Safety Course To Be Taught Next Week

Mr. Huwiler, of the Shell Pipe Line office at Houston, will conduct a Bureau of Mines first aid course next week in Eldorado at the fire hall, sponsored by the safety division of the Shell company. Men, women and children of all ages are invited to attend.

The course will include all topics usually found in a standard first aid course, such as care of wounds, control of bleeding, administration of artificial respiration, etc. Schleicher County residents who have already taken some other first aid course will find these classes a good way to brush up on first aid fundamentals and refresh their memories for these important points.

Registration for the course will be Monday night at 7:00 at the fire hall, and classes will be held Tuesday through Friday night at the fire hall from 7:00 to 10:00.

If the demand for the course is so large that two classes must be held, the other course will probably be held during the day, Tuesday through Friday.

A test will be given to all people taking the course, probably on the last night, and cards will be issued to all those successfully completing course.

All Shell employees will probably take the course, and anyone else interested is urged to be on hand each night next week for the classes. No fee will be charged.

INDICTMENTS ARE RETURNED AGAINST FOUR

A 51st District Court grand jury returned four indictments Monday, two of which were disposed of in court that day.

Two youths from Goodfellow Field entered a plea of guilty on a forgery count and received a five-year suspended sentence. They were paroled to Goodfellow Field officials. The young men are Thomas B. Rowland, 20, formerly of Virginia, and Carson B. Nixon, 20, of Clyde.

The youths have been held in jail here since July, awaiting the September term of court.

M. Bardwell, 70, of Rocksprings was indicted on a charge of theft under false pretext, and is out under bond. Henry Clay McClellan, 25, Eldorado negro, was indicted on a burglary charge, and is in the county jail.

The Bardwell and McClellan cases will probably come up for trial Sept. 27 or Oct. 4.

Interest Growing In Beer Election

Interest is growing in the election to be held here October 9, to determine whether Schleicher County will legalize the sale of beer and wine. A petition of 110 voters was presented to the Commissioners Court recently, asking that the election be held.

Formal election notices are being prepared and will be posted in each of the nine county voting boxes where the election will be conducted. The proposition will be: "For (or against) legalizing the sale of malt and vinous beverages that do not contain alcohol in excess of 14% by volume."

This county has been dry since the early 1900's.

Her condition was considered quite serious for awhile, but doctors and relatives are well pleased now with the splendid progress she is making.

A broken left arm mid-way between the shoulder and elbow, and bruises and shock were the extent of injuries suffered by Carson West when he fell from a tree which he was pruning at his mother's home Monday, landing on his back on a concrete walk.

Mr. West was taken to San Angelo by his brother, Palmer West, accompanied by his wife, his mother, Mrs. C. C. West, and a sister, Mrs. Coralie Mebane, where x-ray pictures revealed the broken arm, but no back injury as it was first feared.

After treatment at the hospital, and the broken arm placed in a cast, he was able to return home Tuesday.

BOARD SETS \$1.50 TAX RATE; ADOPTS BUDGET

At a regular meeting of the trustees of Schleicher County rural high school district, Wednesday, Sept. 8, a tax rate of \$1.50 was set for the 1948 year. The budget as adopted amounted to \$113,061.50 for current expenses and \$30,000.00 to pay warrant indebtedness, making a total budget of \$143,061.50.

NEW FEDERAL CREDIT RULES NOW IN EFFECT

Monday at 12:01 a. m. the country went under a controlled credit plan. There has been a lot of confusion about just how the act will affect businesses, but most of us are worried about how the new regulation will affect the customers.

According to Mrs. Ernestine Hext, manager of the Eldorado Retail Merchants Association, this new control may not even be noticed by many credit buyers. Information received from the Associated Credit Bureaus of America indicates that the act isn't nearly so strict as most people suppose.

First of all, it doesn't even touch the ordinary 30-day charge account. Your favorite credit firm will still be able to give you the option of paying on the tenth instead of writing a check before you leave the counter.

Uncle Sam isn't worried about your small purchases, either, for the new regulation doesn't affect items that retail for less than \$50. Only 12 kinds of consumers' durable goods are specifically named in the regulation.

Those of us who are on the preferred list for a new car may have to dig into our savings more deeply than we had planned, for automobiles will require a 33 1-3% down payment, beginning last Monday. If the balance due on your car doesn't exceed \$1000, it must be paid off in 15 months.

