NEW LINES ENERGIZED BY CO-OP CREW

Last week the linemen of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op, Inc., strung wire and energized lines to the following ranches: Reginald Atkinson, Joe Shaw, R. S. Williams (DeLong Ranch), Lake Tankersley and Fred Smith. The Atkinson and Shaw ranches are located in Irion County.

These lines were the last of the Co-Op's Section C line extensions totaling 112 miles of line and were built by Force Account (Co-Op crew) thereby saving the members several thousand dollars, for the lines belong to the members, who use the service and not the U. S. Government as some reports indicate.

Since starting Force Account construction the Co-Op has built and energized 131 miles of line to serve 121 members. The crew has 34 miles of poles set on Section D that will serve the Cliff and Rudd communities and will take total of 48 miles to serve the members signed on this section.

No. 4ACSR 7-1 (Aluminum wire) is the only bottleneck in line construction. According to a letter received from Aluminum Company of America, the Co-Op's order of 228,400 pounds of wire will probably be shipped about May 15, 1949. This is enough wire to build 317 miles of single phase line.

AUTO RACES AT SAN ANGELO SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 21

Southwest championship auto races will be held Sunday afternoon November 21, at Ram Speedbowl, San Angelo. The program of eight events will be climaxed by a 20-lap feature race.

Leading cars and drivers in Texas and New Mexico have sent in their entries, according to Johnnie Lee, who is in charge of the races. A. M. Farris, San Angelo, who met with considerable success at the last races held at Ram Speedbowl, is among the early entries. He will be driving a new car which has shown up very well in its two previous appearances this season at other Texas race tracks.

Oil News

Koy 3-E, east offset to D1, a producer, is down to about 4600 feet. Western Drilling Co. is spudding surface hole on Koy D2. Shirley Miller Drilling Co. are here, at work on the Jackson well, on which surface pipe has been set and rig moved in.

Of interest to Schleicherites is the news that a well has been brought in on the Claude Lithium place 6 miles west of San Angelo. The Jackson test near Eldorado is now past 2000 feet, and drilling is proceeding rapidly. Shirley Miller who is drilling the test has his headquarters in Sonora.

On the McBurnett place, surface hole has been completed and pipe set, but the rig has not yet arrived. Cole Durden will do the drilling.

Sorrells Oil Co. was below 350 with cable tool, Wednesday, on the Mrs. J. E. Tisdale place (660 ft. out of nw sec 10, block A, HE & WTRR Co.). The location is 4 1/2 miles west and south of the Koy-Page field.

Globe Oil Well Drilling Co. started moving in on the Tom Henderson wildcat, location for which was made several weeks ago. Water well rig, and eight or ten trucks of equipment arrived Wednesday afternoon and this morning.

An outpost to the producing field, on Hendersons, (C NW NW 26-L-GH&SA), one mile SE of Cooper 6A Page) drilled by Western Drilling, is on rotary and down to 2100 feet Wednesday.

Henderson's has recently been connected with the gas line to San Angelo.

Well authenticated reports indicate that there will be two more Schleicher wildcats, on locations to be announced.

SC MEETING POSTPONED

Because of rains in San Angelo last week's SC Field Day was postponed to next Monday, at 1:00 p. m. As much of the meeting as could be held indoors was staged in the college auditorium. Everyone is urged to attend next week's meeting.

A number of visiting Soil Conservation experts from Washington, D. C., Ft. Worth, and other places were on the program, and Cong. O. C. Fisher was also present. J. F. Runge of this county was in general charge of the program.

DEER HUNTERS ACCIDENTALLY FIND A BIT OF EARLY TEXAS HISTORY ON McWHORTER RANCH AT SALT FLAT

Many years ago, a prudent hunter in Culberson County carefully packed a battered pail with provisions, hid it under a rock, and left it in a small cave. And last week—perhaps 75 or 100 years later—the pail was discovered by two local men who had stopped to rest after hunting deer for several days in the vicinity.

In their excitement the finders, Bobby Calhoun and Hal Whitten, forgot all about deer hunting—a fact which in itself is news!

The locality was the McWhorter Ranch near Salt Flats, Culberson County. In the hunting party were Sam and Bobby Calhoun of Christoval, Willie, Lewis and Morris Whitten, Leslie Baker, Seth Ramsey, Tiny Godwin, Ben Morris of Ft. Davis, Bill McWhorter and Harlan Graves.

Following several days of hunting the men were putting in a routine hunting day, after dividing into groups. To young Bobby Calhoun of Christoval and Hal Whitten fell the good fortune of finding what is a treasure in the hunting world—a hunter's provision, an old blackened pail containing supplies for making ammunition, plus several plugs of tobacco.

The locality, 75 miles north of Kent, in Culberson County, has numerous caves, and in one of these the men found the old blackened pail, of about a gallon capacity, with broken pieces in the top edge indicating that it had at one time been equipped with a bail.

