WOOLEN MILL TO EXHIBIT AT FT. WORTH

The West Texas Woolen Mill of Eldorado will have an exhibit at the First Annual Southwestern Industrial Exposition, C. W. Wofford, president of the exposition, has announced.

The exposition will be held in Ft. Worth from May 30 to June 6 to emphasize the wide range of manufactured products turned out in the plants which have sprung up in Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

So important is the Southwest's industrial awakening that the region has been classed as one of the fastest growing industrial areas of the nation.

Behind the exposition is the intent to acquaint buyers and consumers from all parts of the United States with the important place Southwestern industry occupies, and to open new trade channels.

BOARDS FROM WEST HOTEL KITCHEN PRESERVE A BIT OF HISTORY WITHIN WALLS OF NEW WADE FARM COTTAGE

The old West Hotel is today only a memory, but boards from the old kitchen walls will be in Schleicher County a long time—embedded under the stucco which will provide the exterior finish for O. W. Wade's new farmhouse. The old hotel was put up by A. J. Ogden, who rode the land boom into Schleicher County when the school land was put on the market at the turn of the century. It was a plain box house, two stories high, containing eight or ten rooms.

Families passing through by wagon stopped there to put out the family wash and to rest before continuing on down the old dirt road—and men without families boarded and roomed there while they looked after their stock. Across the street was a livery stable, a few steps to the east was a blacksmith shop, and there were lots of hitching posts up and down the main drag, which made everything pretty handy for the travelers.

"Progress" brought dismantling of the old hotel building, growth and development to the county, and in 1948 a new house to the Wades—the new Wade home will have a little of the hotel lumber within its walls.

O. W. Wade, native of McCullough County, came to Schleicher County in 1905, when he bought the "Freeman place" from the Lanes. The small original house on the place, built by Tom Smith for the Freemans, was a story-and-a-

TWO RAINS VISIT COUNTY DURING WEEK

County Agent News

With April showers falling over the county, gardeners can expect a heavy infestation of plant lice and other closely related sucking insects. Here is a cheap and economical plant spray that spells sure death to sucking insects.

Take one ounce of soap powder, add to one quart of water, and boil. Add this to 1 quart of kerosene. Add all or any part of this mixture to 8 parts of water depending on how much spray you care to prepare for a given time. To this add one teaspoonful of nicotine sulfate.

Gardeners who have had difficulty in the past in killing the hard crusted bugs such as the squash bug have had no more to worry about. There is one sure killer, and the name of the insecticide that will get the job done is Sabadilla.

Those gardeners who have plants turning yellow in the early or growing stage can overcome this by side dressing with Copperas. A chemical action will take place which will unlock the elements of the soil and make them available to the plant. This also applies to trees and shrubs. Water the tree; take a crowbar and sink it about a foot in the soil and apply two or three pounds of copperas in several places about one foot from the tree. —W. G. Godwin, Co. Agent.

There has been a smell of mothballs, gasoline and death in the air since the first day of spring, says Marvin Hall. The state fire insurance commissioner attributes these ominous odors to the packing away of winter clothing and warns Texas housewives that there are many fire hazards connected with this annual job.

"Above all, do not clean winter garments with gasoline before they are stored away," he emphasized. "Gasoline, naphtha or benzine should never be used for cleaning purposes in the home, in the yard, or elsewhere."

"Only approved cleaning solvents should be used for taking off spots.

Carbon tetrachloride is a safe and inexpensive cleaner. Clothing needing extensive dry cleaning should be sent to a commercial establishment."

Clothing that is no longer wearable because of size, style or wear should be discarded immediately, and can be given to some charitable organization.

Old clothing stacked in an attic or cellar is one of the best fuels for a fire once it has started.

Washington News Letter

By Cong. O. C. Fisher

Our Air Forces will be much stronger in the future if a bill passed by the House last week is favored by the Senate. Provision is made for 70-group combat units and will bring the air force strength up to the level recommended by General Eisenhower, General Spaatz, Secretary of Air Synington, and others.

Last year the President appointed a 5-man commission headed by Thomas Finletter, to make a study of our minimum requirements in aviation. A report was made and the 70-group program was strongly recommended. Moreover, a joint House-Senate Committee made a similar study and made a similar recommendation.

This bill had my active support. In my judgment, the United States should have and maintain the strongest air force in the world. As the situation now stands, we are lagging considerably behind Soviet Russia in air power. The 70-group program will not only vastly strengthen our regular air force but will also benefit our Air National Guard and our Air Reserve—both of which are very essential components of our Air Force set-up.

The Finletter Report in recommending the pressing need for a stronger air force for our national security, made the solemn warning that "even the most optimistic view of the United States" does not assure us "that the world organization will develop in time the necessary authority to prevent another great war."

We know that if there should, unhappily, be another full-scale war, the United States will undoubtedly be the first target. We must be prepared to meet such attack with devastating force. In the last two wars good fortune was on our side in that we had allies to hold the enemy in check until we could prepare ourselves for action. We will never have that advantage again if we should be forced into war. Therefore, while Soviet Russia is making warlike moves, we had better keep prepared.

