## Washington News Letter

### Wool Tariff Reduction

Effective January 1st, the tariff protection on raw wool will be reduced by 25 percent. This is the first reduction in years, and will undoubtedly be felt eventually by the wool growers of this country. The reduction is the result of an agreement reached by the conferees at the Geneva International Trade Conference.

The present import duty of 34c per pound on clean-content raw wool will be cut to 25½c per pound, or 8½c a pound.

This gives the Australians, our chief competitors an improved advantage over our own growers. Because of low production costs, the Australians have for years been able to produce, transport and pay the American duty and still sell to our mills at or near our actual cost of production. The situation has changed a bit, however, in that the Australian mills are using considerably more of their own wool, especially the finer types, than before the war, and with rehabilitation progressing on the Continent a greater demand for wool may eventually be expected from that source.

For the present, observers here think the effect of the drastic tariff reduction will not be very noticeable. That is because of the present scarcity of fine wools and the government purchase program during the liquidation process of our own stockpile.

The fact is that most of the benefit of the cut will go to the Australian and New Zealand growers who were promised bigger incomes by the governments of those two countries before their last elections. The growers over there will now reap bigger subsidies and their production will likely be stepped up. While that is being done, it remains to be seen if, under the more difficult competitive situation because of the reduction, our own flocks will continue to be reduced. The Department of Agriculture points out that during the past years the sheep population in America has dropped by 35 percent.

Contrary to some contentions, the lower duty is not expected to result in any noticeable reduction in the price paid by mills for imported wool. In other words, consumers of wool products in this country will benefit very little, if any, from the deal. Moreover, based upon 1946 imports, our treasury will suffer to the tune of \$35 million each year in revenue which except for the reduction would be collected from imported wools. Last year the total collected amounted to \$142 million.

At the Geneva Conference there was nothing done about the embargo the Australians have for years imposed upon the export of certain desirable types of breeding sheep to this country.

Nor was there anything done at Geneva about the International cartel which virtually controls the price and disposal terms of most of the wool produced in the world outside the United States.

Congressional committees are laboring over measures to curb the living cost spiral and the inflation trend. Restriction of credit buying, eliminating margins on the grain exchanges, control over the allocation of certain scarce materials, and the renewal of export controls, are among proposals that are being considered.

There is very little sentiment for a return of OPA. The latter, which served a purpose during wartime, is believed by many to be unworkable now for a solution of our present problems. As one man put it: "The black market would take over and run the country." It is generally agreed that there can be no effective price controls without wage controls. And since wage controls were scrapped after the war when the CIO pulled the steel and General Motors strikes, along with John L. Lewis' coal strikes, more and more strikes could be expected if wage controls should be imposed. Therefore, it is reasoned that the return of OPA at this time would create far more problems than it would solve.

### DAR CHRISTMAS MEETING HELD AT HILL HOME

A Christmas program was observed when the Eldorado Chapter, DAR, met Tuesday afternoon in the home of Mrs. J. E. Hill with Miss John Alexander as program leader.

Mrs. Hill, regent, opened the meeting and Mrs. Joab Campbell, chaplain, read a scripture on the birth of Christ, followed by a prayer by Mrs. L. M. Hoover. The flag salute was given, and the national anthem sung in unison.

Mrs. Hoover, chairman of approved schools, reported that the used clothing drive conducted in the chapter was a huge success and that enough clothing was contributed to enable her to send a box to each of the three approved schools.

Mrs. Hill, Mrs. Joab Campbell, and Miss Alexander reported on the regional meeting held recently at Midland at which 60 members were present, and Mrs. Marron, state regent, was the principal speaker. Mrs. Marron especially stressed the point that DAR members of today must not live on the glory of our ancestors, but that we of this generation merit the respect and honor of future generations. She also stated that 3000 new members had joined the society since last May, and in the conservation program, reported that the DAR had bought the Redwood Forest in California to prevent its being cut down. The Texas room in Continental Hall has been dedicated as a music room and the furnishings are authentic pieces of the period preceding 1835.

Mrs. Marian White Joseph was elected to membership in the Eldorado chapter.

Miss John Alexander led the Christmas program choosing as her subject, "Faith, Hope and Human Conservation". She spoke on the work being done at Ellis Island where at the request of the government the DAR began its occupational therapy at the U. S. Marine hospital on Jan. 1, 1934. The DAR supports three full time therapists and there are a number of DAR volunteers with special skills. In this hospital, the patients are American and allied merchant seamen and U. S. coast guards who are physically or mentally ill.

The mental cases are kept busy so as to enable them to concentrate, so that there is no room for unpleasant reminiscences or delusions. Those who are physically able are taught to rewrap looms, to weave, carpentry, and those suffering from cardiac trouble and tuberculosis are given light work they can do in bed, which enables them to relax and rest. Arthritis patients are given exercise for affected joints.