The pail was packed with dry grass which looks like side-oat grama, and on this dry grass were several plugs of chewing tobacco which had been hand packed in two sizes of moulds; strips of lead for the bullets, with "Madalena Mountain" stamped on the inside of the horseshoe shaped pieces; several hand-made bullets; two old round boxes of caps with printing only partially readable, the decipherable part reading "UMC Union Metallic

Cattle Here Face A Hard Winter, Says Co. Agent

Schleicher County cattle, both beef and dairy, face a hard winter.

In average years cattle enter the winter months in good shape after feeding on green grass. This year, however, many cattle are already suffering from a lack of green feed. There just hasn't been any.

Many cows are now carrying calves and may not be up to the task of giving birth and taking care of the young.

A good feeding program by stockmen will have to be the answer, according to Co. Agent W. G. Godwin. In addition to protein feeding, plenty of good quality hay should be kept on hand. If possible, hay with a good green color is recommended. If the stockman cannot get a good green hay such as alfalfa, some other source of vitamin A should be furnished with the ration.

Only a well planned feeding program can keep down death losses in both cows and calves.

LOCAL COMPANY SELLS WOOL AT 50c TO 71c

The Eldorado Wool Company reports sales for the past week covering approximately 160,000 pounds of 1948 fine wools at prices ranging from 50c to 71c per pound for 12-months wool. Participating in the purchases were B. W. Oglesby representing Fred Whitaker Co., Philadelphia; C. A. McDonald representing J. B. DuPont and Company, Boston, Mass.; and Wm. J. Fields buying for Albert A. Schneider, Inc., Boston, Mass.

The local wool warehouse has remaining on hand unsold as yet approximately 90,000 pounds of spring 12-months fine, and about 10,000 pounds of medium wools. Wools of finer than 64s grade were in strong demand during the spring and have been fairly active during the buying movement the past week; however the lower grades and mediums continue to be very slow and there is practically no demand for them.

Program On Home Given At P. T. A.

"The Home — A Place to develop responsibility and safety" was the theme for the regular meeting of the Parent Teachers Association in the school auditorium Tuesday afternoon.

County Judge C. L. Meador, Jr., who was sponsor for the program, presented Capt. Ray Butler of the Highway Patrol who gave a talk on safety. Capt. Butler appraised Schleicher County as being one of the three counties in his district without a fatal accident so far this year, and urged the PTA to cooperate with the Highway Department and with schools in a program of safety.

In the business session, a committee composed of Wyndell Hall, Mrs. D. C. Royster and Mrs. Don Severns was appointed to investigate the playground equipment to see what repairs are needed. Mrs. J. C. Ratliff, president, announced the State Teachers' meeting in Dallas the week end of Thanksgiving, and it was voted to change the next meeting date from Tuesday, Dec. 21 to Tuesday, Dec. 14 at 7:30 p. m., when the annual Christmas program will be observed.

It was also announced that Mrs. W. J. Humphrey was attending the State PTA convention in El Paso this week, as a delegate.

Co. Recommendations Of Gilmer Committee To Be Tabulated

The Gilmer Aikin Committee, in session recently, discussed the 33 proposal for improvement of Texas schools which has been worked out on the basis of Gilmer Aikin recommendations.

The committee will contact as many people as they can, to get the consensus of opinion in this county, and forward results of their survey to the state headquarters for tabulation.

Submitted to the people for their consideration are 33 proposals to give Texas the best possible public schools it can afford. The Gilmer-Aikin Committee is now asking all citizens to contact their County Gilmer-Aikin committee members early next week and to study with them these proposals.

"The members of the Gilmer-Aikin Committee appreciate the fine work done by the citizens of Texas in this report and hope that they will approve the recommendations submitted. When approved by the people, they will be recommended to the Legislature for adoption and then written into law," said Senator Taylor.

The survey made by the county committees of the state has revealed some interesting figures.

At present only about 68 counties in Texas operate all of their schools a full nine months each year. The tentative report calls for a minimum of 12 years of public school education of 9 months each available to every child from the age of six to high school graduation.

This minimum program calls for a competent teacher for each 25 pupils in average daily attendance. These teachers must be professionally trained.

There would be available: One counsellor for each 500 pupils. One full-time librarian for each 500 pupils. One graduate nurse for each 2000 pupils.

Instructional supervisors, highly-trained, at the rate of one for each 50 teachers. A specially trained full-time principal for each school of 12 or more teachers; for smaller schools, a proportionate provision.

Transportation for pupils residing more than 1 1/2 or 2 miles from a school building. A system superintendent of schools, properly qualified as a professional leader, in systems of 25 or more teachers. In smaller systems, the principalship and superintendency should be combined.

preserved in every aspect, big or little—whether it's the right to vote, or the right to enjoy a temperate glass of beer or ale with friends.

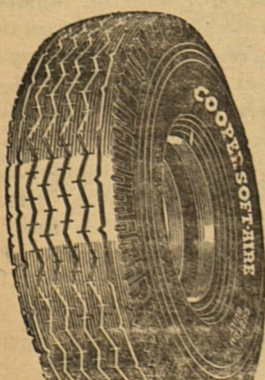
