Mata joins sentinel duty at the Tomb of the Unknowns

They call it "The Walk". Precisely twenty-one steps back and forth at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery. Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, 52 weeks a year, year in and year out since 1948 the somber duty has fallen to the Old Guard of the 3rd United States Infantry. Now, one of Eldorado's own is joining the prestigious ranks to make "The Walk", one of the highest honors an infantryman can achieve.

Victor Mata, who graduated from Eldorado High School in May of this year, completed his basic infantry training at Ft. Benning, Georgia on Sept. 24th. At that time, he was assigned to the 3rd Infantry at Ft. Meyer, Virginia.

Mata's recruiter, Sgt. Daniel Villalpando of San Angelo told the Success that it was indeed an honor for Mata to be selected for guard

duty at the Tomb of the Unknowns.

Upon completion of sentinel training at Ft. Meyer, Mata will receive a silver emblem known as the Tomb Guard badge. It will denote his successful completion of the training and signal the beginning of his 9-months duty on "The Walk". After completing the 9-month tour of duty, Mata will be allowed to wear the Tomb Guard badge throughout his military career.

During the training, Mata will be required to memorize seven pages of Arlington National Cemetery history. This information must be recited verbatim in order to earn a trial walk. Upon successful completion of the trial, Mata then learn the history of the cemetery and the grave location of nearly 300 veterans. He also must learn the Guard Change Ceremony and the manual of arms which takes

Collision with buzzard causes wreck on U.S. Hwy 277 North

Dirty bird — A collision with a buzzard caused this accident Tuesday morning. James Gordon Huffman, 41, of San Angelo, escaped serious injury after his car went off a 15 ft. embankment and narrowly missed a group of trees.

A collision with a buzzard resulted in a one-vehicle accident Tuesday, sending a San Angelo man by ambulance to Schleicher County Medical Center. James Gordon Huffman, 41, of San Angelo was treated and released and reported to have suffered only minor injuries.

According to Chief Deputy George Arispe who investigated the accident, Huffman was driving southbound on U.S. 277 approx. 13 miles north of Eldorado when his

1992 Mercury Grand Marquis struck a buzzard, causing him to lose control and leave the roadway. The car crossed the northbound lane and careened down a 15 ft. embankment on the east side of the highway.

Carrol Green and Amy Redwine of Eldorado witnessed the accident and went to Huffman's assistance.

Schleicher County Sheriff's Dept., EMS Ambulance and Eldorado Volunteer Firefighters responded to the accident scene.

