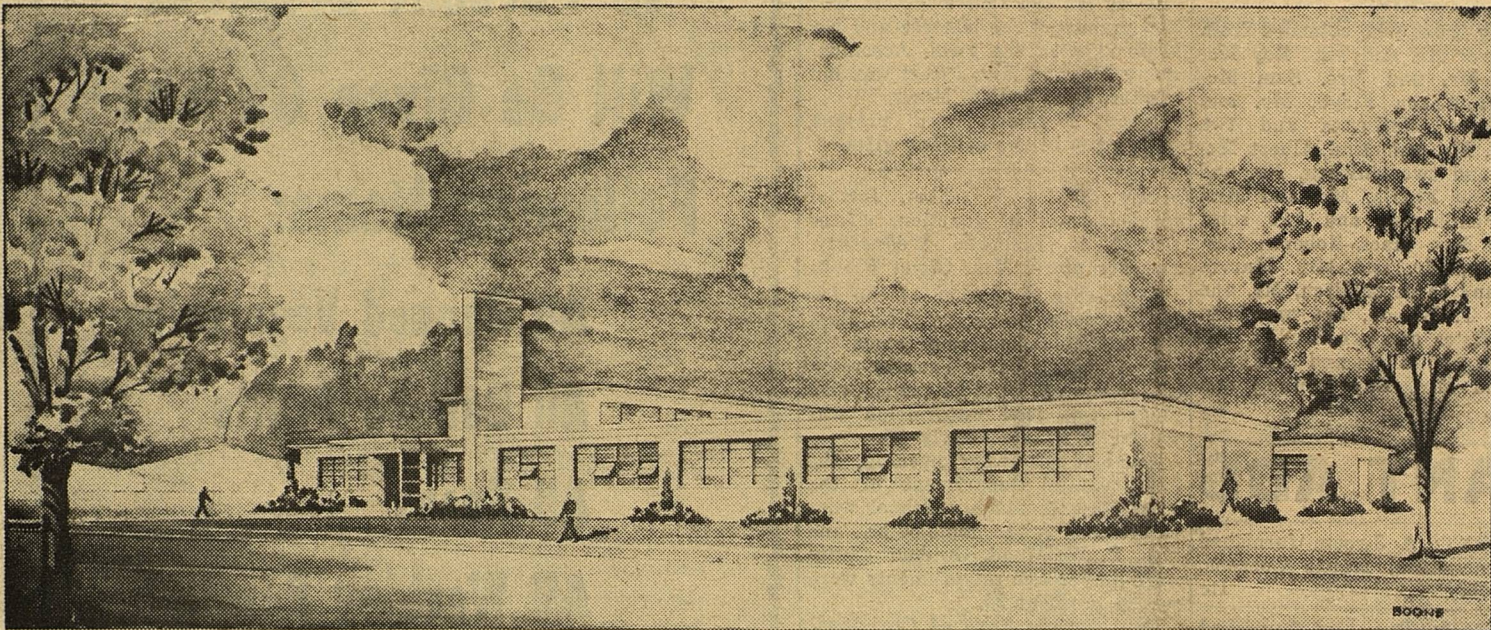

\$476,000 Bonds Proposed for Building Program of County School System



Architect's Conception of Proposed New High School Building For Eldorado

August 28 Set As Election Day

At last Schleicher county voters will be given opportunity to do something about the crowded condition of the schools of the county.

Above is shown an architect's drawing of the proposed new county high school, which is one phase of a proposed three-point \$476,000 building program to be launched, with tax payers' approval, during the coming school year.

The following three propositions will be voted upon at the \$476,000 bond election to be held August 28:

1. Whether or not the school board will have the authority to issue \$476,000 in school building bonds;

2. Whether or not a maximum tax rate of \$1.50 per 100 dollar valuation shall be levied for the purpose of financing the bonds and providing funds for maintenance of the school;

3. Should the present bonded indebtedness of \$41,000 be assumed by the entire school district?

The bonds, if voted, will be payable serially over a period of 28 years with interest rates not to exceed 4 per cent.

A building program has been under consideration by the school board for some time. At a meeting of the group August 17, the bond election was set for August 28, to be held at the courthouse, as a result of presentation of a petition containing names of 45 qualified voters asking for the election. The petition was circulated by PTA leaders and other friends of Schleicher county youth.

While details have not been completely worked out, the main provisions of the building include improvement in elementary and high school facilities, to include a new junior-senior high school, a three-room addition to the grade school building, and building of a new elementary school to be located in the Latin American district. Better building facilities for Negro children, installing of new equipment in most of the rooms throughout the high school building, reworking of playgrounds and other changes and improvements are tentatively planned.

Eventually the present high school building would be demolished to provide \$25,000 in useable material.

As tentatively planned, the new high school building would be on the north side of the grounds, facing the Merton road (and the Yascen residence), with room on west and east ends for future additions as needed. The present old high school site would be the new playground, fenced off from the highway.

A three-room addition to the elementary building would be added at the east end of the present grade school. A building containing 4,015 square feet, including an auditorium, four classrooms, and rest rooms would be provided in the Latin American neighborhood, and a better building would serve the Negro neighborhood.

