

FISHER GETS RETURNS FROM QUESTIONNAIRE

MOST of the people in the 21st district believe we cannot "go it alone" in the struggle against world communism. They believe overwhelmingly that further communist expansion in the Far East and in Europe would endanger American security here at home. Ninety percent of them approve American participation in the Atlantic Pact and the joint defense under General Eisenhower.

These reactions are disclosed in the more than 12,000 responses to the questionnaires which I recently sent to the people in our 27-county district.

More than 25% of those to whom polls were sent returned them, several thousand with interesting and revealing comments. This is probably the highest percentage of responses ever recorded in a Congressional polling operation of this nature. The average, I am told, runs 10 to 15 percent.

PMA payments to farmers and ranchmen to help pay for certain range practices would be substantially reduced if the pollsters had their way about it. On that issue the vote was 76% for reduction, 20% against, and 4% with no opinion. In a further break-down by occupation, the tabulation reveals that among farmers and ranchmen 72% favor the PMA reduction, 25% oppose, and 3% have no opinion. In occupations other than ranching and farming, the score was 77% for, 17% against and 6% with no opinion.

Answers to the first two questions reveal numbers of modified answers, many pointing out that military considerations were involved which called for expert judgment.

By questions, here are the results:

1. Do you favor an amendment to the Constitution removing from the President the exclusive authority which the constitution now gives him for making appointments and replacements of military Field Commanders? Yes 53%, No 43%.

2. Do you subscribe to General MacArthur's proposal that there be: (1) intensification of our economic blockade against China and the imposition of a naval blockade against the China coast; (2) removal of restrictions on air reconnaissance of China's coastal areas and of Manchuria; and (3) removal of restrictions on the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa with logistical support to contribute to their effective operation against the Chinese mainland? Yes 69%, No 19%.

3. Do you consider the prevention of Communist expansion in the Far East as being vital to our American security? Yes 91%, No 5%.

4. Do you believe that a year from now the United States will be in a better position, relatively speaking, to wage a global war—if one is forced upon us—than at present? Yes 73%, No 17%.

5. Do you think the U. S. should take steps now to build up an army of Japanese soldiers to be ready to fight the Communists if Japan is attacked? Yes 90%, No 5%.

6. Do you regard the continued independence of Western European countries and their freedom from Russian control as being vital to our own American security? Yes 95%, No 4%.

7. Do you believe Western Germany should be permitted and encouraged to rearm, provided there is ample protection against a revival of Prussian militarism? Yes 87%, No 7%.

8. Do you believe the U. S. is doing right in cooperating (by providing some troops and military equipment) with the 12 Atlantic Pact countries of Europe in creating a joint defense under General Eisenhower against possible Communist aggression? Yes 90%, No 5%.

9. Do you favor the adoption of a universal military training program requiring all able-bodied young men who have not had military service to have at least 6 months of military training? Yes 83%, No 13%.

10. Do you approve of the actions of Congress in investigating and exposing Communists in and out of Government, and of other investigations (such as RFC, Organized Crime, Five Percenters, etc.) being conducted under directions of Congress? Yes 97%, No 1%.

11. Do you think the RFC should be abolished? Yes 63%, No 20%.

12. Should Congress make substantial reductions in PMA payments to farmers and ranchmen for range practices such as drilling water wells, building dams, mesquite irrigation, etc., during this emergency? Yes 76%, No 20%.

13. Should taxes be raised, if necessary, on a pay-as-you-go plan, for adequate defense appropriations, provided all non-essential spending is eliminated? Yes 83%, No 12%.

14. Do you favor amending the Wage and Hour law to increase the present work week to at least 44 hours, during this emergency? Yes 85%, No 10%.

15. The President's budget message contended that in the interest of national defense the Congress should enact the so-called Fair Deal program by including Socialized Medicine, the Brannan Farm Plan, and Civil Rights. Do you agree? Yes 6%, No 87%.

EXPERT GIVES FACTS ABOUT COUNTY ELECTION

A few facts regarding the county-wide election to be held June 30 were brought out at yesterday's Lions club meeting when Jack Brown of San Angelo spoke to the group.

Mr. Brown said that the proposition of reallocating county funds had been brought about in many counties by vast changes in county finance which had taken place since the Texas constitution was drawn up, at which time the amounts were set up for the various funds. The county general fund is drawn on most heavily in most counties, Brown pointed out, and this proposition, if it carries, would allocate some of the money from the less used funds to the general fund.

Another proposition has to do with levying a 30c tax, which takes the place of the state ad valorem tax which was done away with a few years ago. This tax money would go into a fund for construction and maintenance of farm-to-market and lateral roads. Mr. Brown pointed out that the home-stead exemption of \$3,000 would apply in this case.

Third proposition to come before the voters is issuing bonds of \$15,000 for fire-fighting equipment.

