GRAIN SORGHUM LOAN RATE SET AT \$2.25 PER CWT.

The Eldorado Triple A office announces that a loan rate of \$2.25 per cwt has been set on the 1948 grain sorghum crop.

The bonded warehouse of the San Angelo Wool Co., in San Angelo has been designated as point of delivery. At present the bank at Eldorado is not acting as a lending agency but the San Angelo National Bank is acting as one. It is quite likely that Schleicher County will not have farm storage loans.

Bangs - TB Tests Scheduled Friday

W. G. Godwin, county agent, reports that he has had a nice response to hearticle in last week's paper in regard to the Bangs and TB tests, with 122 cows turned in for the tests which will be made Friday, Aug. 27.

Dr. Ginrick, veterinarian, will be in charge of the work, and on the following Monday, as stated previously, 72 hours afterwards, the tests will be examined to determine if the cow has either disease. All animals reacting to the Bangs disease, will be branded with a large B, and all tubercular cows will be branded with a large T on the left jaw. Those not reactors to either disease, will have tags placed in their left ears, to show that they have been inspected.

That is the urgent request of Schleicher County leaders as the election date draws near. The school election will be held at the courthouse for all voters.

The bonds would provide funds for a new high school building — also a new wing on the elementary building, improvements in Latin American and Negro schools, and new furnishings and playground improvements.

School officials who have studied the situation report over-crowding from first grade up through the high school. The State Department of Education strongly recommends a building program to relieve congestion and thus provide better educational facilities for the youth of the county.

The Eldorado school accommodates all school children in Schleicher County. Crowding caused by normal increase in population and by annexation has created an acute situation which only expansion can relieve.

Three propositions will be voted on:

1. Issuing of \$476,000 in school buildings bonds.
2. Levying of \$1.50 countywide tax rate.
3. Assuming of \$41,000 existing indebtedness by entire district.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE TAXPAYERS OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY:

The proposal for a \$476,000 bond issue (for all practical purposes that's 1/2 million) deserves serious consideration before voting date of Saturday, August 28th

In any business whether it be City, County, State or Federal or an individual's private affairs, the goal should be to get "your money's worth." Under today's inflated conditions it just can't be done.

As of today you can probably build a fine \$10,000 house for \$50,000, or a \$100,000 school plant for a half a million dollars.

Our real danger is in allowing ourselves to slip into the comfort-able belief that we have entered another "new era" in which the only direction we can go is up. We have been on the elevator for nine years and this could be a pretty good point to get off and leisurely walk down a few flights. A little patient waiting is bound to save the County several hundred of thousands of dollars in obtaining a new school plant.

The need for a new school plant definitely exists, but we don't want to pay for it five times with a 1933 to 1935 dollar. And this could happen.

When the tide turns, AND IT WILL, and we have hard time to contend with, with many of our own County people glad to get a job, THEN let's build a much needed school plant, and a good one, for a fifth of the cost today.

The bond issue of \$476,000 is not for just one building. Approximately \$372,000 will be used for a Junior-Senior High School. The balance will be used to make extensions to the present elementary school, improve the Negro school and build an elementary school for the students in the Latin-American section.

It will not be necessary to raise valuations on property if the \$1.50 rate is voted to retire the building bonds and pay maintenance costs, if present conditions continue to exist.

If the bond issue does not carry it will be necessary to raise valuations to meet present maintenance costs.

On the basis of 100% collections only 40c of the extra 50c will be needed to retire the bonds. The balance will be used to pay increased operating costs.

If operating costs go down it would be possible to lower the tax rate.

By voting the \$1.50 tax rate now the present indebtedness for buses can be retired and the district can be saved some interest money.

At least 50% of the bond issue will be paid for by non-residents of Schleicher County.

1 1/2 lbs. round steak, 1-in. thick	1/4 cup hot shortening
1 1/4 teaspoons salt	2 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup Pet Milk	1/2 cup liquid off peas, or water
1/2 cup fine corn flake crumbs	2 cups drained peas, cooked or canned

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Cut steak into pieces for serving. Sprinkle mixture of 1/4 teasp. salt and few grains pepper on both sides of meat. Dip, one piece at a time, in milk. Save remaining milk for gravy. Roll in corn flake crumbs. Brown on both sides in hot shortening in heavy skillet. Cover; bake about 1 hour, or until tender. Remove to platter; keep hot. Blend flour and few grains pepper into liquid in skillet. Stir in liquid off peas. Boil slowly and stir 2 min. Measure milk left from dipping meat; add enough to make 1/2 cup. Stir into hot flour mixture; add peas. Heat thoroughly but do not boil. Serve at once with the meat. Makes 4 servings.

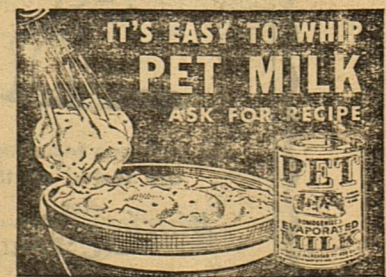