Hospital Board meeting held

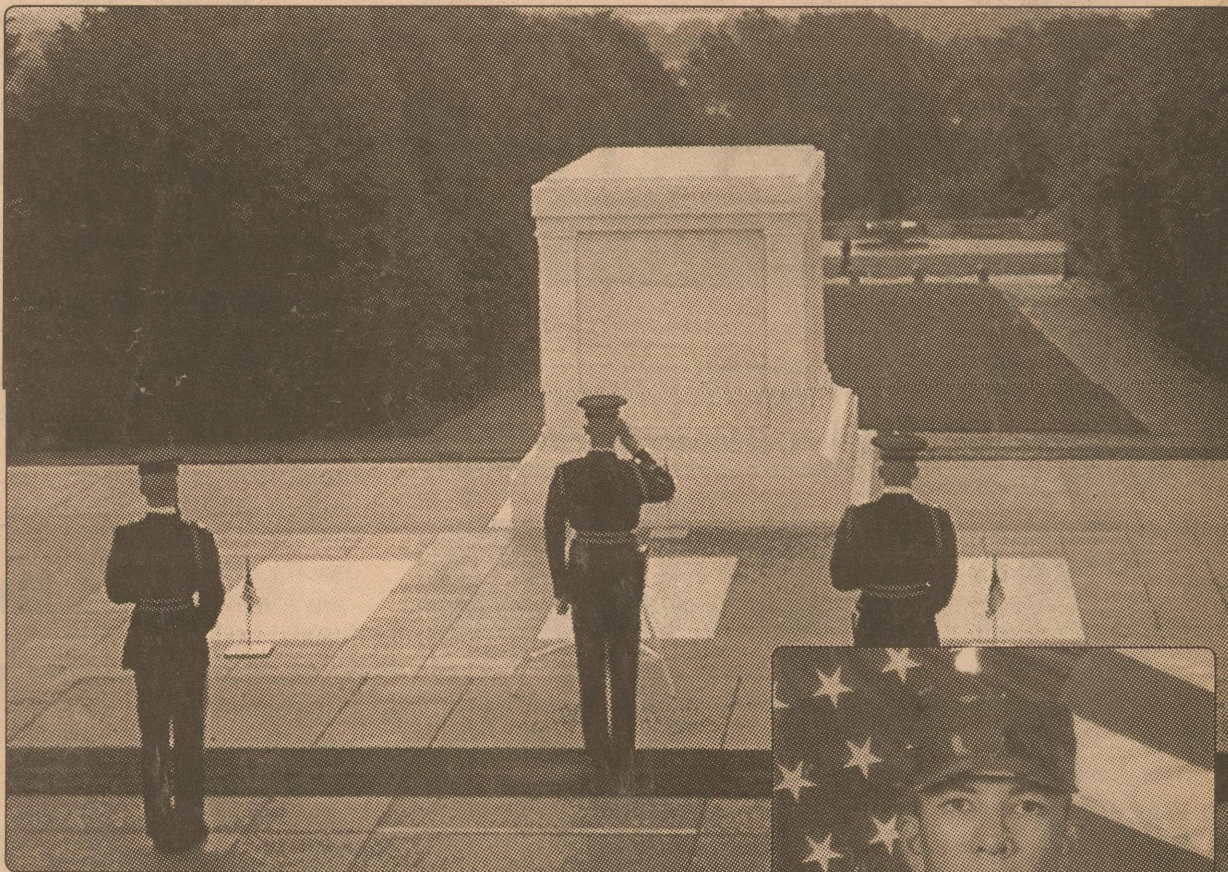

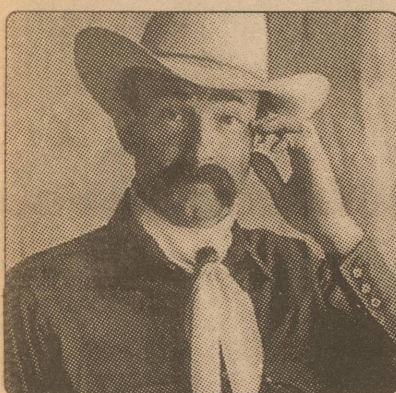
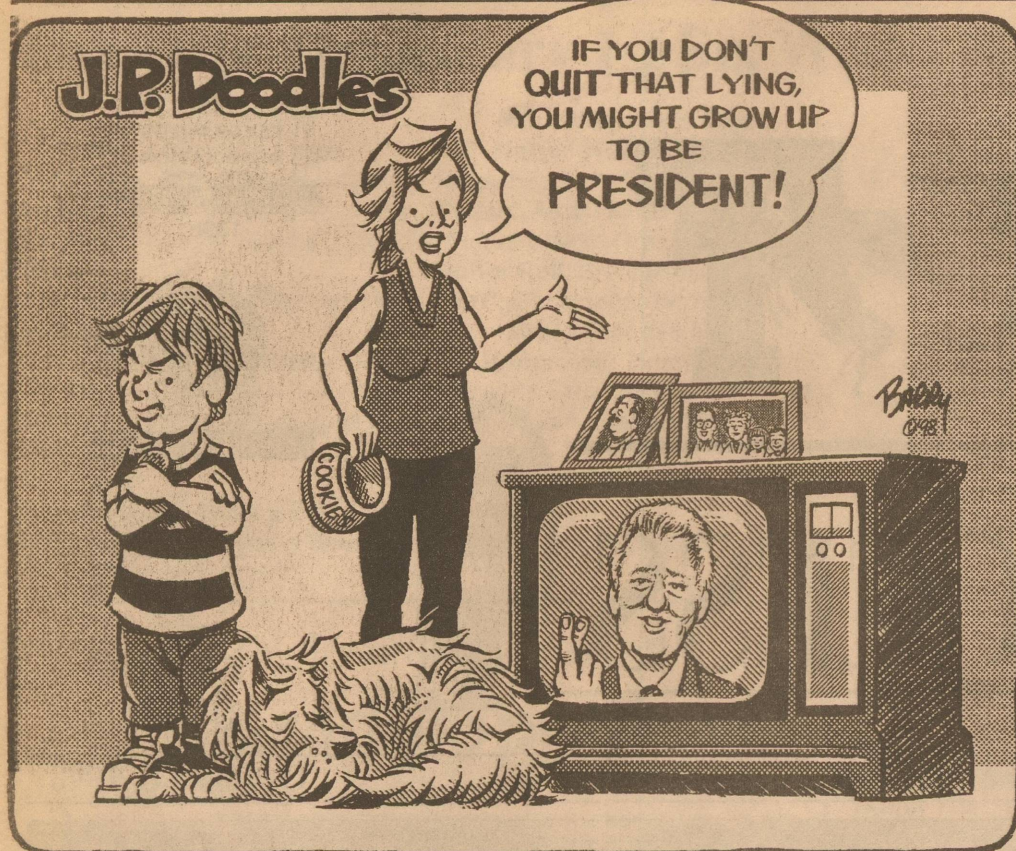

