Four Teachers Elected At Last Board Meeting

At the meeting of the school board last Wednesday afternoon at the court house, four new teachers were elected and plans for the coming school year were discussed.

Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Griggs were employed to fill the positions of high school principal and elementary school teacher respectively. Both have master's degrees from Sul Ross. He has been coach and principal at Garden City last year, and she also taught there. They have also taught at Lakeview in San Angelo. Both come to Eldorado with a number of years of experience, and are highly recommended. They have one daughter, who will be a high school sophomore. It is understood that the family is looking for a house here for the coming school year.

Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Dupont of San Antonio were employed by the board, he to teach math and science and she to have charge of the commercial department. Both are graduates of Southwest State Teachers College at San Marcos. Mr. Dupont has two years experience, having taught college math in the Army and having taught in the La Grange high school last year. His wife, who has no experience, has just received her degree from the San Marcos college, in business administration. The couple will need a furnished apartment for the year.

There are three vacancies still existing, states Supt. C. A. Reynolds, including an elementary teacher, public school music teacher, and home economics teacher. He has received applications for all of these vacancies and expects to have them filled in another week or so.

Teacherage To Be Moved

The board also voted to move the Bailey Ranch teacherage to town, where it will be used for some of the teachers in the Eldorado school system.

It was voted to ask the state department of education for permission to sell rural school buildings which are not needed due to consolidation.

The board discussed the purchase of a new school bus for the recently-annexed Loftin district, and action will be taken on this question at a later meeting.

The building program for the school system was discussed, and it was decided to go ahead on perfecting of the plans.

Those present for the meeting were Supt. Reynolds and the following school board members: Jerry Pennington, chairman; Leslie Baker, secretary; W. S. MacGregor, Horace Linthicum, Henry Speck, L. G. Edmiston, and Archie Mittel.

Plans Made For Mass X-Rays As TB Test

Much interest has been aroused through publicity and other means in the mass x-rays for the detection of tuberculosis, scheduled for Friday and Saturday, July 30 and 31 by the state health department's mobile unit, under sponsorship of the local Lions Club and PTA.

The unit will be located at the City Hall and the hours from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. have been set for the x-rays. All adults from the ages of 15 up are urged to appear for their x-rays which require only two minutes, are confidential and are considered a very vital factor in helping to detect and stamp out this disease. The Latin-American and negro population of the community as well as the whites will be included in the x-rays.

Committees from the two organizations have been busy for the past two weeks publicizing and completing final arrangements for the event.

MAIN RAILROAD IS POSSIBILITY FOR ELDORADO

A project which could mean a main railroad line for Eldorado, on a through route from Mexico City to Chicago is receiving the attention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

It is understood that officials of the Santa Fe lines and the National Railways of Mexico will meet with others in San Angelo soon, on the matter of extending the Santa Fe from Sonora to Del Rio and the Mexican line from San Carlo to Via Acuna, closing existing gaps in the line. If favorably passed upon, this would mean providing a through line from Mexico City to Chicago via Eldorado, which would mean much improved service for this city, as it would place this city on a main line, and would connect the line with the Southern Pacific at Del Rio, on its route from Houston to Los Angeles.

The entire project is in the planning stage and nothing definite will be known for some time.

Eldorado Farmers Build Terraces

With the fields getting dry enough to plow, several farmers of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District are preparing to complete terraces under construction and maintain old terraces.

Once terraces are constructed to a broad base width and sufficient height, farmers should keep in mind the value of maintaining them to provide extra moisture in future dry periods. This could be accomplished by farmers improving their present terrace system to hold added rainfall, and thus increasing the penetration of moisture into the subsoil—the storage tank for plant existence in drouth periods. Farmers can well utilize the time between small grain harvest and the planting of crops following small grain, for this operation. Terrace maintenance now means moisture saved when rains come.