Several factors have made it necessary that the district consider a building program at this time. The

recent annexation of all common schools in the county, and the continued growth of the county has caused the present space to be inadequate to give proper classroom instruction without crowding. It became necessary last year to move two of the elementary grades into the high school building to allow room for the primary and intermediate pupils. As a result the overflow in the high school building has had to be partially housed in the study hall. It may become necessary this year to do away with the lunch-rooms in order that there will be enough classrooms for the upper six grades. It has been estimated that there will not be enough room in the present elementary building to properly house the first six grades.

The high school building will be more crowded this year than last, because of the 45 or more students who will come from the grade school into the seventh grade.

Crowding will exist in a number of other grades also. On the basis of enrollment at the close of school last year, it is estimated that the following number of students can be expected:

35 in first grade; 42 in second grade, to be divided into two sections; 47 in third grade, 45 in fourth, 39 in fifth, 32 in sixth, 45 or more in seventh, and 37 in eighth.

Overcrowding is noted in the first, fourth, fifth, and seventh grades. Families moving into or out of the county may change these estimated numbers somewhat.

Reasons assigned for crowding in the school system are not altogether local in origin. 1. The bumper crop of war babies is already in school, and they, and their many little brothers and sisters, will crowd the schools for many years to come. 2. Schleicher county and Eldorado are growing, which means more families. 3. Most of the young people now graduate from high school. 4. Schleicher has a county-wide school unit. All of these reasons combined are responsible for record enrollment during these post-war years.

Recent recommendations of the State Department of Education, from the state superintendent's office to the school board, were that the school district should develop plans at once for buildings to meet the needs of the community and also to provide more adequate equipment for the teaching of high school subjects.

In line with the above report from the state department, and other reports received in recent years, the trustees hired David Castle and Company, architects, to make a survey of the existing school facilities and make recommendations as to what would be needed for several years in the future. They were also instructed to submit tentative plans for the entire district.

Recently the architects completed these plans and submitted them, along with architects' drawings, to the school board. The drawings are now on display in the windows of Hoover and Page drug stores.

GROUP RETURNS FROM 10-DAY VACATION TRIP

PROSPECTS FOR GRAIN SORGHUM LOANS GOOD

Eddie Brown, manager of the local AAA office, has been informed that he will receive additional information soon on loans for grain sorghum. P. C. (Happy) Colgin, administrative officer of commodity loans for Texas, will send him information in the next ten days or so.

This county, which is primarily a ranching county, has never received the benefit of grain sorghum loans, which would enable farmers to store their grain, receive loans on it, and repay the loans when prices were higher. The AAA would guarantee a certain price for the grain, and farmers could later sell their grain to the AAA at that price if market prices did not go higher. The advantage to farmers is that they can borrow money on their grain sorghum crop when needed, selling when the market rises, thus avoiding having to sell in a low market if they are short of cash.

Mr. Brown emphasizes that everything possible is being done so that Schleicher County farmers may receive these benefits when needed.

Storage Space Needed

The main difficulty, says Brown, will be in finding adequate storage facilities for the grain under this plan. He hopes, however, to find warehouse storage space in some nearby county, and states that it is likely that farm storage will be accepted also, provided the storage place meets certain Commodity Credit Corporation specifications.

Brown will be glad to answer further questions about prospects for these loans, and hopes to have definite information soon.

New Coach Starts Football Workouts

Ted Kirby, new coach of the Eldorado schools, arrived here Friday and is now on the job supervising pre-season workouts for the football team.

David Allen and Billy Ray Jones were elected captains of the team in a business session Tuesday of the squad. Allen was on the first string last year, and Jones also did quite a lot of playing; the boys are expected to be capable and dependable leaders for the team during the year.

Coach Kirby works each morning with the centers and backs, and in the evening with the entire team. He hopes a little later to have some practices under the lights before school starts.

Although Coach Kirby has only one player, Allen, who was on the first string last year, he hopes to develop and season some good men. He pointed out that only three first string players will graduate this spring, so the team a year from now should be exceptionally good for a starter.

In the line are included David Allen and Buddy Baker as centers, Harlan McAlpine (prospective guard), Kumlir Mund, Roger Sofge; Glenn Biggs and Wayne Davis as tackles; Chester Biggs, Earl Dean Clark and Jimmy Woodward as ends.

The first scheduled game is with Iraan, there, Sept. 10; however, the coach hopes to arrange a practice scrimmage with some team before then. Some of the other games are with Robert Lee on the 17th here, with Eden here on the 24th; with Menard there October 8; and Oct. 1 and 15 open. It is hoped that one of the open dates can be filled.

The junior high school team will have some games also during the season, although a schedule for them has not yet been worked out. Their practice periods will be held during school hours. Their games will probably be on the football field, just before the scheduled games for the senior squad.

Kirby has rooms at the Jack Halbert house near the schoolhouse. He is a native of Goldthwaite and has coached several years in the Goldthwaite schools. He is a graduate of Howard Payne, a veteran and a member of the Church of Christ.