I sat on a piece of art work. It had a beating heart. A ripple ran between my legs, a tremor at the start. No more than a one on the richter scale. A glacier calving at the limits of my sonar.

"What do I do?" I asked the artist. "Ride him," he said.

Sure! Just climb in Apollo 13 here, and take her for a spin. But I can ride, can't I? I'm supposed to be a horseman.

I tensed in the saddle. No perceptible movement, just a rush of electrical charges to my extremities in preparation. Lighter than the flutter of a fly's wing hitting a spider web. He felt it. He was instantly alert.

I clucked and shook the reins. He stepped out. Neck arched, feet placed perfectly, smooth as a glass slipper on ice. His skin shown - his mane shimmered - his stride measured - his strength apparent - his superiority unquestioned.

I became larger than life. I raised my imaginary sword. I was General Lee, King Arthur, Hernan Cortes. I was the last conquistador riding into history on a bronze horse.

A firm pressure on the throttle. An immediate response from the engine room. We kicked into a lope. I had complete confidence that he could bank, maybe even roll but I held the horizon steady.

Then laying the reins gently to his neck I signaled left. He actually turned his head back to the right and looked up at me with his big whale eye. A quick glance of irritation, a snap of impatience. "You're

oversteering," said the artist. "Just the slightest touch and he'll turn. Matter of fact, just think about turning and he will."

Back into the gallop. I could hear callopie music. It is hard to ride something so majestic, so outrageous without imagining that the whole world is watching. Like escorting Lady Godiva down the aisle. You worry, "Do I look okay? Is my hat on backwards? Will I act a fool? But, of course no one is looking at you."

In my preflight check, landing instructions were simple; just say whoa. "Even running?" I asked. "Just say whoa." In the time it would take a dally to tighten, he had gone from a gallop to a dead stop. Without even touching the brakes. The depth of training to achieve this feat is profound in my mind. Just say whoa. Try that in your BMW.

How is a piece of artwork like this accomplished. Once I asked a woodcarver about a statue he'd made of a dog, "How do you do it?" He said, "I just carve away everything that doesn't look like a dog."

It strikes me that training horses is like that.

I have ridden many horses. This horse was another dimension. As true a piece of artwork as a Remington painting.