MAKE PERFECT BISCUITS FOR FRUIT SHORTCAKE DURING SPRING SEASON

"Is your biscuit technique as good as it might be?" Here is a question every homemaker should be able to answer in the affirmative, now that the season of fresh fruit shortcakes and new vegetables and salad greens is at hand. There is no better shortcake than one made with rich biscuit dough, and there's no better accompaniment for salads than a hot, tender, flaky biscuit.

Here are a few suggestions that insure biscuit success. First of all, use quality ingredients. Next keep these ingredients cold. Use lard and milk just as they come from the refrigerator. And to keep them cold, work with a pastry blender or two knives, rather than the fingers. Cut the lard in until it is the consistency of corn meal.

Handling of the dough should be at a minimum, but a brief 30-second period of kneading improves the texture of the biscuits.

Last, but not least, look to your laurels in biscuit variations. Biscuits come in an infinite number of flavors and shapes, with the addition of other ingredients and by being baked in various shapes.

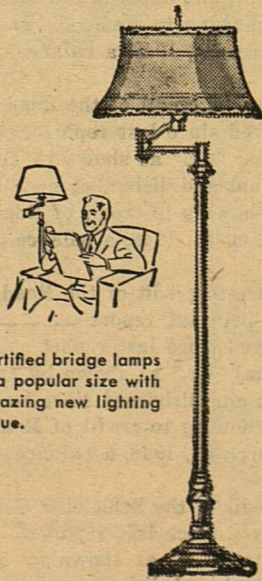

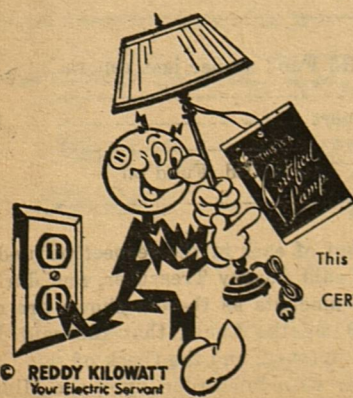

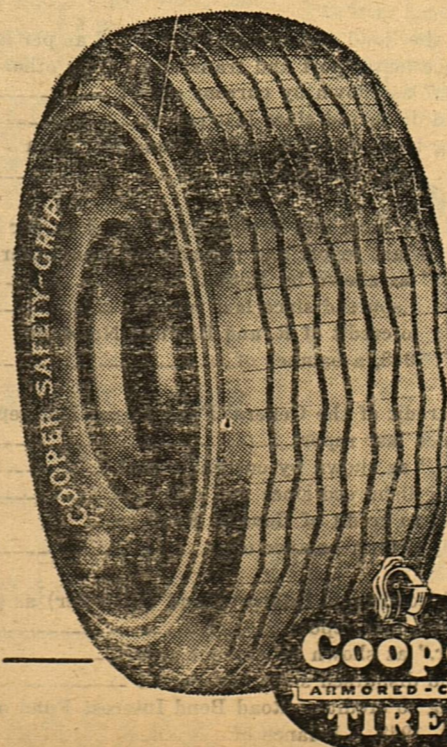

Nugent Announces For State Representative

This fact should work greatly to his advantage as well as to the profit of the voters of his district. Nugent's announcement is as follows:

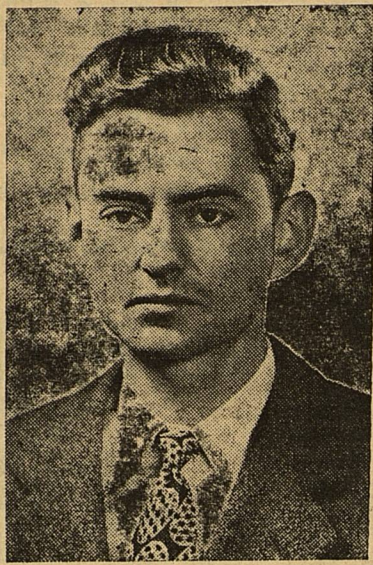
This is my formal announcement as a candidate for State Representative from the 86th district subject to the democratic primaries of next summer. I am a 25 year old veteran and have lived in San Angelo and Kerrville all my life with the exception of seven years spent in the Navy and at school.

Though I have not previously served in the Texas Legislature I believe my experience and training have well fitted me for the place I am seeking. Twenty two of those who are at present and probably future legislators were my close associates during the last seven years and having friends in the Legislature will allow me to better safeguard the interest of this district.

The plight of the deserving old people of our district and state, due to high prices, is a disgrace to a state that is enjoying the greatest prosperity and highest income in history. If elected I will do what I can to see that these old people receive enough to enable them to live in decency and comfort in their declining years.

With respect to the game laws in this section I am exceedingly interested in hearing your views and problems so that I can better act in behalf of this district if elected. Let me hear from you when I see you this summer.