If the balance is over \$1000, you can take 18 months to call it yours—but your payments must not be less than \$70 per month. Incidentally, these maturity provisions apply to all loans and merchandise.

Besides automobiles, the following articles are listed in the regulation: cooking stoves, dishwashers, irons, refrigerators, washing machines, combination units of these items, air conditioners (room unit), radio television and phonograph sets, sewing machines, suction cleaners, and furniture and soft-surface floor coverings. All of these are subject to a 20% down payment.

"Actually," Mrs. Hext says, "the new regulation is designed to require customers to do just what we've been preaching they should do for years—pay your accounts as agreed, but only what you can afford, and don't be fooled into thinking the ability to say charge it increases your ability to pay. Credit is no substitute for income."

Mrs. Hext pointed out that the new regulation will not affect the need for complete credit information in the community, or the necessity for keeping personal credit records good. The fact that customers will be required to meet certain definite requirements when purchasing some merchandise will make it doubly important for firms to get credit reports when they buy those items which are not on the "protected" list. Mrs. Hext expects the unprecedented local demand for credit reports to continue.

Mrs. Hext finally suggested that while the government can enact many kinds of credit legislation, true credit control and protection against inflation actually lies with the customer. His intelligent buying is our greatest bulwark against inflation.

Do You REALLY Love Jesus?

"For it is a rebellious people, lying children, children that will not hear the law of Jehovah; that say to the seers, See not; and to the prophets, Prophecy not unto us right things, speak unto us smooth things, prophesy deceits," (Isa. 30: 9,10). Perhaps the world has become guilty of this terrible crime today. This might be the reason there is so much confusion in religious circles. The people spoken of in the text wanted only "smooth things" spoken unto them —things that pleased them. When one says that religion is not a subject for discussion he becomes guilty of the same error as the Israelites were. The person making that statement believes everyone has a right to his own opinion in religious matters — just as those referred to in our text. We must hear the word of God and obey it for in it only are the "right things" found.

Just as there were false prophets in the days of the prophets who did not prophesy "right things", but

spoke "smooth things" and deceits, there are preachers today doing the same. Those false prophets had a form of godliness ("The prophets prophesy lies in my name" Jer. 14:14). Preachers over the land are preaching a perverted gospel in the name of Jehovah. The Israelites were condemned for following these deceiving leaders (Isa 9:17); we will be condemned if we allow ourselves to be deceived by them (Gal. 1:6, 7-10).

Let us not become guilty of following our own opinions in matters of religion, but let us be guided by the word of God. Remember: "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, But the end thereof are the ways of death." (Prov. 16:25). Therefore, in matters of religion always demand a "thus sayeth the Lord." Be as the Bereans and check each preacher's message with the word of God (Acts 17:11). Those Israelites were called a "rebellious people, lying children." What will we be called if we follow in their footsteps? See I Cor. 10:11.

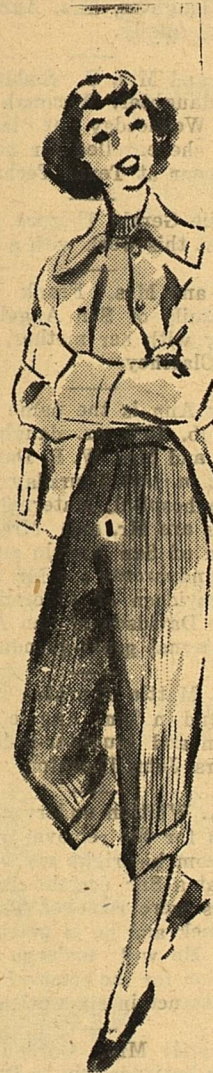

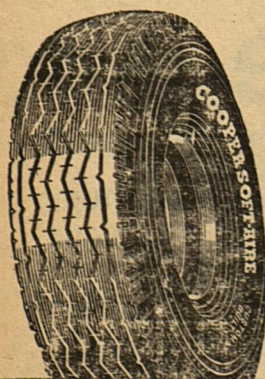

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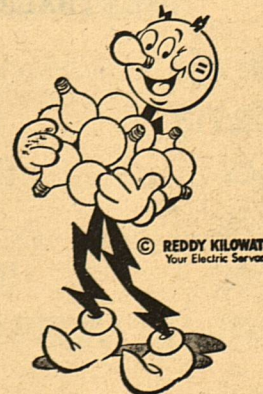
