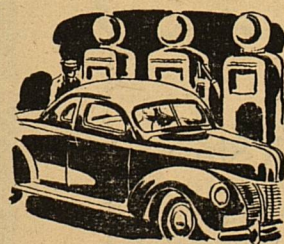
Her program will include selections from Mozart, Beethoven, Chopin, Brahms, Ravel, and Weber-Tausig.

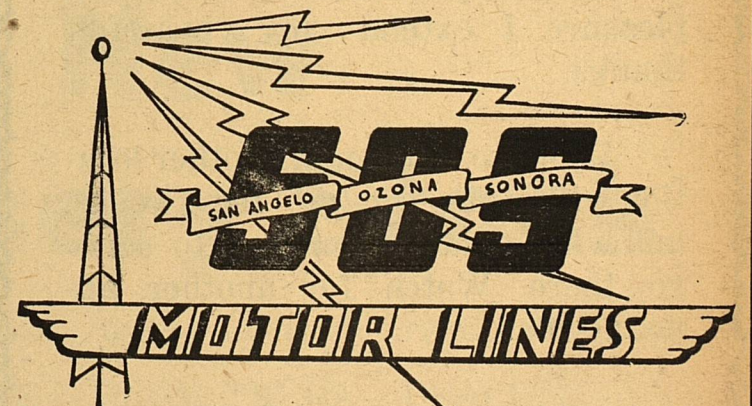

### FOUR COUPLES — RANCH NEIGHBORS OF 40 YEARS AGO — STAGE REUNION AT ROACH HOME SATURDAY EVENING

Williams, who arrived in a three-seated white hack drawn by a span of horses, coming from their ranches over the rough cow trails.

The George DeLongs were already settled on their ranch and soon after this, Miss Pearl Cloud, sister of Mrs. Roach, arrived to become the bride of Johnny, brother of Ambrose.

And so began a lifetime friendship for the four couples, who played together, worked together, worshipped together, reared their families to manhood and womanhood, and when sadness came, shared each other's sorrows as only neighbors can do.

As the children came, and reached school age, the families built a small one-room school building, which soon became the center of the community. Here the children of the four couples began their early schooling, later receiving their high school education in town. When the D. E. DeLong's oldest daughter, Ruby, now Mrs. Ralph Fowler, finished her education, she came back to the little one room school, and taught the younger children of the families.

On Christmas, New Year's and other important holidays, the families had dinner at the different houses, rotating as the occasion demanded. They shared a community Christmas tree at the home where Christmas dinner was held each year, and here they put aside daily cares to play and sing together, and to enjoy to the utmost this most sacred of all holidays.

At the Roach home Saturday night, the group enjoyed a general good time, talking over the old days and recalling good times and bad. A sandwich supper with old-fashioned mince meat pie and coffee was served. The pies were baked by Mrs. D. E. DeLong by the same recipe used 40 years ago when mince pie was the favorite dessert. Climaxing the meal was a bag of old fashioned mixed candy, also brought by Mrs. DeLong, reminding the group of the days when a bag of candy at Christmas was a real treat. The meal was served with the same silver which the A. J. Roaches had when they came to this county, another important reminder of "40 years ago."

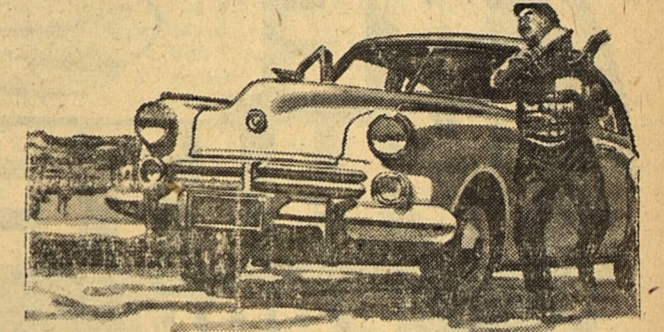

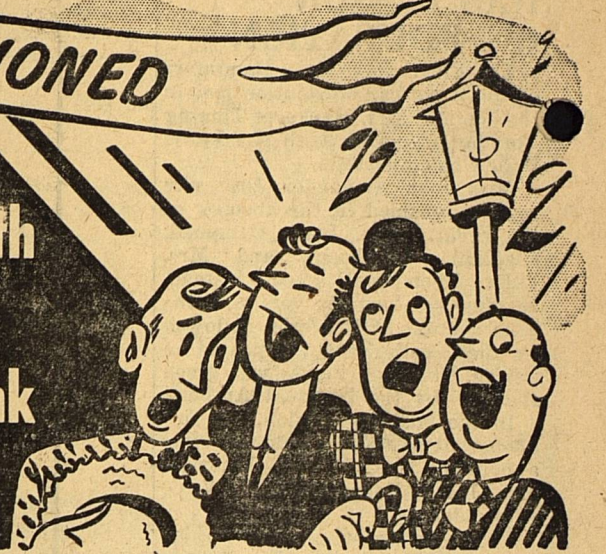
