

A little patient waiting is bound to save the County several hundred of thousands of dollars in obtaining a

new school plant. The need for a new school plant definitely exists, but we don't want to pay for it five times with a 1933 to 1935 dollar. And this could happen.

When the tide turns, AND IT WILL, and we have hard time to contend with, with many of our own County people glad to get a job, THEN let's build a much needed school plant, and a good one, for a fifth of the cost today.




