GOOD CROWD ENROLLED FOR SAFETY COURSE

A very interested and alert group has enrolled for the Shell-sponsored first aid course, which is being taught here this week by Bob Huwiler, of the Shell Pipe Line office at Houston. The group has been meeting each night at the fire hall, and the last session will be tonight (Thursday) with an examination to conclude the week's study. The group had its first session Monday night, in addition to registration, so they would be finished before the football game originally scheduled for Friday night.

Topics studied so far include artificial respiration, control of bleeding, first aid for shock, care of broken bones and bruises, and care of other injuries.

"I have taken four first aid courses, and I think this is the best of all," was the comment made by one member of the group. The entire class is unanimous in its praise of Mr. Huwiler and his clear, interesting explanations and informative class sessions. Many of the group have had other first aid courses at various times and are finding it a very helpful review to take this course.

20 Are Enrolled For Child Guidance Extension Course

Twenty people have enrolled so far in the extension course in Child Guidance which is being taught during the next few months at the Eldorado school. Teacher for the course, which is under sponsorship of Sul Ross College, is Dr. J. B. Speer, extension director there.

The course is aimed for those who want to understand children and young people better. The development of the child in all ways, including physical, mental and emotional growth, will be discussed and explained. Textbook used is "Basic Principles of Guidance". It is hoped that those completing the course, because of a better understanding of their children and of the basic principles of guidance, will be better equipped to direct and guide the youth of the community.

The course is to be taught like a workshop. In addition to the lecture periods, those teachers taking the course will be able to work at the level of the children in their rooms, and mothers can do the same with their own children.

The course, which is a "300" course, gives three hours college credit at the junior, senior, or graduate level.

It is emphasized, however, that anyone, no matter whether he has ever gone to college or not, is eligible to enroll for the course. School officials are in hopes that a number of mothers, who are interested in better understanding their children, will enroll.

Since class periods have not yet started, there is still time for anyone to join the class. The group will meet next on Thursday night, October 7, at the school, from 7:00 to 10:00, and all those interested in enrolling should be present at that time. The classes will meet some times once a month, and sometimes twice, until all twelve class periods have been completed.

COMPLAINT FILED ON SEGREGATION IN SCHOOLS HERE

State Department of Education deputy Jack Humphreys was here Tuesday, as the result of filing of a complaint by local Latin Americans, on school segregation, the complaint having been made recently to the governor and the State Department of Education.

In the complaint the district was charged with operating a separate school for Latin Americans. In addition to meeting with some of the local school officials Tuesday afternoon, Deputy Humphreys visited the Latin American school. He stated that he would include in his report confirmation of the charge, but could not state what further disposition might be made of the case.

Schleicherites will recall that Judge Rice handed down a decision recently in which maintaining of segregated schools in Texas was forbidden.

This trip to Eldorado was a special trip for Deputy Humphreys, who will go out on routine visits later in the year.

Game Scrimmage To Be Held Here Friday Afternoon

Eagles Tie Eden In Hard Fought Game Here Friday Night

A capacity crowd filled the bleachers at the Eldorado football field, to see a close and hard-fought game between the Eldorado Eagles and the Eden Bulldogs, a game which ended with a 13-13 score.

The Eagles, showing steady improvement, were in good form and gave evidence of careful training by Coaches Ted Kirby and Bud Hopkins.

Neither team scored during the first half. During the third quarter, a pass from James Alexander to Bill Jones was responsible for the first touchdown; and in the last quarter Gordon Hamm went across Eden's goal line for another six points plus an extra point for the kick by Alexander.

Eden made a touchdown during the third quarter and another during the fourth, and also made the conversion point by a place kick in the fourth.

Both teams took to the air a number of times during both halves of the game.

Eldorado - Bronte Game Postponed

Oil Test Near Opp Planned

A shallow test in the vicinity of the old Opp well near Eldorado is scheduled, and location has been staked off this week, 2 miles northwest of Eldorado.

This will be Skelly Oil Company's second test on the 3264 acre block on Jackson land acquired last year from Ralph Lowe of Midland.

No. 1 Mary L. Jackson will be 1650 feet from N, 2310 from W of sec. 41, block LL, Texas Central Ry. Co. survey. Rotary drilling to 4200 in Pennsylvania is planned.