Terrace maintenance can be accomplished in a number of different ways, some of which are: 1. Cylinder or one-way plows; 2. Road maintainers or graders; 3. Ditching machines or "v" type drags; 4. Light terraces of the Texas or Corsicana type; 5. Fresnos, to complete end closures.

Of this group the plow method seems best adapted to this area as nearly all farmers use the cylinder plow in breaking their land. The usual procedure is to start by plowing to the terrace. Care should be used in the first plowing to keep the crown of the terrace from "topping out." Continue this back furrowing to a point at least 29 feet from the center of the terrace fill on either side. In most areas this operation can be repeated until the desired height and width has been reached.

\$27 NEEDED TO FILL CANCER DRIVE QUOTA

Schleicher County is short only \$27 of reaching its \$400 quota for the cancer drive, according to Fred Watson, county chairman for the cancer campaign.

"We need to get the rest of the money by the end of the week," says Mr. Watson in urging prompt payment of contributions. All those who have not already donated to this drive are requested to leave their contributions with Ollie Alexander at the First National Bank, as soon as possible.

With Schleicher county so nearly "over the top" on its quota, it is hoped that the rest of the money may be collected, and the total sent to headquarters soon.

Curnutt Resigns, To Teach Therapy In Veterans' Hospital

Mr. and Mrs. Wilburn Curnutt, who have been coach and physical education teacher respectively in the Eldorado schools during the past year, are moving to Waco next week where Mr. Curnutt has accepted a position in the rehabilitation program of the Veterans' Administration.

Mr. Curnutt, who has a master's degree in physical education from NTSC, Denton, will work as a corrective therapist at the veteran's hospital in Waco. He will be working with veterans who lost the use of muscles as a result of war injuries, and it will be his job to help them regain use of these muscles by exercising, by swimming, by work in the gym and by use of water therapies developed by the navy such as the whirlpool method.

This method of treating war injuries has been called "a new phase of medicine", because it works where traditional medical care has failed. Many of Mr. Curnutt's patients will be World War I veterans. He will also have gym classes and swimming for veterans who are shell shocked or disturbed mentally.

All teachers in the corrective therapy department have one hour of lectures and class work each day, in which they study and receive instruction on their work.

"I have enjoyed my years of coaching very much," states Mr. Curnutt, who is leaving the public school teaching field only because he wanted a job which would enable him to settle down permanently. Mrs. Curnutt will probably teach in one of the Waco schools; she has completed work on her master's degree in physical education from NTSC except for her thesis.

Teaching Staff Data

- 6% of the teachers are beginning teachers; 2.8% of the teachers have more than 30 years experience; 3.15% of the teachers have less than 5 years experience. 5.2% of the teachers are teaching with emergency credentials. 5.5% of the primary teachers have no special training for assignment. 6.17% of the elementary teachers received preparation for high school teaching only. 7.1-3 of the teachers have not done any professional study within the past four years. 8.10% more new teachers or replacements are needed next year to fill new positions and vacancies. 9.10% of the teachers are receiving annual salaries below \$2,000 a year. 10.30% of the elementary teachers are teaching more than 30 pupils per room. 11.15% of the high school teachers teach more than 120 pupils a day.

County Judge Asks Re-Election In Order "to Finish The Jobs"

As it will be impossible for me to see and talk to each of the voters of this county, I am taking this means of expressing to you my appreciation for your confidence and support in the past and to let you know that I am still working hard to accomplish the things most needed and beneficial to the people of this county.

