

Parking also is permissible against the court-yard wall on all four sides. New parking regulations probably will be determined later when the fourlane work is completed. - Mason County News.

Members of the council said Wednesday night that the river has stopped flowing and that unless rain is received within 30 days it is very likely that the springs supplying the present source of water will dry up. -Menard News.