This test will be 645 feet south and 900 feet west of the Opp no. 1 J. T. Jackson, which nine years ago pumped oil from the Cisco at 4049-81 feet. The Opp well was short lived. A year ago Skelly drilled a barren test 1 3-4 miles south-west of the Opp Jackson well in Sec. 43 - LL-GC&SF.

Humble and Sinclair Prairie have leased considerable acreage in the vicinity of Skelly no. 1 Jackson.

Thirty boys are coming out for the junior team.

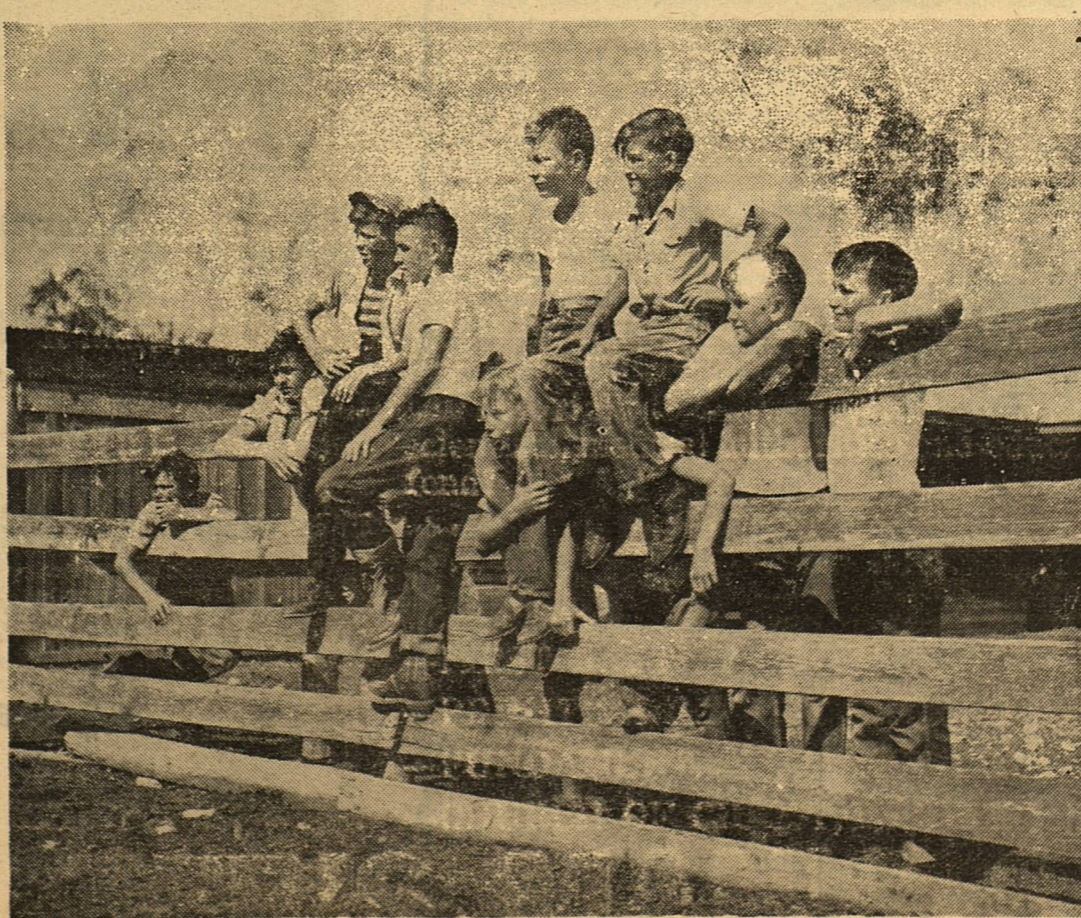
Pioneer Dance Club To Reorganize Tonight