The room of music therapy is used daily—here patients may go to express themselves individually or in small groups. Those who are disabled are taught to help themselves as far as possible and are given such work as cord knotting, painting, crocheting, knitting and mechanical drawing. Volunteer teachers are giving lessons in English, Spanish and watch repairing. These patients are from many far-away parts of the world. At Christmas time, the hospital is gaily decorated and carols are sung.

Mrs. Campbell gave a reading, "Christmas" by Frank Carlton Nelson, with illustrations of the journey to Bethlehem given in silhouette, while "Silent Night" was played softly.

Mrs. Hill's home was attractively decorated in the Christmas theme and she was assisted by her daughter, Mrs. Morris Whitten, in serving her guests from a lace covered table decorated with Christmas candles. Those present were Mmes. Joe B. Edens, J. E. Tisdale, Hoover, Campbell, V. G. Tisdale, Miss John Alexander, Mrs. Whitten and the hostess.

### OFFICIALS SLATE NEW GAS PLANT FOR BARNHART

A natural gas and carbon black plant for a neighboring field is slated for next year, according to announcement made by officials recently.

Flaring of more than twelve million cubic feet of gas daily in the Barnhart field in Reagan County is scheduled to end early next July when Witco Hydrocarbon Corporation places in operation a natural gasoline plant and a carbon black plant.

Contract has been awarded to Fish Engineering Corporation of Houston for the construction, which will begin in January or February. The joint project will cost more than \$3,500,000.

Around 2,000 barrels of natural gasoline, propane and butane will be produced daily by the gasoline plant and burning of the residue gas will yield approximately 750,000 pounds of carbon black monthly.

Forty-eight wells in the Barnhart field produce the gas with 5,300 barrels of 44-gravity oil daily from the Ellenburger. Amerada Petroleum Corporation, which discovered the field in August, 1941, on University of Texas land, has the largest number of wells.

### Gasoline Dangerous For Home Cleaning

Gasoline will not only shorten that new long skirt but also your life if you use it for dry cleaning, Texas housewives were warned today by Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner.

"Hundreds of women die tragically and needlessly every year because they insist on cleaning clothes or floors with gasoline in their homes," he continued. "Ten cents worth of gasoline is sufficient to blow up an ordinary house."

A gasoline explosion can result from two causes, Hall explained. One is a static spark—from the friction of rubbing together the cloth being cleaned, scuffing your feet on a rug, or merely pouring the liquid from one can to another—set off in a place where gasoline vapor is present. The vapor off a one-gallon open can of gasoline can fill an ordinary kitchen in a few minutes.

Hall told of a tragic example in the case of a Dallas woman who was cleaning with gasoline in her kitchen when her daughter came in and switched on the electric light. The fixture must have been defective, for it sparked and exploded the vapor so violently that the woman was blown through the side of the house into a vacant lot 30 feet away.

The other cause of gasoline explosions and fires is the use of it near a flame, such as the pilot on a cook stove.

"A young matron living in a Houston apartment decided she would do an economical job of dry-cleaning," Hall related, "so she poured gasoline into a basin placed in her kitchen sink and closed the door of the room in order to prevent the fumes from escaping into an adjoining room, where her baby was asleep. She forgot there was a pilot light on the gas stove, however, or did not realize its menace, and within a few minutes fire flashed from it to the gasoline and to her clothing, burning her to death."

Gasoline has been known to have been touched off by open flames over 200 feet away, Hall said in warning Texas housewives not to do any home dry-cleaning in the yard as did a woman in West Texas who was burned to death as a result.

The extreme flammability of gasoline vapors is also the reason why a person shouldn't smoke or strike a match even while sitting in his automobile at a filling station when the gas tank is being filled. The engine should be cut off while the car is being re-fueled because of danger of sparks.

Gasoline should never be kept in the house and never in any can that is not tightly covered. It should not be kept in a glass bottle, because if the bottle should break, the escaping liquid and fumes would escape, causing a serious hazard. The safest place for gasoline in quantity is underground.

Hall recommends carbon tetrachloride for removing spots from clothes and a dry cleaning establishment for clothes that need extensive cleaning.

### Christmas Tree Lights Care May Avoid Yuletide Tragedy

A Yuletide tragedy may be avoided by observing a few simple precautions when you are setting up your Christmas tree.

Today's electric-lighted Christmas tree is not nearly the fire hazard that its predecessor—the candle-lighted tree was—but there is still potentially grave danger unless certain precautions are observed, according to an article in the December issue of Good Housekeeping magazine.

