Funeral services for A. A. Mc-Gill, 93, retired ranchman, were held at Robert Massie Funeral Chapel at 2 p. m. Wednesday, with Dr. B. O. Wood, Presbyterian pastor, officiating. Burial was in Fairmount Cemetery.

Mr. McGill, who had been ill for some time, died Sunday at 6:20 a. m. at the family residence on Rust Street in San Angelo.

Born May 18, 1854 in Morgantown, W. Va., Mr. McGill had been a resident of San Angelo since 1900. Previously he had engaged in the sheep business in Frio, Concho and Runnels County, and in ad-

dition did freighting.

McGill school in San Angelo was
named in his honor there, because he, with the assistance of a neighbor, built the first school in the McGill district. Mr. McGill financed the 14x20 foot classroom, and the neighbor superintended the construction. During the recent var, the aged man revealed that both his paternal and maternal grandfathers served in General Washington's army during the Revolution and his sons and grandsons served in both World Wars.

The program has always been run on a non-profit basis in order that the best possible meals could be served at the lowest cost. Any revenue derived from the sale of lunches above the actual operating costs has been put into better equipment for the program. Other schools have found that generally it is unsatisfactory for the school lunchroom to be under private management, so the local lunchroom has been under the management of the school since its inception.

In 1943 the school trustees signed an agreement with the federal government whereby the local school would cooperate with government in providing hot lunches for all children desiring them regardless of the child's ability to pay. The government set up minimum standards for the schools to follow in preparing meals, and provided as much as 9c subsidy per lunch for meals served to school children. In addition, many surplus agriculture commodities were made available, free of charge, except for freight charges. The school super-intendent was designated by the trustees the administrator of the program. New agreements have been signed each year in order that the program would continue in effect. Beginning with the 1947-48 term it became necessary to raise the price of lunches from 20c to 30c. There were two reasons for thisfirst, the increase in food prices and labor, and second, the appropriation for subsidy was cut by Congress until only 6c has been available this year per lunch. So far this year the program has operated at a loss but a recent 11/20 increase in the subsidy may make

up the difference.

For the first five months of the year 10,691 lunches and bottles of milk were served to the students. The cost of operating the program has been \$4144.62 for this period; while the total income including subsidy has been \$3865.71.

Surplus commodities furnished this year include 168 pounds of processed cheese, 3600 pounds of Irish potatoes, 15 cases of canned tomatoes, 23 bushels of sweet potatoes, 17 cases of tomato juice, and 17

cases of dried peaches. Since 1943 much needed equipment has been added to the department. Included in equipment is a new 9 ft. Frigidaire, a gas serving table capable of keeping all food warm until serving time, and separate hot water heater, and a dish-washing cabinet. All of this equipment has been paid for out of the

LORD'S DAY BIBLE STUDY (Continued from last week.)

6. The right and duty of women to be teachers:

The truth on this subject lies between two extremes: one extreme is to allow women to be preachers to the whole assembly and thus to 'teach" and have dominion over men; the other extreme is to prohibit women from teaching other women and children, which the

scriptures authorize her to do. The scriptures place some limitations on women's work. These limitations grow out of the demand that women be in subjection. Note Cor. 14 vs. 23, defines the meeting under consideration in this chapter, when "the whole church be come together in one place." Vs 34-35 in such assembly when the whole church is come together, the commanded behavior is "let your women keep silence." I think it is agreed by all that the silence here imposed on women is that they are not to assume the lead in the assembly of the whole church; but this silence does not prohibit women from participating in the singing, and does not prohibit a woman from confessing her faith in Christ in preparation for bap-

1 Tim. 2:11-12 is another scripture on this subject. This text demands that women be in "subjection" and prohibits women from two things: "to teach" and "usurp authority" and both these prohibitions are qualified by the phrase 'over the man." The verse does not prohibit women from teaching their children, other children, or other women; but simply forbids her teaching or usurping authority over men.

Under the above stated Scriptural restrictions, women are divin-ely authorized to teach and labor in the gospel. Rom. 16:1-2 says that Phoebe was a servant of the church at Cenchrea. This does not mean that she occupied an official position. It is highly probable that her service consisted, partly at least, in obedience to the command recorded in Tit. 2:3-5 and was

teacher of other women. Phil. 4:3—"help those women which labored with me in the gospel." Labor in the gospel certainly includes "teaching" it, and Paul approved and commended this work. These women did their work under the restrictions of 1 Cor. 14 and I Tim. 2, and women today can render valuable service and labor in the gospel by teaching other women and children. (Continued next week.)