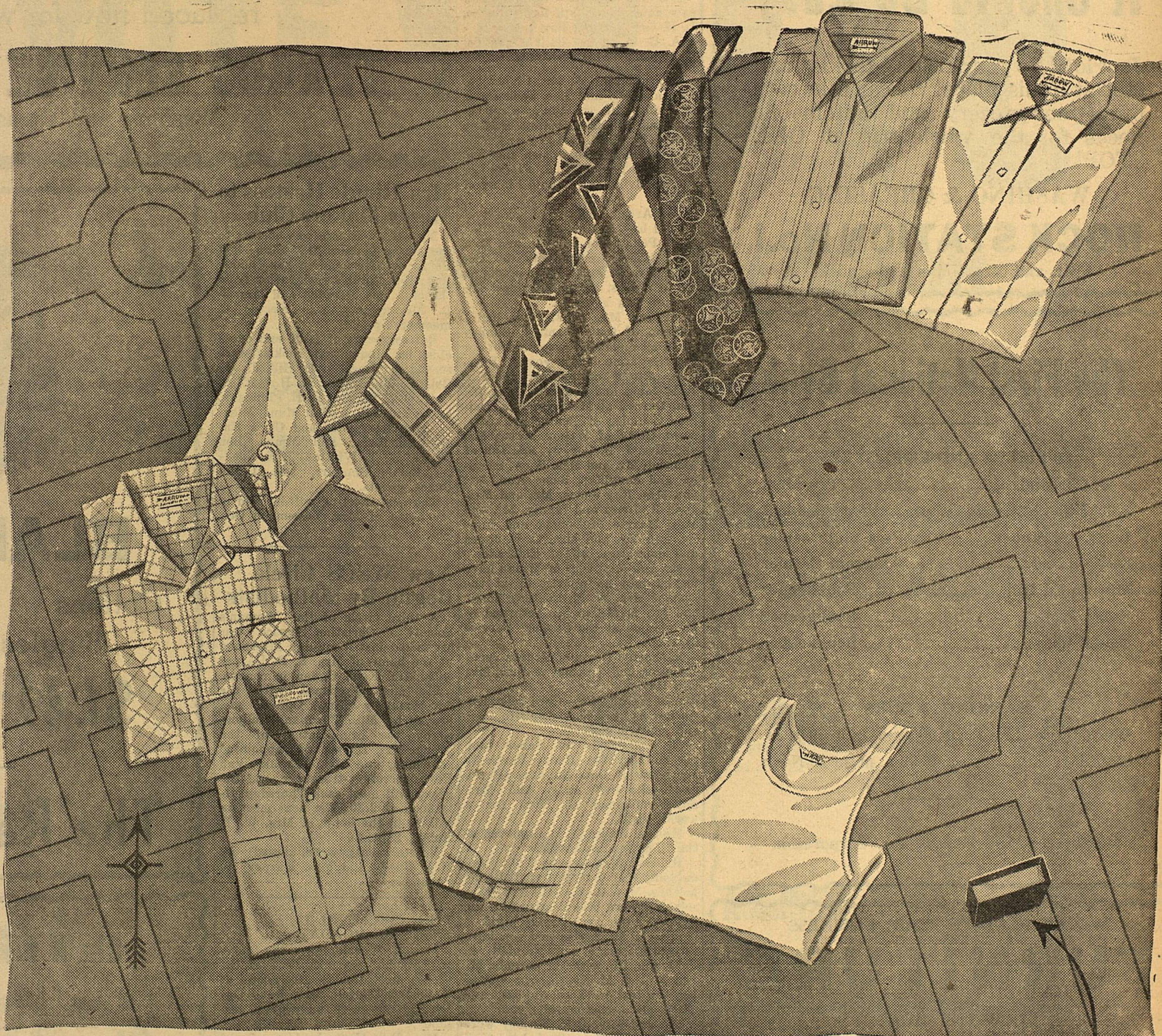

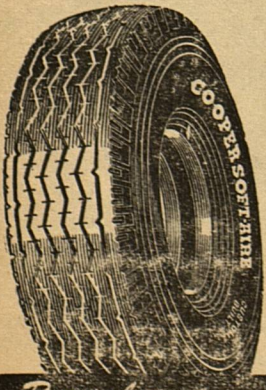

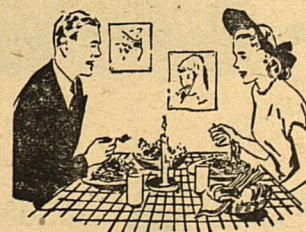

S. C. District Election

There will be an election for a District Supervisor for Zone 5 of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District Tuesday, October 5, at Cliff school at 2:00 p. m. This position has been occupied by J. Forrest Runge.

Zone 5 includes all landowners in the portion of the district east of the San Angelo highway and north of the Eldorado-Ft. McKavett road.

Every landowner in this zone should attend the meeting and help elect a qualified supervisor. Your presence and assistance in electing your board member will give him the assurance that you are not only interested in this kind of work but are also back of him in representing the people from your part of the district. Only landowners and their wives are qualified to vote in the election.