I don't know if I'll ever ride a horse that good again. It was an unexpected gift that will satisfy many longings. See, I've also never ridden in a Lamborghini... but now I don't have to.

Son --- What's up, Dad?

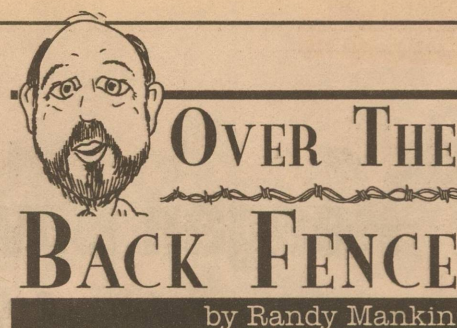
Dad --- There's a scratch down the side of the car. Did you do it?

cakes about six years.

"One morning it was exceptionally busy," says Wesley. "My kitchen is real small and a lot of times I'll be doing two or three things at once. You have to when you're the only cook and you've got a house full of people. I keep my batter in a big yellow bowl with a

handle on it.

I went to pour the batter onto the grill and I swung around to get some bacon or something. When I turned back around I had poured about half that bowl of batter onto the grill. I thought there was no sense in wasting it, I'll go ahead and send it out and people might get a kick out of it."

The people who got the pancake had entered the cafe with a frown on their faces. When they left, they were smiling. Wesley thought to himself, "Hey, this might be a cool thing to do."

If you eat three, you get 'em free.

I went back to the kitchen and watched Wesley prepare one of the huge pancakes. He poured enough batter to nearly cover the entire grill. He uses a regular size spatula to turn the pancakes, putting it gently underneath the edges, then at the proper time, when the batter has reached the right consistency, he

flips it over.

He invited me to try one of the pancakes. It tasted delicious, but I couldn't finish even a fourth of it. A pancake fifteen inches across and at least an inch thick is BIG, man. Takes lots of syrup. He sells very few stacks of the giant pancakes.

"I've got a spatula back there that has about seven or eight notches carved in it from people who tried to eat three. If they can't finish them, I mark a notch in my spatula. I've had only two people finish a stack. One was a 90 year old lady. She was here practically all day, but she ate them all."

Two teenage boys came into the cafe one day and tried to eat a stack. Wesley told them if they ate everything on the plate, he would buy them some new fishing gear. They tried their best, but couldn't finish the stack. Wesley bought them new rods and reels anyway.

State regulators accuse insurer of 'redlining'

AUSTIN — State insurance regulators last week cited Nationwide General Insurance Co. and its subsidiaries for widespread "redlining" practices.

The companies were accused of avoiding selling auto and homeowners' policies in minority neighborhoods of the Dallas-Fort Worth area and three other urban areas.

In a report published by *The Dallas Morning News*, Bob Sohovich, a spokesman for the Ohio-based company denied the allegations, saying, "Nationwide insurance is extremely surprised."

Lawyers for the Texas Department of Insurance recommended that the company be assessed a \$10 million fine.

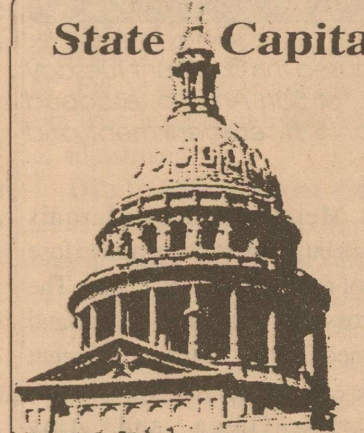
"Census data show that the effect of the company's market strategy is to steer Nationwide agents away from sales in ZIP Code areas where the population consists predominantly of racial minorities," the report said.

"The result of the strategy is to systematically exclude minority customers from the market in which Nationwide operates."

Nationwide has 20 days to respond to the report. They can seek an appeal hearing before an administrative law judge or try to negotiate a settlement with the Department of Insurance.

Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer will make the final decision in the case.

Jerry Johns of the Southwest Insurance Information Service told *The Morning News* the industry does not illegally discriminate in selling products.

