## Two New Oil Wells

Two good oil wells have been brought in recently on the Page land by Cooper Gas Co. Page 5-AE (C NW NW 33-L-GH&SA) is making about 30 barrels per hour and 7-D (C SW NE 39-L-GH&SA) about 20.

The wells were brought in late last week. Four derricks are up on new locations on Page ranch land. One of these is on Page 4A, one of the original gasers, which will be drilled deeper for oil production. The other three are on new locations.

When this well is brought in, the derrick will be moved to a Koy location, an offset to 5A, for which the crew are digging the cellar this week.

When the gasser is changed to an oil producer, it is understood that Page will have 16 oil wells and 5 gasers, and Koy will have 12 oil wells.

## PHILLIPS FAMILY SEE FLOODS, SNOW, COVERED BRIDGES, 10-ACRE RANCHES, YANKEE CRICKS ON TRIP TO OREGON

The Phillips left Eldorado last May in their new GMC, after making arrangements for disposal of their residence; they wished to be free to make Oregon their permanent home if they found things to their liking there. The couple and their seven children (John, Vernon, Juanita, Herman, Patricia, Mollie and Joe, the youngest age 3 months) report a fine trip, with no flats and no accidents of any kind.

Their itinerary included the northeast part of New Mexico, Colorado, Utah, Idaho and Oregon. They made a 4-day stop at Delta, Colo., with his brother, Timothy Phillips and his family and from there made side trips to several scenic spots: Bear Creek Falls, which has a drop of 250 feet, Box Canyon, through which runs Gunnison River, and other places.

They arrived in Oregon only one day after the big flood and wash-out at Portland. As the family's destination was Hood River, located at the junction of the Columbia and Hood rivers, they saw the rivers at their highest. "Hood River is just a creek," says Phillips, "but those Yankees pronounce it 'crick'."

They report the Columbia a half mile wide there as a result of the heavy rains.

Paul, who did some carpentering there, says the prevailing wage for "finish" carpenters is \$2.50 per hour, with others drawing \$1.92 per hour. He and several of the children worked part of the time, but found the good fishing in the numerous streams a great distraction. The children especially had a glorious time fishing, hiking and picnicking.

The devotional was given by Mrs. Bud Davidson, and a business ses-

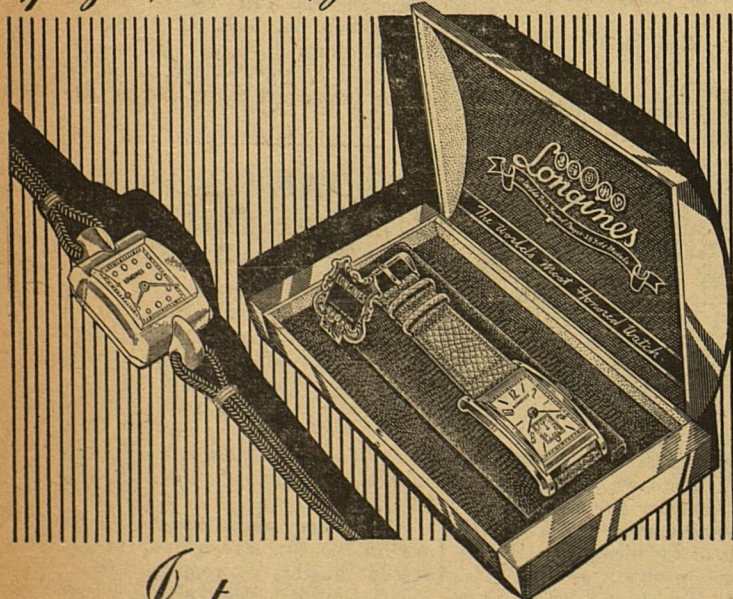
