School Bonds Lose

Schleicher county voters went to the polls in Eldorado Saturday and turned down the proposed \$476,000 bond issue for a school building program—then approved the \$1.50 tax rate, and the third proposition involving assumption by the entire district of the school's \$41,000 indebtedness.

The proposed bond issue lost by a scant 13 votes—the figures being 266 for, and 279 against.

The second proposition, regarding the \$1.50 tax rate carried by 64 votes. The figures here were 294 in favor, and 230 against.

The third proposition—spreading the present indebtedness over the entire district, carried by a vote of 309 for, and 219 against.

Although the voters did nothing Saturday to relieve the immediate crowded conditions of the school, they have put the district on a really good financial basis, and school officials hope that the housing problem can be worked out in the coming near future.

LOCKLEAR MOVE TO THEIR FARM, OPERATE CAFE

Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Locklear have moved to Schleicher County and have taken up residence on their farm near Eldorado.

They have also taken over the City Cafe, which Mrs. N. G. Hodges has been managing, and are operating it under the old name.

The couple have a daughter, Sybil, who will enter 8th grade, and expects to be a clarinetist in the band.

Selective Service Registration Starts; Ratliff Heads Board

Registration of Schleicher county young men under selective service is underway with Carrol Ratliff as Schleicher county chairman.

Mrs. Dorothy Evans is serving as volunteer registrar, with county Judge C. L. Meador, Jr., assisting as needed, in the courthouse.

As Sonora has been designated as area headquarters, reports are mailed each night to that office where all records are on file.

Mr. Ratliff urges that as far as possible each young man register on the designated date. If this is impossible, one of the other dates before Sept. 18 may be chosen.

If a youth chooses to keep Eldorado as his registration place and he is away from home, in college, or on a job, he can register there, and have his card sent to Eldorado.

Judging by the estimated national average, 8 percent of the population will register — which will be 350 for Schleicher.

Two-Year Program Of Road Building Recently Announced

A two-year state-federal road program with 10% reduction in annual expenditure, funds to become available not later than July 1, 1949, is announced. The state will match federal funds, build and maintain roads and the counties furnish right-of-way. This announcement is of interest to Schleicher County, as residents are hopeful that the county's Menard-Eldorado road will be continued on through the county.

The following are excerpts from a letter of explanation received by Judge C. L. Meador, Jr., recently.

"The Act provides for the selection of roads to be constructed on the Federal-aid Secondary System, which includes farm-to-market roads, to be made by the Highway Department in cooperation with the County Commissioners Courts. It will be the purpose of this Department to have the District Engineers contact the County Commissioners Court during the month of September to ascertain from them the principal road needs of their people. When this has been done the Highway Commission will formulate a two year program. In line with this procedure it will not be necessary for delegations to come before the Highway Commission requesting farm-to-market roads.

"The Act also provides that the roads are to be selected from the principal Secondary and Feeder roads, including farm-to-market roads and rural free delivery mail and public school bus routes.

"The new program, covering only a period of two years and with reduced funds and with continued high construction costs, will fall short in continuing the rate of progress made under the old program. This means that selection under the new program must be carefully made to assure rendering the maximum of service to the people. Upon the formulation of the two year program there will be no funds available for additional roads during this two year period unless additional funds are provided from presently unknown sources."

PEP SQUAD AND BAND TO BE AT FIRST GAME

Pep squad leaders and twirlers for the high school band met at the home of C. F. Jones last week to make plans for attending the first football game of the 1948-49 season, to be held at Iraan Sept. 10. It is planned to take all the band, the pep squad, leaders and most of the student body to see the game which will officially open the season for Eldorado.

New twirlers, drum majorette, and pep leaders were elected by the student body before school was out this spring, and these new leaders are getting everything in readiness for the coming season.

Drum majorette will be Pat Humphrey, and pep leaders will be Ebba Ann Finley, Betty Sue Williams, Irene Childers, and Mary Thompson, with another to be elected by the student body when school opens.

ELDORADO HARDWARE RENOVATED

The interior of the Eldorado Hardware building is being painted this week. The office at the front has also been improved, and other alterations are planned.

Another summer vacation closes with the first faculty meeting of the 1948-9 year Saturday, enrollment of Seniors Saturday and of all other students Monday.

There have been last minute improvements in buildings and in the grounds, checking of tests, arranging of schedule, completing of details in bus schedules, assigning of faculty members to their posts and other final pre-opening activities.

Faculty Meetings

General faculty meeting is to be held in the high school building Saturday morning, Sept. 4 at 10 a. m. The teachers are to meet with the superintendent to receive instructions and go over final plans for the school year. After the faculty meeting members of the high school faculty will meet with the high school principal to receive final instructions and go over registration procedures. Members of the elementary faculty will meet with the elementary principal after the general faculty meeting for final assignments, and to complete plans for the enrollment of elementary pupils.