"Insurers do practice risk selection, which means that insurance companies base decisions on the characteristic of each individual risk," he said.

Court Proposes Records Rules

The Texas Supreme Court has proposed rules that would open most administrative documents, from travel expense records to appointment calendars, kept by state courts, the Associated Press reported last week.

Chief Justice Tom Phillips said the draft rules, to be reviewed in a public hearing this week, would open judges' telephone records to

public inspection.

Last year, the state's highest civil court overruled an opinion by Attorney General Dan Morales that would have required release of telephone records.

The proposed rules would prevent release of draft opinions and internal memos on court rules and procedures, but would subject to public scrutiny travel and expense records, visitor logs and judges' personal and business appointment calendars.

Phillips said the proposals follow a national trend.

"Most Freedom of Information acts excluded the judiciary, dealing instead with those branches of government that taxed and spent your money," he told the Associated Press. "There's been a movement in the past 10 years to include the judiciary."

The proposed rules roughly follow suggestions drafted by the Texas Judicial Council this year at the court's request. The council is headed by Phillips and includes judges, other state officials and members of the public.

Issuance of the rules starts a four-month process to refine them before they take effect.

Tree Removal Prompts Complaint

The bulldozing of juniper trees at the Fort Hood military reservation is damaging the habitat of endangered golden-cheeked warblers

and black-capped vireos and ruining archaeological sites, an environmental group says.

Public Employees for Environmental Responsibility, an alliance of state and federal employees in pollution control, land management and wildlife protection agencies, lodged the complaint.

Fort Hood spokesman Cecil Green said there has been no damage, adding that junipers are considered a noxious shrub that inhibit the growth of beneficial native grasses, which prevent water runoff and soil erosion. And, he said, endangered birds' nesting areas aren't destroyed.

Jim Stinebaugh, senior resident agent with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in San Antonio, said the agency would look into the matter.

Travis Leads in Traffic Deaths

Travis was tops among Texas' six largest counties last year with 1.53 traffic fatalities for every 10,000 people, according to data assembled by the Trans Texas Alliance, a coalition of transportation groups.

Dallas County, with 1.29 fatalities per 10,000, had the second-highest number per capita.

Among other findings reported by the Austin American-Statesman, road fatalities dropped 6.2 percent statewide, in 1997, but increased 11 percent in Travis County.

Eldorado's Reagan Bownds is turning heads at Texas Tech

LUBBOCK — Texas Tech walk-on Reagan Bownds is having a banner season at the Raider back position. In only the first four games of the season, the 5-10, 190 pound junior from Eldorado tallied 22 tackles, two interceptions for 30 yards, a quarterback sack and two punt returns for 23 yards. In the 25 games that Bownds has played as a Red Raider he has recorded 99 tackles, two interceptions, one fumble recovery and one sack.

Two weeks ago against Iowa State, Bownds led the team with nine tackles and an interception for 30 yards. The Red Raiders defeated the Cyclones 31-24 in Ames, Iowa marking the start of Big 12 Conference play.

Bownds graduated from Eldorado High School in 1995. As an Eagle, he started four years at running back and safety. He rushed for 3,146 yards, 53 touchdowns and tallied 399 career tackles, eight fumble recoveries and six interceptions. Bownds was named Super Team All West Texas safety as a senior, three years All-West Texas and all District 5-2A as running back and safety. He also lettered in basketball, baseball, and track and was an active member in Student Council, Future Farmers of America, and National Honor Society.

In the Fall of 1995 Bownds walked on at Texas Tech and with a strong heart and aggressive style of play earned a starting position on the kickoff coverage team. In June of 1995 Bownds won the World Championship in goat roping while competing in the Texas Goat Roping Association. While that may not seem out of the ordinary in Eldorado, it caught the eye of reporters across the Big 12 Conference. Since then they regularly refer to Bownds' goat

roping ability.

