



> The high school building will be more crowded this year than last, because of the 45 or more students who will come from the grade school into the seventh grade.

Crowding will exist in a number of other grades also. On the basis of enrollment at the close of school last year, it is estimated that the following number of students can be expected:

35 in first grade; 42 in second grade, to be divided into two sections; 47 in third grade, 45 in fourth, 39 in fifth, 32 in sixth, 45 or more in seventh, and 37 in eighth.

Overcrowding is noted in the first, fourth, fifth, and seventh grades. Families moving into or out of the county may change these estimated numbers somewhat.

Reasons assigned for crowding in the school system are not altogether local in origin. 1. The bumper crop of war babies is already in school, and they, and their many little brothers and sisters, will crowd the schools for many years to come. 2. Schleicher county and Eldorado are growing, which means more families. 3. Most of the young people now graduate from high school. 4. Schleicher has a county-wide school unit. All of these reasons combined are responsible for record enrollment during these post-war years.

Eddie Brown, manager of the local AAA office, has been informed that he will receive additional information soon on loans for grain sorghum. P. C. (Happy) Colgin, administrative officer 0 commodity loans for Texas, will send him information in the next ten days or so.

This county, which is primarily a ranching county, has never re-ceived the benefit of grain sorghum loans, which would enable farmers to store their grain, receive loans on it, and repay the loans when grain, and farmers could later sell their grain to the AAA at that | New Teachers

price if market prices did not go higher. The advantage to farmers is that they can borrow money on their grain sorghum crop when needed, selling when the market rises, thus avoiding having to sell with a BA in English and a minute in a low market if they are short in speech and German. That Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compen-sated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be manda-tory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy consta-bles and precinct law enforcement offi-cers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), ac-cording to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall al-so have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law en-forcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and col-lector of taxes, and their deputies, on a sal-ary basis beginning January 1, 1949. "All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the count of the proper fund, provided that fees including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and col-lector of taxes, and their deputies, on a sal-ary basis beginning January 1, 1949. "All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county of the proper fund, provided that fees including sheriffs who also hoficer or paid into the treasury of the county as the feommysioners Court may direct. 