Finally if elected I will represent the wishes of the people of the district as I know them. Having grown up among you, we will never be very far apart. I will not be the tool of any special group or faction, but will represent the will of the majority. I ask only to serve you in Austin as your elected representative. 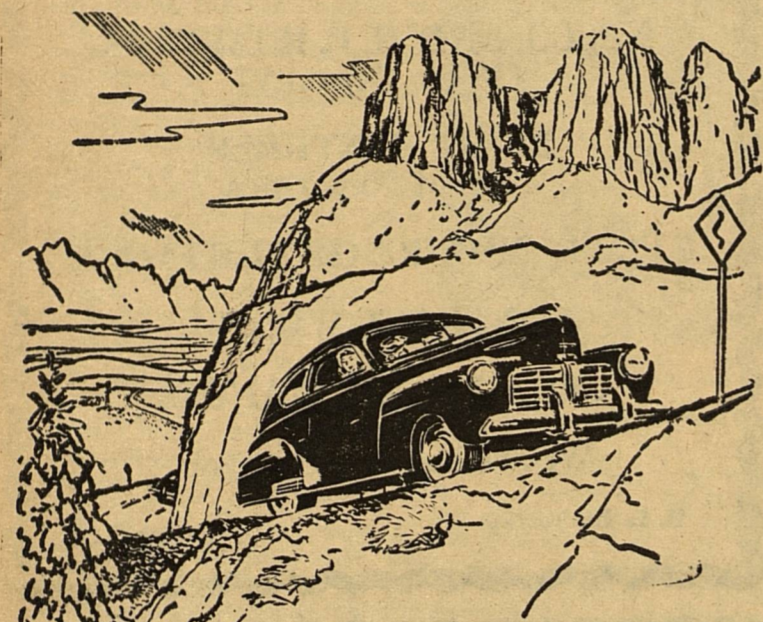

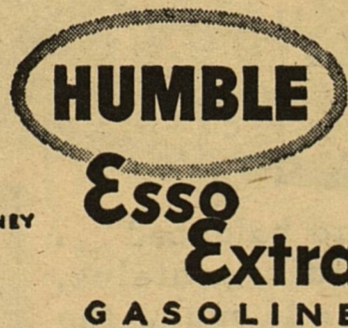

Pre-School Children Visit First Grade

Introducing a plan which he hopes to continue each year, Supt. C. A. Reynolds and Miss Thelma Ellington, first grade teacher, entertained parents and children who will enter school in September, with a pre-school visit last Friday afternoon in the first grade room.

Various points in the preparation of the child for school, and the part the parent can play in this preparation were emphasized in the program. The different machines used in helping the child to learn, and the newest methods of teaching were demonstrated.

Since the first grade children have been working on a bird unit, this theme was used throughout the first part of the program, which opened with group singing of bird songs. Following this, the children read a bird story, followed by the recording of one. Using the opaque projector, the group read a third story from the screen followed by a film strip, "The Three Bears", which was also read by the children as it was shown. The program closed with a sound picture, "Robin Red Breast".

The second phase of the program included talks to the parents by Miss Ellington and Supt. Reynolds, after a group of high school girls took the children to the playground. Miss Ellington used as her subject "School Readiness" emphasizing by a series of slides the various points in preparing the child for school.

Four points were stressed by Supt. Reynolds in his talk, namely that the parents be actively interested in the child and what he does at school; that they learn the child's abilities, capabilities, and inabilities, so that they will not expect him to do more than he is capable of. "A happy child who is not urged beyond his ability to learn, makes a better student than the one forced and urged to make straight A's," he brought out; the parent should be very careful not to slant the child's attitude against the school and his teacher, and last, but not least, he urged that parents visit the school.

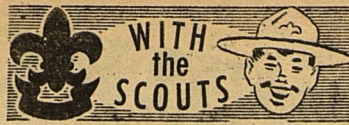

"Sin no more lest a worse thing come unto thee." Text: John 5:14.

Shortly after our Savior had healed a man who had been infirm (almost completely helpless for 38 years) Jesus found this man in the temple. The great Healer said unto him: "Behold, thou art made whole: sin no more, lest a worse thing come unto thee."

There are two undeniable proofs of Christ's real mercy here.

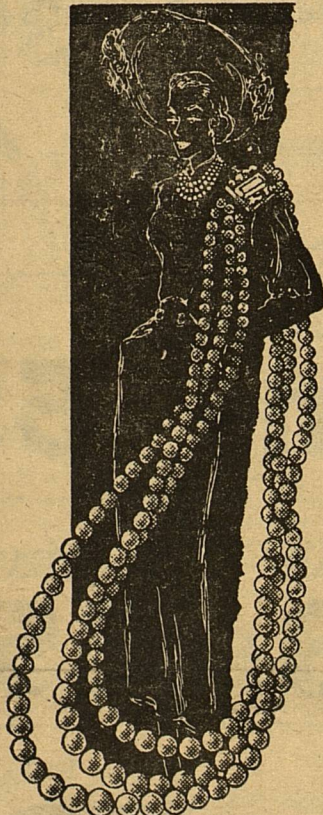
