ARRESTED MEN MAY BE HELD 'TIL SEPT. COURT

Carson B. Nixon of Clyde, near Abilene, was recently arrested and placed in the county jail, joining his partner, William E. Rowland, who was arrested July 12. Rowland was apprehended here, and Nixon was turned over to Sheriff Joiner by Goodfellow Field authorities at San Angelo.

The two were in Eldorado, when Rowland was arrested for forgery, and a call sent out for Nixon, who escaped, the arrest following filing of charges by a local business man against the pair. Failing to make bond, the youths will probably be held here until September when district court meets. Rowland, 19 and Nixon, 21, are stationed at Goodfellow Field, San Angelo.

BOARD ELECTS NEW TEACHER FOR HOME EC.

An important post in the Eldorado school set-up has been filled with the election of Miss Ila Sutton of Menard as new home economics teacher.

Miss Sutton is a graduate of the Southwest State College at San Marcos and has a Smith-Hughes certificate.

Miss Sutton taught last year at Menard. She is a relative of Mrs. Earl Cathey and Mrs. C. A. Graves of this city.

Rev. Shilling's Son Is Granted License As Methodist Pastor

Roy Shilling, Jr., son of the Rev. and Mrs. Roy Shilling, was granted a license to preach, at the First Quarterly Conference of the Eldorado Methodist Church Sunday night, upon unanimous recommendation of the congregation.

As far as is known, Roy, Jr., will be the first minister from the Eldorado church. He is 17 years of age and a student at McMurry College, Abilene. While he cannot make definite plans this early, he expects to receive a B. A., then enter a theological school, meanwhile supplying in the pulpit during his college years.

While recommendation of Roy, Jr., was the outstanding accomplishment of the meeting, other important business was also conducted. Reports from church school and church officials were made and the budget adopted for the coming year.

EDMISTONS RETURN FROM VACATION TRIP

RUST RESIGNS PRESIDENCY OF TELEPHONE CO.

John Y. Rust, president of the San Angelo Telephone Company for the past 50 years, announced last Friday his resignation as head of the company, effective August 1. His long-time friends and associate in the business, Don Hunsaker, will be his successor, it was announced.

Rust came to San Angelo in 1898 and built the telephone system from a handful of connections to a modern dial system, serving more than 11,000 telephones. Besides San Angelo, the company serves 18 other exchanges in this area, with a total of 16,000 telephones.

Mr. Rust personally built long distance lines to connect San Angelo and this area with the outside world. Mr. and Mrs. Rust will continue to make their home in San Angelo, and the family will retain its financial interest in the business.

An interesting fact was noted here this week, when on the same day that Mr. Rust announced his resignation, Forrest Runge, who ranches in the Cliff neighborhood, took down a mile and a half of the telephone wire which was in use when Rust acquired the San Angelo telephone system in 1898. It is not known exactly how long the wire had been in use as the line was built by Sol Mayer from San Angelo to his ranch, prior to that time.

The half-century-old wire was replaced by new wire in preparation for the dial system now being installed in the county. The original cedar posts on which the wire was strung, are still in use.

Bollworm Control Stressed by Agent

A heavy infestation of Bollworm has been found in a majority of cotton fields in Schleicher County, according to W. G. Godwin, county agent, who stressed the fact that it is essential that producers know the life history of this insect in order to get complete control.

The moth lays its eggs in early spring. The eggs hatch in three to five days. The young worms attack early crops such as corn, grain sorghums, tomatoes, and other garden vegetables. The worms begin to transfer to cotton when these crops begin to mature and is now called the cotton bollworm. This worm or larva lasts about three weeks then pupates in the ground for two or three weeks, emerges from the ground into the adult stage. Bollworm broods may occur several times during the summer.

Control Measures
County Agent Godwin says the most effective measures are: 20% Chlorinated Camphene, 5% DDT, 3% gamma BHC, and 10% DDT. At least 40% Sulfur should be added to these dusts. The less effective dusts are calcium arsenate, lead arsenate, and cryolite. These dusts should be applied at five day intervals.

The important news for 1948 on cotton insects is the development Toxaphene and Benzene Hexachloride-DDT with Sulfur to give control of all major cotton insect pests. Toxaphene 20% plus 40% sulfur or 3% gamma isomer Benzene Hexachloride plus 5% DDT with 40% Sulfur.

Producers that prefer to use DDT Sulfur, BHC-Sulfur, or the lesser poisons such as calcium and lead arsenate can get good control if other insects show up by switching to the balance control listed in the above paragraph.

Breakfast, dinner and supper will be served every day under the arbor. Preaching will occupy spare time during the day and evening, choice of the preacher for the next service to be made at the close of the preceding preaching hour.