The district supervisors run the business of the Soil Conservation district and can call upon and receive aid from any state or federal agency which has technical help or equipment to assist farmers and ranchers work out conservation plans.

A short field trip will be conducted by the county agent and work unit conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service immediately after the election of the supervisor.

Present supervisors for the Schleicher County portion of the district include: B. E. Moore in zone 3, Archie Mittel in zone 4, and J. Forrest Runge in zone 5.

Make your plans to attend the election meeting and cast your vote for your representative on the board of supervisors.

SEGREGATION RULING

The ruling which the state has handed down on maintaining of separate schools for any except colored children, reads in part, as follows:

"The regulations, customs, usages and practices of any county, city, town or school district segregating pupils of Mexican or other Latin American descent in separate classes or schools are (arbitrary, discriminatory, and) in violation of the constitutional rights guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, and are hereby forbidden."

"These instructions and the above mentioned judgement recognized that it is permissible to have separate classes in the first grade for any students who have language difficulties . . ."

Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District News

Clyde Vinson, a cooperater of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District, has planted approximately 35 acres of madril clover as a part of his planned well rounded conservation program.

Madril clover is a hardly biennial yellow variety of clover which is a lower growing, leafier, finer-stemmed clover, and has an early seeding vigor which makes it desirable for droughty conditions. Madril clover is used for hay, grazing, and as a soil improving crop.

The clover was planted in 38 inch rows, ½ inch deep, three pounds per acre with a special planter that has been devised by the district and made available to co-operators of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District.

Farris Nixon did the planting and Soil Conservation Service technicians assisted in inoculating the seed and making adjustments of the planter.

Fall deferment of his house pasture was started early in September by W. R. Nicks on his ranch east of Eldorado as a part of his range conservation program in cooperation with the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District.

Mr. Nicks plans to defer the pasture until frost in order to give the better grasses a chance to reseed themselves and produce a reserve of feed for winter use.

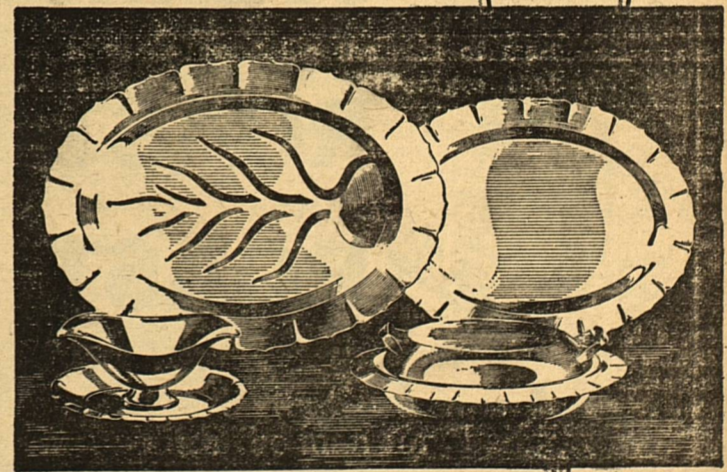

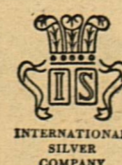

Pet Apple Pie

Broadcast: October 2, 1948
2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3/4 cup shortening
1/2 cup Pet Milk
1/4 cup water
6 cups pared apples, thinly sliced
1 cup sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon

Sift flour with 1 teaspoon salt. Work in shortening. When mixture has appearance of small peas, stir in gradually mixture of 1/4 cup milk and the water. On floured board, roll half of pastry into a 10-inch round. Fit loosely into a deep 9-inch pie pan. Trim, if necessary. Put apples into large bowl. Pour over remaining 1/4 cup milk. With spoon, turn apples gently over and over until all are coated with the milk. Then fold in a mixture of sugar, cinnamon and remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt. Put into pastry-lined pie pan. Roll remaining pastry into 10-inch round. Fold in half; with tip of knife cut several gashes along fold. Moisten edges of pastry in pan with water. Unfold pastry loosely over apples, being careful not to stretch. Fold edge of upper pastry under lower edge. Pinch with fingers to make fancy edge. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) on shelf slightly above center 10 minutes. Reduce heat to slow (325° F.) and bake 50 minutes longer, or until apples are tender and pastry is brown. Cool before cutting.