The 1996-97 year started rocky for Bownds when he missed the season due to staph infection, but was redshirted to save another year of play. Bownds also earned a 4.0 G.P.A. his spring semester.

Last year Bownds played in 10 games and finished eighth in total tackles on the team with 59 tackles and, one fumble recovery, and a punt return for 30 yards against North Texas. Bownds earned first-team all Big 12 academic selection, was named to the GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-District IV squad, named to the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll for the fall semester, was named for the Dean's list for the spring semester, and earlier this year made the All-American Farm Team in the Success in Farming Magazine.

This season Bownds has become one of the key players in the Raiders secondary.

"Reagan is a very versatile player on our defense. I have confidence in playing him in a number of positions. He has more ability than most people think. He works hard everyday," Tech Defensive Coordinator John Goodner said.

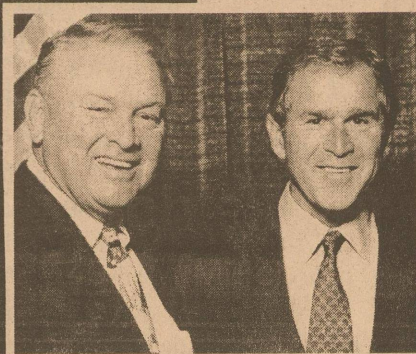

place during the inspection portion of the changing of the guard. Weapon and uniform preparation and maintenance is a priority.

New sentinels must pass a two-part test before receiving the Tomb Guard badge. First, they are tested on their manual of arms, uniform preparation and their walk. Then, the badge test is given. This test is 100 randomly selected questions of the 300 items memorized during training on the history of the cemetery and the Tomb of the Unknowns.

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier honors the unknown servicemen who have fallen in the four major U.S. Conflicts of the 20th Century: World War I, World War II, the Korean Conflict, and the Vietnam Conflict. In 1926, the tomb was placed under a day guard during the hours which the cemetery was open to visitors, but in 1937, the tomb was placed under a 24-hour military honor guard.

Responsibility of the guarding of the tomb was taken over by the 3rd Infantry in 1948, and the practice continues today. The responsibility of the Tomb Guard is to protect the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. During daylight hours, sentinels march for one hour shifts, and at night, two hour shifts.

Mata is the son of Juan and Josefa Mata of Eldorado. He will receive a \$33,000 college scholarship upon completion of his three year enlistment.

doctor may also check your thyroid level.

Also, ladies get to have there own personal lab work. First of all, every woman over 18 should have an annual Pap smear. This is used to detect cervical cancer. Most cervical cancers can be caught early enough with this test to be easily cured. Also, there is the need for annual mammograms for any lady over 40. Breast cancer is the leading cancer in women and can also be caught early with a breast exam and mammogram.

Some patients of mine have also noticed that I insist on having a pap smear and mammogram before giving any hormones. Why do I do this? Certain types of cancer are stimulated to grow with hormones. An example of this is a majority of breast cancers. Giving somebody hormones who has one of these cancers will make the cancer worse. Therefore I insist on having a pap smear and mammogram done to try to screen for these cancers.

Finally, men, you are not alone. Any male over 50 also needs to have his prostate checked. This is done with a blood test and rectal exam. This is the most common cancer in elderly men. It is slow growing and can be cured if caught early enough.

Getting a yearly exam is not the most pleasant thing to have. However, it will save you a bigger, more unpleasant exam in the future. This exam, coupled with the subject of next month's column, immunizations, diet, and exercise will help you to see me as little as possible.

Before adjourning the board learned from Beverly Minor of recent efforts to recruit a laboratory manager. Also, Fuessel announced that the committee for recruiting a hospital administrator would meet next Monday. That committee consists of Ricky Fuessel, Delia Pina and Randy Mankin.

Farm Service Agency to hold committee election

The Schleicher County FSA Committee election will be held this year on December 1, 1998. Eligible voters have the right to nominate candidate(s) of their choice by petition. Blank petitions (FSA-699A's) may be obtained at the County FSA Office. Each petition submitted must be: limited to 1 nominee; signed by the nominee, indicating willingness to serve, if elected; and postmarked or delivered to the County FSA Office no later than October 27, 1997.

Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. A farmer is eligible to be a County FSA Committee member if the farmer lives in the county and is an eligible voter. County FSA Committee members may not hold positions in certain farm and commodity organizations, if these positions pose a conflict of interest with FSA duties. These positions include functional offices

such as president, vice president, secretary, and positions on boards or executive committees. Additional information of eligibility to hold office may be obtained at the County FSA Office.

The duties of County FSA Committee member include: informing farmers of the purpose and provisions of the FSA program; keeping the State FSA Committee informed of county conditions; recommend needed changes in farm programs; and performing other duties as assigned by the State FSA Committee.

Schleicher County is divided into 3 different areas called Local Administrative Areas (LAA's). Nominations will be taken for LAA #3 which is west of McIntosh to Highway 190 and follows 190 west to Bootlegger Lane.

FSA administers all programs without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status.

Help Older Sibling Adjust to Baby's Birth

QUESTION: Before our baby was born last month, our 3-year-old daughter, April, was thrilled about having a new brother or sister. Now, however, she shows signs of jealousy, sucking her thumb sullenly when I nurse the baby and getting very loud and silly when friends drop by. Please suggest some ways I can ease her through this period of adjustment.

DR. DOBSON: Your daughter is revealing a textbook reaction to the invasion that has occurred in her private kingdom. It is typical for such a preschooler to throw temper tantrums, wet the bed, suck her thumb, mess her pants, hold tightly to Mama, talk "baby talk," etc. Since the baby gets all the attention by being helpless, the older child will often try to "out-baby the baby" — behaving in immature ways from an earlier stage of development. That pattern seems to be occurring with your little girl. Here's what I would suggest.

1. Bring her feelings out in the open and help her verbalize them. When she is acting silly in front of adults, take her in your arms and say, "What's the matter, April? Do you need some attention today?" Gradually, a child can be taught to use similar words when she feels excluded or rejected. "I need some attention, Dad. Will you play with me?" By verbalizing her feelings, you also help her understand herself better.

2. Don't let infantile behavior succeed. If she cries when the

baby sitter arrives, leave her anyway. A temper tantrum can be greeted by firmness. However, reveal little anger and displeasure, remembering that the entire episode is motivated by a threat to your love.

3. Meet her needs in ways that grant status to her for being older. Take her to the park, making it clear that the baby is too little to go; talk "up" to her about the things she can do that the baby can't — she can use the bathroom instead of her pants, for example. Let her help take care of the baby so she will feel she is part of the family process.

Beyond these corrective steps, give your daughter some time to adjust to her new situation. Even though it stresses her somewhat today, she should profit from the realization that she does not sit at the center of the universe.

QUESTION: In recent months, there have been two occasions where a woman at work has made a "pass" at me. I love my wife deeply, have no interest in this woman, and have communicated this to her in no uncertain terms. Do you think I should share these incidents with my wife?

DR. DOBSON: Yes, I do. First, because I believe the healthiest marriages are those that are open and honest on such matters. Second, because sharing important information is a step toward accountability in a situation that could prove dangerous. And third, because your wife should be your best friend with whom you discuss trou-

bling circumstances and how they will be handled.

My only caution is that you be careful not to reveal this disclosure in order to make your wife jealous or to "use" the incident to manipulate her. Some spouses seize an opportunity like this to play power games with a mate. Check out your motives carefully before you talk to your wife and share the experience as objectively as possible. She will appreciate you for it.

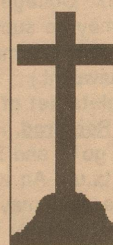
Finally, I urge you to continue to reject the advances of the woman in your office, regardless of how attractive she is or how flattering her interest in you may be. To pursue her may give your ego a ride now, but only pain and sorrow lie down that road — for her and for you.
