Military Honors At Reynolds Funeral Today

A military funeral was held this afternoon, Thursday, at the First Baptist Church, for Sgt. Raymond Reynolds, whose body arrived in San Angelo by train at 7:30 Wednesday morning, Dec. 1, 1948 and was brought to Eldorado by Ratliff at about 9:00. A military escort arrived with the body and remained here until after the funeral.

Officiating at the funeral was Rev. Jim Hays, with Mrs. Hays in charge of a double quartet: Mr. and Mrs. Ervin Mund, C. F. Jones, W. T. Whitten, Mrs. Roy Andrews, Nolan McDonald, Mrs. Bill Rountree and Mrs. Hays.

The Eldorado American Legion conducted military graveside rites. Color bearers were H. W. Scott and Arthur Tree; color guards, Bob McWhorter and Lester Early; pall bearers, Clyde Keeney, Don McCormick, Doug Yates, Thos. Baker, Rance McDonald and Lum Davis; firing squad commander, Clifford Schooley; firing squad, Alvin Farris, Chas. Newman, Lloyd Johnson, Ben Doty, Albert and Elton McGinnes, Gene McCullough, and Bill Rountree; buglers, C. F. Jones and James W. McDonald.

The firing squad and color bearers and guards were in formation outside the church. At the cemetery, Lum Davis and Rance McDonald folded the flag and the firing squad fired three volleys; the buglers played echo taps at the grave. Davis presented the flag to the escort, Sgt. Rushing, who presented it, as a gift, to Reynolds' nearest of kin, his mother, Mrs. M. M. Reynolds.

All Legionnaires were honorary pall bearers.

The family received notification of the time of arrival of the body Friday evening.

Sgt. Reynolds died May 13, 1944, two days after a raid on Corsica. His body was shipped to this county from a cemetery near Rome.

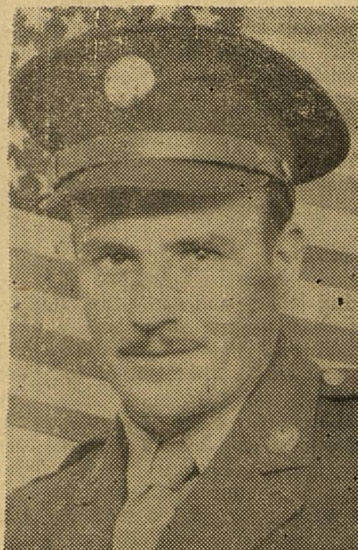

MR. AND MRS. ATKINS, WEDDED FIFTY YEARS, TO HOLD OPEN HOUSE TO THEIR FRIENDS AT THEIR HOME ON SUNDAY

In observance of 50 years of married life, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Atkins will hold open house at their home Sunday from 2:00 to 5:00 p. m. in honor of their Golden Wedding Anniversary. Assisting them will be relatives and numerous friends.

All friends of the family are invited to call.

It was on Nov. 30, 1898, that Dora Lee Rice became the bride of Alfred James Atkins at the bride's home in Moody with the Rev. Dunn, Presbyterian pastor, officiating. The bride, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Rice, was born near Rodgers, Ark., moving later to Moody, Texas where she received her education. Atkins, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Atkins, was born at Dalton, Ga., later moving with his family to Moody where he attended high school and met his bride.

On the second day of their marriage, as the couple were going to the bridegroom's home for the "In-fair", a dinner honoring them on the second day of married life and a custom at that time, an amusing incident took place which the couple now laugh at when they recall their unhappy plight. Atkins was driving a buggy with a spirited pair of horses, which became frightened at some object. In attempting to quiet them the bridegroom, always deathly afraid of horses, grew excited and jumped out of the buggy, calling to his bride to "Jump out, Sugar". But "Sugar", who was holding in her hands a very valuable lamp, a wedding present from her sister-in-law, could only lool' in astonishment at her newly wed husband, whose ankles had become tangled in the lines and who could only run helplessly along the road. Fortunately, neighbors spied their plight, and rescued the bridegroom and his bride, still clinging to her wedding lamp.

Following their marriage, the couple moved to Georgetown where he entered Southwestern University, receiving his education there. They later returned to Moody where Atkins was appointed rural route mail carrier for the second route established in Texas, the first having been at Hillsboro. On

the route, Mr. Atkins drove a trim, well-equipped hack, pulled by a team of red mules with striped legs. The hack was fitted with neat pigeon holes for the mail, and carried stamps for the convenience of the people on the route.

While at Moody, the young mail carrier also learned the lumber business, working in the yards there at odd times when off duty. In 1907, they moved to Miles, where he became manager of the South Texas Lumber Company, and also worked up four rural mail routes which were recommended and approved by a government inspector. In the depression which followed, the lumber yard was sold, and the couple moved once again, coming to Eldorado in 1910 where he became manager of the West Texas Lumber Co., owned by the late B. B. Hail, where he stayed until 1928. At that time, he was appointed Eldorado post master, with his daughter, Mrs. H. T. Bird, as assistant. He held this position for five years.

In 1935 he was elected to the position of city secretary, city and school tax assessor and collector, and still holds this office. He also serves the city as municipal judge.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Atkins became members of the Methodist Church early in life, and both have been active in church work since that time. Mr. Atkins served as Sunday School superintendent for approximately 25 years, and is now superintendent emeritus, and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Church. He was a school trustee for several years, and is a member of the IOOF and the WOW.

Mrs. Atkins is a former Sunday School teacher, a past president of the Woman's Club, the Parent Teachers Association, and is still active in club work, the OES, and the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

In addition to their daughter, Mrs. H. T. Bird of San Angelo, the couple have one granddaughter, Mrs. Robert E. Horn, Jr. of San Angelo and a great-granddaughter, Judy La Verne Horn. They lost one son in infancy.