When I first came into the office of County Judge of this county I realized the need of a highway running east and west across this County. Meetings were arranged with officials of the Highway Department on this and other projects which led to the completion of the present road from Eldorado to Menard. Upon completion of this road, and upon the advice of the Highway Commission, I contacted our district engineer and asked his help in having a survey authorized west, as formal application had been made for the extension of this road across this county and he suggested that I write the state engineer regarding a promise made to the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County during a meeting in the State Engineer's office attended by the entire Commissioners Court of this county. From the State Highway Engineer's letter dated April 19, 1948, and addressed to me, I quote you the following paragraphs: "In reply to your questions, I could advise that there are two possible ways in which you may accomplish your objective. The first and quickest would be for the county to take advantage of the 75-25 plan of the Texas Highway Department in furnishing funds from local sources to the extent of 75 per cent of the cost. This probably would inaugurate the project much quicker, on the other hand, if this was not desirable in your particular locality, you may wish to wait until probably sometime in the fall of 1948 or the spring of 1949; at which time the Highway Commission will request that you furnish to them any recommendation that you may have for road extensions in your area. When this is done, then the counties involved may suggest this as their first priority road, in which case there is a very good possibility that at least a portion of it might be approved by the Commission for construction from State and Federal funds, such as we have done the road from Menard to Eldorado."

The Commissioners Court feel that as this road is a link of the State Highway system it should be built with State and Federal funds and without the necessity of bonding the county for their part on construction of same. However if a petition is offered for a bond issue on this matter, I am sure it would not be turned down by this Court.

Since the re-organization of the

school districts of this county, a transportation system has been set up which will eventually transport children from the far corners of the county and the Commissioners Court, realizing the necessity for better roads over which to transport these children, has purchased more and better road building equipment with which to build these roads and at the present time we are buying new machinery to maintain these roads. Regardless of the outcome of this election, every effort will be made to complete these bus routes before school starts. The county-wide set-up in educational facilities for this county will undoubtedly work for better educational opportunities for those children who are living in remote areas of this county and whose parents are not financially able to furnish transportation or move to the vicinity of a good school.

On July 1, 1946, a large majority of the taxpayers of this county, wishing to honor the young men and women of this county who served in the armed forces during World War II, voted a bond issue for the purpose of the erection of a building which is designed to serve not only as a monument to the veterans of World War I and II, but is designed to provide rooms for a library, civic clubs, American Legion, community gatherings and recreational facilities for the school children of this county. These funds were voted for this specific purpose and could not be used otherwise, and when contractors' bids failed to come within the limit of the amount of money voted for this purpose these bids had to be rejected and the Commissioners Court started construction on the building. The supervision of construction on this building by the Commissioners Court has imposed extra duties on the County Clerk, County Treasurer, and myself; this proposition being heartily agreed to by all the officials involved in order that construction could be started when it did. This project can and will be completed according to the original plans and specifications. My only regret is that it was not completed in time to tie in with the present recreational program being conducted at this time whereby school children are being transported to other places for these purposes. If re-elected to this office, I hereby pledge myself to do everything possible to complete the above project as specified.

There is also some progress being made in securing a set-up in this county for a Veterans Vocational School, which would eliminate the necessity of our veterans attending these schools in other counties. Letters have been written to State and Federal authorities with reference to this matter

and every effort will be made by the County Board of Education and myself in securing a farm school here.

Schleicher County is in excellent financial condition at this time as compared to conditions which existed when I came into office and this fact is reflected by our quarterly report contained in this issue of the Eldorado Success. This has been accomplished without raising taxes, in fact we are operating on the same schedule used in 1934. These taxes may be raised slightly in order to give taxpayers the road service they deserve. I would especially like to call your attention to our Permanent School Fund. This is the fund from which the school children receive their county apportionment. When I came into office there was only \$3000 in bonds on hand. Up to this date we have increased this fund to \$65,455.46 in U. S. Government and Municipal bonds and there is a cash balance of around \$2500 on hand in our depository banks. The county still has outstanding, Vendor's Lien notes representing this fund which are drawing 5% interest on around two-thirds of the amount of the original land sale.

Schleicher County is a large and growing business concern, and its business as well as our own individual businesses will require conservative management during the days of inflation. The people of Schleicher County are primarily stock farmers, our interests are identical, and I wish to assure you that should I be re-elected as your county judge, you will all receive the same courteous consideration I have extended to everyone during my tenure of this office. We will all be working together and looking forward to better things for Schleicher County.