Opening Exercises

A general assembly will be held at 9:30 a. m. Monday in the high school auditorium. At that time a short program will be held and final instructions will be given students. New teachers will be introduced.

Registration for High School

High school seniors: 1:30 p. m. Saturday in high school study hall.

High school juniors: 10:30 a. m. Monday in high school study hall.

High school sophomores: 1:30 p. m. Monday in high school study hall.

High school freshmen: 2:30 p. m. Monday in high school study hall.

All students are requested to come at the time designated for the different classes. All new students should report to the superintendent or principal.

Regular classes will begin Tuesday morning at 8:40 a. m.

Elementary Registration

All elementary students will report to the respective home rooms after the general assembly Monday morning to be enrolled and to receive books. All new students are requested to report to the principal of the elementary school for assignment. After enrollment classes will be dismissed for the day. Regular classes will begin Tuesday morning.

School Lunchroom

The school lunchroom will open Tuesday noon. Lunches will be charged for at the rate of 25c per meal. Meal tickets may be secured for \$1.25. The tickets will be good for one week. The school will again take part in the national school lunch program subsidized by the federal government. Mrs. Schooley will have charge of the lunchroom and will be assisted by Mrs. E. W. Craig.

Driver Education

Driver Education is going to be taught this year for the first time in the Eldorado Schools, the course to be open to freshmen and sophomore students only on a non-credit basis. The course is to run the full school term of nine months. The students will be given classroom instruction and actual behind-the-wheel instruction in a new '49 Ford furnished the school through the courtesy of Charlie Trigg, owner of the Charlie Trigg Motors. The car is being furnished to the school for this course at no cost to the school other than upkeep and insurance.

The course will be taught by Herman Hopkins who attended one of the drivers schools at the U. of Texas this summer.

In addition to learning to drive a car, the students in the course will learn the rules of safe driving, road courtesy and something of the mechanics of an automobile. This course is gaining wide favor in public schools today and it has been found that students who complete the course are involved in very few road accidents.

It has been found that the best time to offer the course is to give it to students when they are at the age of beginning to drive. For that reason the minimum age for this course will be 14. Students wishing to take the course must have a written permit from their parents.

The students who finish the course will be eligible for a driver's license.

Bus Schedules and Routes

The school busses will run the first time Monday morning to bring students to school in time to enroll. The busses will leave the school at 11:30 on Monday after registration has been completed. The busses will run on about the same time schedule Tuesday and thereafter as last year. Bus routes will be about the same as last year except for minor changes that will be made as needed.

Bus no. 1 will be driven by Mrs. Paul Haley and will follow the same route to Station A as last year. The same route will be followed both morning and afternoon.

Bus no. 2 (Reynolds bus) will be driven by E. Howerton and will follow approximately the same route as last year.

Bus no. 3 (Mertzson road) will be driven by Vernon Hazelwood and will follow approximately the same route.

Bus no. 4 (Cliff bus) will be driven by James McDonald and will follow about the same route as last year.

Bus no. 5 (Fort McKavett) will be driven by R. C. Morgan. This bus will follow the same route as last year. Same route will be followed both morning and afternoon.

Bus no. 6 (Adams and Loftin) will be driven by H. L. Hazelwood. Same route as last year.

Patrons of the school whose children have not been riding the busses and desire to have their children do so are requested to contact the bus driver of that particular route or the superintendent.

Time Schedule

Morning classes will start at 8:40 a. m. Lunch will be at 12 noon. Afternoon classes will start at 12:40 p. m. and school will close at 4:00 p. m.

Coke Wins

The Texas Election Bureau announced at 6 p. m. yesterday that Coke Stevenson was leading Lyndon Johnson by 362 votes in the Democratic runoff for U. S. Senate. The returns were based on complete tabulations from all of the state's 254 counties, 55 officially confirmed. In Schleicher Co., Stevenson received 339 votes, Johnson, 290.

1 package strawberry gelatin
1 1/4 cups powdered sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup Pet Milk
1 cup graham cracker crumbs
1/4 cup soft butter or margarine
2 eggs, separated

Drain pineapple, saving juice. Add enough water to juice to make 3/4 cup. Heat to boiling. Stir in gelatin until dissolved. Add pineapple, 1/4 cup powdered sugar, the salt and lemon juice. Chill until thoroughly cold; then stir in milk. Chill until syrupy. Meanwhile, grease a deep 9-in. pie pan. With back of spoon, press 3/4 cup crumbs on bottom and sides of pan. Put butter into bowl; work remaining 1 cup of powdered sugar into butter. Beat in egg yolks. Spread carefully over crumbs in pan. Chill. Fold stiffly beaten egg whites into syrupy gelatin mixture. Pour into prepared pan. Sprinkle remaining 1/4 cup crumbs over top. Chill until firm.