Included in the list of Friendship Association members are the churches in Santa Anna, Stephenville, Eldorado and Zion at Lampasas. Among the pastors expected are three from the Plains: D. L. Hanley, C. L. Jarrett, and Henry Pater-son; from Santa Anna and the Eldorado church, C. H. Richards; from Lampasas, W. N. Lykins and W. T. Jeffrey; from Oklahoma, S. T. Flowers, and others.

The Eldorado Primitive Baptist Church entertained the Association four years ago in their own church. At that time, they spread their tents on a neighbor's lots, on which a new house has recently been put up. To accommodate the crowd, and to provide more roomy camp grounds, the Eldorado church members made arrangements with the Fundamentalists to use their church and grounds one block north of their own property.

SINGING SCHOOL CLOSSES TONIGHT WITH BARBECUE

Good attendance and good singing led by an efficient teacher have been highlights of the ten-day Free Singing School at the West Side Church of Christ which concludes tonight (Thursday) with a barbecue supper and services.

Ralph Guage of Ft. Smith, Ark., has conducted the singing school, which is an annual occasion for the church. Mr. Guage has thoroughly drilled the congregation in the fundamentals of singing, and has ably led the members in both group singing and special numbers. An all day service was held last Sunday with morning worship, followed by dinner on the grounds and evening singing.

A feature of the Tuesday evening session was several special quartets by members and visitors.

NEW MUSIC TEACHER EMPLOYED FOR 1948

Miss Lucille Farmer of Weatherford has been employed as public school music teacher for the coming year. She is a June graduate of North Texas at Denton and comes well recommended. She succeeds Miss Mae Burton in the Eldorado public school system.

PRIMITIVE BAPTISTS HOSTS TO ASS'N HERE

The annual Primitive Baptist Friendship Association will be held in Eldorado, opening Thursday evening and closing at noon Sunday. Services will be held each morning, afternoon and evening at the Fundamental Baptist Church building, with different preachers in charge.

Many of the group, who come from Lamesa, Santa Anna and other churches in the district, will camp on the grounds, as is their custom, and meals will be served to those attending.

Arrangements have been made by local members in charge to use the Fundamental church building, since it has a larger seating capacity than the Primitive Baptist Church, and a more commodious yard.

A crew of men from the church went into action Monday to put up an arbor and prepare the grounds for the sessions. Some visitors will bring their own camping equipment, the local church will put up some tents, and local church members will entertain some in their homes.

RECREATIONAL YOUTH PROGRAM ENDS ON FRIDAY

With Friday's activities, the summer recreational program for the Eldorado and Schleicher County young people and children, will be brought to a close. The directors, Mr. and Mrs. Wilburn Curnutt, left Eldorado Wednesday and Supt. Reynolds will finish out the week.

The program has been carried out with the joint support of the Lions, PTA, and the school. Swimming proved to be the most popular diversion. The high school group made seven swimming trips to San Angelo and Sonora and six skating trips to San Angelo. The elementary school children made 15 swimming trips. Counting the swimming, and skating trips and others, a total of 31 out-of-town trips were made in the school activity bus. In addition, there were many evenings of playground activities.

With enrollment of 46 high school students and 67 elementary, the average attendance was 25 high school and 35 elementary.

Final Plans For X-Rays Fri. & Sat.

P. W. Gauss, field representative with the State Health Department, was in Eldorado last Friday evening to make final arrangements for the mass TB x-rays, scheduled Friday and Saturday of this week. The State Health Department's mobile unit will be on the job Friday morning at 9:00 o'clock at the City Hall, and x-rays will continue through Saturday afternoon.

Every adult in the county from the ages of 15 and over is expected to appear for an x-ray which is an important factor in helping to stamp out the disease. The fact has been pointed out that young children are not required to have x-ray pictures made, as they usually contract the disease from an adult.

Other important factors brought out in regard to the x-rays are that they are absolutely free, require no undressing whatever, and take only two minutes. If anything is found to be wrong, your doctor will be contacted in a confidential report, and further treatment will be advised. If no trouble is found, reports will be made directly to the individual. Everyone will receive a report.

Mrs. S. D. Harper, PTA health committee chairman has been assisted in making arrangements by other PTA members and the Lions Club committee of C. A. Reynolds, E. W. Brooks, Jerry Pennington and Jim Hays. Palmer West, Lum Burk and Jerry Pennington were named as a sub-committee to assist in locating the x-ray committee in the City Hall.

Seniors' Opinions Tabulated By Gilmer - Aikin

The Gilmer-Aikin Committee has announced a tabulation of opinions by high school seniors on teaching as a profession. Since these findings represent the opinions of young people all over the state, they are also an indication of the attitudes of youth in this county, and are therefore reproduced here.

