VACANCIES STILL EXIST IN FACULTY

It is teacher hunting time again for Supt. C. A. Reynolds.

A few vacancies, some of which may be hard to fill, still exist in the teaching corps, and late resignations must always be expected.

There are still shortages in some lines, reports Supt. Reynolds. For some unexplained reason, the supply of trained elementary teachers is inadequate for the demand-possibly due to the "war baby crop" who are entering primary grades, as well as to the over-all teacher shortage. There are also the shortages in math and science and other lines.

To date Mr. Reynolds has received a number of inquiries by mail and by personal application, but no action has been taken by the board to date. The superintendent points out that again he is confronted with the housing problem and is now looking for two apartments before decision can be made.

As soon as he has disposed of some office work he will leave on a 'teacher hunt", as he terms it with the intention of visiting several of the teacher colleges and other schools of Texas.
