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VACANCIES STILL EXIST IN FACULTY

It is teacher hunting time again for Supt. C. A. Reynolds.

A few vacancies, some of which may be hard to fill, still exist in the teaching corps, and late resignations must always be expected.

There are still shortages in some lines, reports Supt. Reynolds. For some unexplained reason, the supply of trained elementary teachers is inadequate for the demand—possibly due to the "war baby crop" who are entering primary grades, as well as to the over-all teacher shortage. There are also the shortages in math and science and other lines.

To date Mr. Reynolds has received a number of inquiries by mail and by personal application, but no action has been taken by the board to date. The superintendent points out that again he is confronted with the housing problem and is now looking for two apartments before decision can be made.

As soon as he has disposed of some office work he will leave on a "teacher hunt", as he terms it, with the intention of visiting several of the teacher colleges and other schools of Texas.

Reynolds Takes Over As New President Of Local Lions' Club

MASS X-RAY MOBILE UNIT COMING SOON

Mass X-rays for the detection of tuberculosis among adults over 15 years of age, by the state health department's mobile unit, are scheduled here for July 29, 30 and 31, and the committee in charge of arrangements are anxious that every adult person in the county visit the unit or an X-ray while it is here.

The mass X-rays are designed to search out unknown cases of TB so that early treatment may be administered. The X-rays are given free, requiring only two minutes to administer, and require no undressing. The health unit's modern equipment can X-ray from 60 to 125 persons per hour.

"There's something fishy about this" was the average Schleicherite's reaction to at least four inches of rain, which fell in this county from Sunday night to Tuesday afternoon.

Two outstanding characteristics of the rain were that everyone got plenty of it, and that it fell at intervals to allow for nearly 100 percent soil absorption.

The surprise precipitation provided one of the most glorious Fourth's this country has had in years. Some vacationists took their trips regardless of weather, and others remained at home to watch the rain fall—but everyone celebrated.

Eldorado business men closed their businesses Monday, and returned to work Tuesday — to watch it rain again!

The city of Eldorado received a total of over 4 inches and many parts of the county received more. There was a minimum of washing of soil, no loss of stock, and no property damage or car accidents. Mud chains appeared in the streets but were discarded by Wednesday.

Motorists between Eldorado and Sonora report a heavy rain south of Eldorado Tuesday morning and very heavy rain on the Divide in the afternoon.

Weeds and grass are already putting out new growth, hiding many of the rocks which have been too much in evidence this summer on the brown hillsides and pasture land of Schleicher County.