"Inspect your tree-lighting sets before trimming the tree," the article urges. "If the insulation is worn or damaged, so that bare wires are exposed or may become exposed when the set is in service, or if the sockets are cracked or broken, discard the set. It is misplaced economy to gamble on repairs that may not be adequate.

"Check the condition of your extension cords, too, and see that they are long enough to reach easily from the convenience outlets to the lighting sets. Do not connect too many lighting sets to one outlet. Be guided by the instructions that may come with the

sets. See that all the bulbs light. "In buying tree-lighting sets, it is good insurance to choose only those that meet recognized safety requirements. To be sure of this, always look for a label on the set stating that it is listed by Underwriters' Laboratories.

"As a last precaution take down your tree soon after Christmas is past—the sooner the safer. Don't dispose of it where small boys will be tempted to make a bonfire. Give it to the rubbish man or cut it up and burn it safely in your back-yard incinerator."

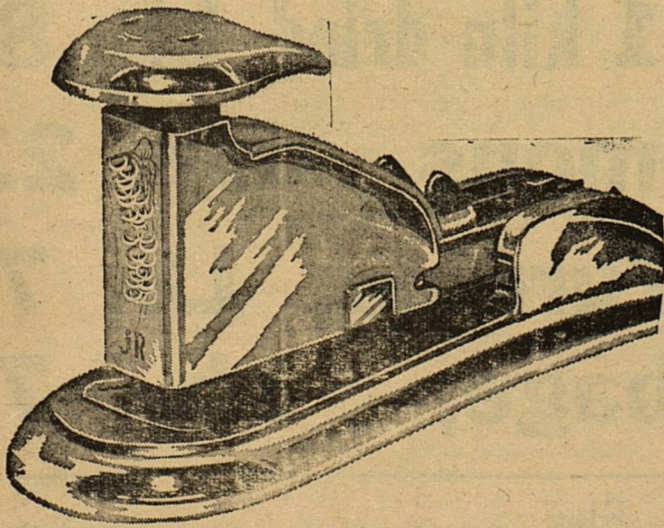

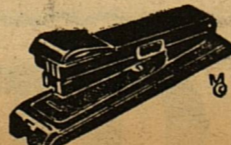

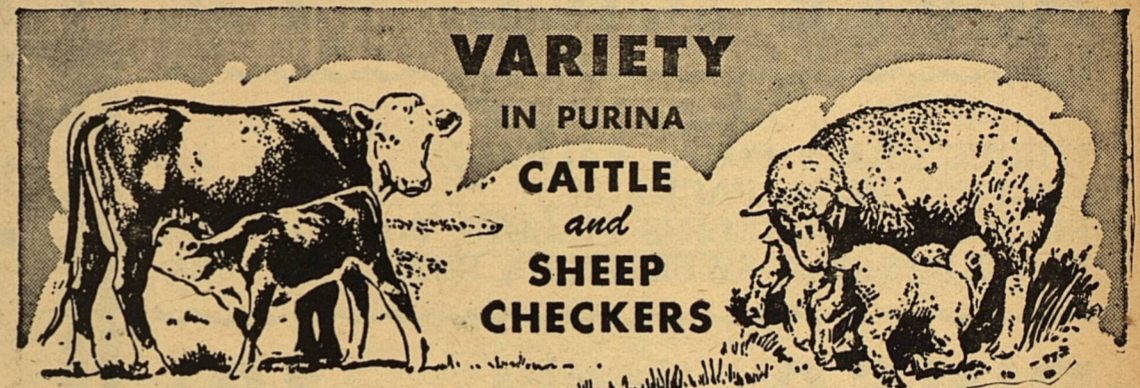
MARY HOOVER TO BE AIR HOSTESS FOR BRANIFF

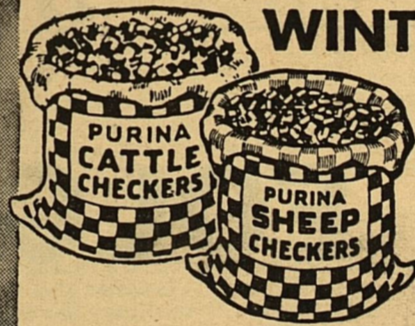

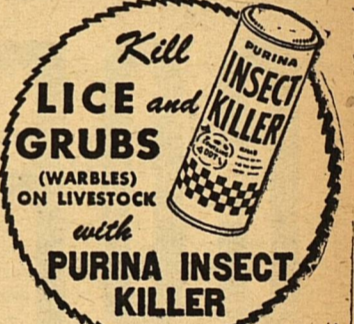

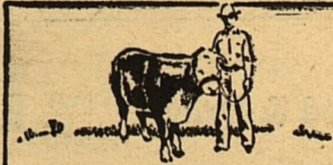
