## NEW TROOPS ARE ORGANIZED FOR SCOUTING

Expansion of Scouting activities for Schleicher County follows increased interest on the part of local sponsors, working under direction of Scout Executive J. B. Morris of Del Rio.

Mr. Morris spent Tuesday in Eldorado, and went on to Sonora Tuesday night, after working with local troops and committees during the day.

Two new troops have been organized here, which substantially expands the Scout program in the city.

Under sponsorship of a group of citizens from the Latin American community, a Mexican troop of Boy Scouts has been organized.

John Minor is chairman and Scoutmaster, with Arturo Espinosa assistant. Other citizens on the committee are Antonio Munoz, Juan Espinosa, and Jesus Minor. Scouts are Antonio Flores, Ramiro Munoz, Lupe Garcia, Pablo Burrola Alberto Munoz, Hervey Minor, and Rinaldo Robledo.

The regular meeting place for this troop is the neighborhood school house. The boys are already at working on their tenderfoot ranks, and interest is increasing throughout the Mexican settlement.

Four dens compose the new pack of Cub Scouts, organized under Frank Prochaska as Cub Master, and R. J. Alexander as assistant.

Twenty three boys and nine parents attended the organizational meeting here Tuesday, with J. B. Morris assisting, and more boys are expected to join the group.

Den mothers are Mrs. Jerry Pennington, Mrs. Buster Dickens, and Mrs. C. C. McLaughlin of Eldorado, and Mrs. W. C. Parks, working with three dens in town and one composed of boys riding the bus. Meeting time is arranged at the convenience of the den mother.

Each den picks its own den chief, and a den dad. The entire program revolves around home and family life. Once each month all meet together and judge each other's achievements.

By Nov. 22, when Mr. Morris will return, all will try to be Bobcats, after which they can be initiated as Cubs. This will be the first official pack meeting. There will also be a meeting of den chiefs with Morris, Nov. 9.

The Eldorado Scouts, with Pat Joiner as Scout master, are making plans for a camping trip, probably to Coke County, near Robert Lee, in the near future. Total membership of the troop is about 34, since recent addition of Scouts Kidwell, Pennington and Logan to the roll.

## LICENSE TAGS FOR LOCAL DOGS DUE NOVEMBER 1

Chief of Police Roy Andrews calls attention to the fact that the \$5 license fee for dogs is due on Nov. 1. He also states that this year the license will cover a 14-month period, so the expiration date will fall thereafter on the first of the year.

Mr. Andrews reports he has had to kill quite a few stray dogs during the past year, and that packs of dogs continue to make forays among the sheep on local ranches. An example of the damage done is cited in a picture on page 5, in which 7 dead sheep and 5 dogs which were killed are shown.

Mr. Andrews states that he will be glad to pick up stray dogs, when they are reported by local people, keep them for several days, and give them to anyone who would like to have a dog and who would pay the license fee to protect it. He suggests that local people leave their names with him if they want a dog.

Eldorado citizens will remember that all dogs must wear new plates, beginning with the new month.

## CO. JUDGE URGES VOTERS REPEAL AD VALOREM TAX

An appeal to voters to pass HJR 24, a constitutional amendment which will repeal the 30 cent ad valorem tax for state purposes, to be voted on Nov. 2, is being made by County Judge C. L. Meador Jr. This will require a vote "FOR" the amendment no. 7 as it appears on the ballot, Judge Meador said.

"This is the first opportunity the county government has ever had to increase its own revenues without adding to the over-all tax burden of the people," the judge said.

"Schleicher County will be allowed to keep this revenue at home for use in soil and water conservation, farm-to-market roads, and municipal water supply development. This diversion will not injure the state, which now has a surplus estimated at \$100 million because this surplus represents an amount equal to almost ten years collections of the present ad valorem tax."

Every other Saturday, at one farm or another, the pit is dug, and the fire started. And by sundown, neighbors from miles around have come together—the women

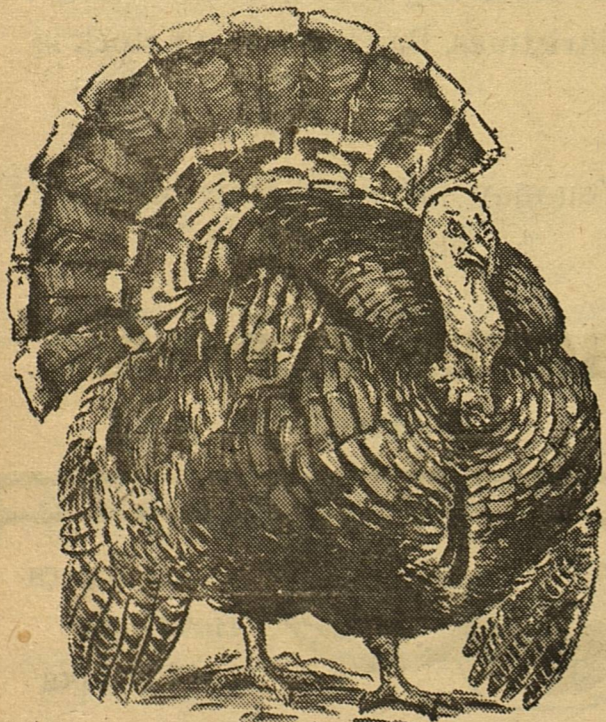
contributing cakes, pies, and coffee, the men contributing the meat for barbecuing, and the beer or ale.

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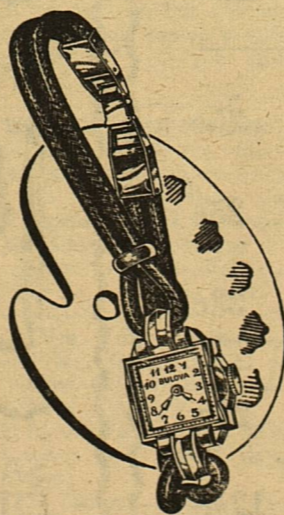
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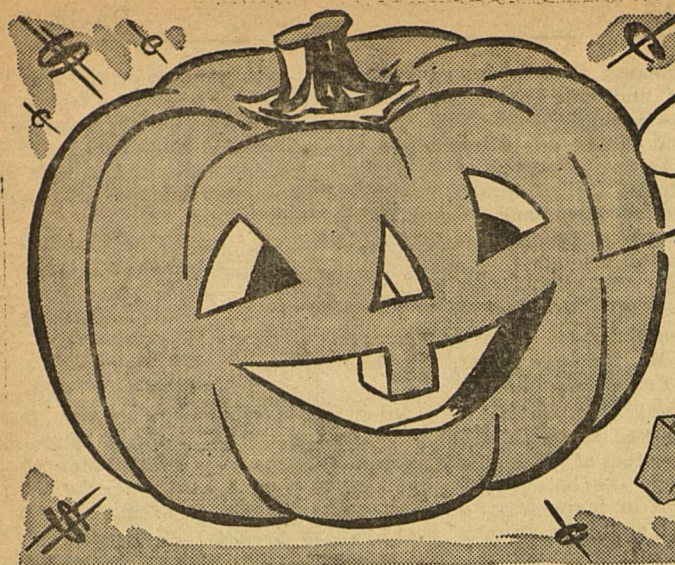

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