Opinionnaire For High School Seniors

Of the high school graduates of 1948, 5% said they considered teaching as a probability, 10% said they might teach, 18% gave teaching as a third or fourth choice, 67% said definitely they would not teach.

50% said, "I would like to prepare to teach if teachers made \$500 or \$600 a year more than they make now."

Students classified their teachers as follows: 30% of them were classified as excellent, 30% were classified as good, 25% were classified as average, 10% were classified as weak, 5% should not be allowed to teach.

When the teachers the students have now were compared with the desirable teachers: 16% said nearly all met the standard, 30% said most of the teachers met the standard, 40% said about one-third met the standard, 14% said almost none met the standard.

Anita went to San Antonio with the Frank Findlater family of San Angelo whose daughter, Frances, is also a member of the group.

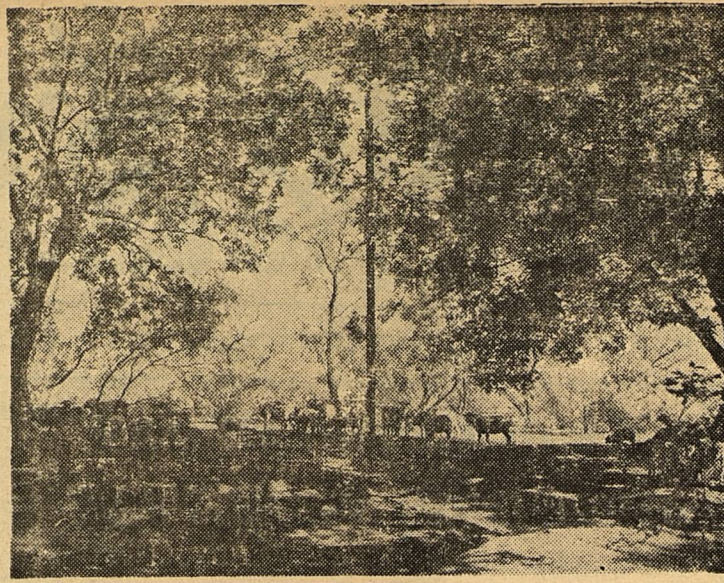

Do You REALLY Love Jesus?

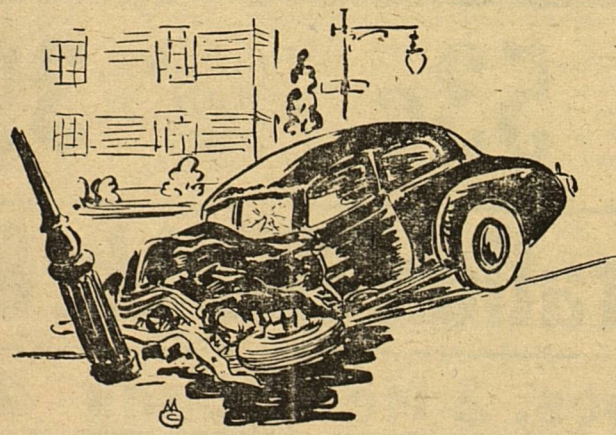

Children Should Have Physical Examination Before School Opens

With the report of 77 new cases of chicken pox, 11 cases of diphtheria, 320 cases of measles, 75 cases of polio, and 199 cases of whooping cough occurring in the state in the week between July 10-17, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has made an appeal to all parents to have their children undergo a thorough physical examination before entering school next month.

The appeal was made to coincide with the announcements of the various opening dates of schools throughout the state.

"It is a medically established fact that a child's health has a direct bearing on his progress in school," the health officer said. "It is no longer sufficient to provide the child with books and new fall clothing. Today we realize the health factor must be considered if the child is to reach his optimum level."

Dr. Cox said that since the child spends most of his time indoors with large groups of children, it is imperative that he be immunized against communicable diseases when such protection is possible. The spread of such diseases is facilitated in congested classrooms.

He said the examination should include a dental check-up and inspection of the eyes, ears, nose and throat. The best health insurance for any child is constant supervision by the family physician and dentist.

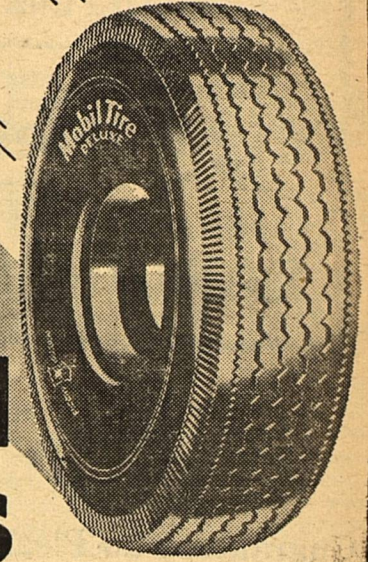