Mr. Brown was introduced by County Judge E. W. Craig.

GATHERING SYSTEM TO BE CONSTRUCTED FOR SCHLEICHER OIL

The Shell Pipe Line Corporation will construct a crude oil gathering system to serve the Huldale and north Huldale fields in Schleicher County, according to C. E. Dolhonde, manager of the Corporation's Texas-Gulf area.

The system, on which work is to commence at once, will connect at least eight leases in the two fields into a single gathering tank farm to be located in the North Huldale field. Shell is dickering with Republic Pipe Line Co., for the transport of the gathered oil from the field tank farm to Shell's Eldorado pumping station.

Other developments in the county continue as follows

Another producer, the eighth, has been completed in the Huldale-Strawn field and pipe has been run in the indicated ninth oiler.

The Ohio Oil Co. No. 5 Thomson has been finaled for a calculated 24-hour flowing potential of 328 barrels of 38.7-gravity oil.

The potential was based on an actual 12-hour flow of 168.9 barrels of oil cut one and one-half percent with water and one and one-half percent with basic sediment. Gas-oil ratio was 560-1. Casing pressure was 30-25 pounds and tubing pressure was 495-500 pounds.

Production was through perforations between 5,771-78 feet and a one-quarter-inch choke.

Location is 467 feet from south and 2,138 feet from west lines of section 81, block TT, TC survey. It is a one-location east extension to the field.

American Republics Corporation has cemented seven-inch pipe on bottom at total depth of 5,817 feet in its No. 2 Thomson, indicated ninth producer for the field. At last report operator was preparing to run tubing for completion try.

Delta Gulf Drilling spotted location for two more prospectors in Huldale-Strawn field. They will be No. 3-B H. F. Thomson and No. 2 Fowler.

No. 3-B Thomson will be dug 1,671 feet from north and 2,748 feet from east lines of section 82, block TT, TC survey.

No. 2 Fowler will be 467 feet from south and east lines of section 72, block TT, TC survey.

Other Delta Gulf projects in the Huldale area are the No. 1 Fowler, which is at total depth of 517 feet waiting for cement to cure on surface pipe, and No. 2-B Thomson which is drilling at 2,410 feet in shale and lime.

American Republics No. 3 Thomson is drilling below 2,235 feet in shale and lime. Ohio No. 6 Thomson is progressing below 3,071 feet in lime and shale.

Another Ohio project, No. 10 Thomson, is digging below 4,355 feet in shale.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1 Weddell, Oliver field opener six miles northeast of the Huldale, North-Lower Canyon field, and which was temporarily abandoned several months ago, is now being swabbed for a possible re-completion. During the last 16 hours swabbed the discovery made 17 barrels of oil and four barrels of acid water.

Sinclair No. 1 W. A. Davis estate, south offset to the opener of the above field, swabbed 73 barrels of oil and 12½ barrels of water during the last 24 hours gauged and was still swabbing to test at last report.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 R. J. Hill, wildcat in Southwest-Central Schleicher County, is at total depth of 8,206 feet in the Ellenburger running electric log surveys.

A drillstem test, with tool open one hour, was run from 8,091 to 8,206 feet. Recovery was 2,800 feet of fluid of which the top 400 feet was water cut mud and the bottom 2,400 feet was salt sulphur water. There were no shows of oil or gas.

Stanolind No. 1 Williams, wildcat in Northwest Schleicher, is at plugged back total depth of 1,560 feet. Operator is moving in cable tool to drill out plug on casing cemented at 1,560 feet.

Sunray Oil Corporation No. 1 T. C. Meador, North-Central Schleicher wildcat, is progressing below 2,715 feet in shale. This test is to go to around 7,100 feet for a test of the Ellenburger.

Ohio No. 7 Thomson is at total depth of 5,686. Operator drillstem tested from 5600 to 5686. Had five-eighths bottom choke and three-quarters top choke. Tool open one hour and five minutes. Was flowing when last reported some time Tuesday night. Top of porosity was encountered at 5657—which was 21 feet higher than in Ohio No. 5, which was recently completed.

During the past week Lane Bros. Trucking Co. of San Angelo have moved the large Ohio rig from the No. 5 Thomson location, out to Ohio's Baugh lease. Derrick was raised Tuesday and other rigging was being completed. The well was due to spud in today.

Ohio No. 1-E A. L. Baugh is located 660 feet from the north and west lines of section 18. It is one mile northwest of the one-well Baugh-Strawn field which was opened in 1949. The new test is about 7½ road miles from Eldorado on the Rudd road.

To the Resident Qualified Property Tax-paying Voters of Schleicher County, Texas: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 30th day of June, 1951, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 21st day of May, 1951, which is as follows: "WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas, on November 7, 1944, the qualified voters of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9, of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property tax-paying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in the event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the County taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain County taxes as herein provided:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY, TEXAS: That a special election be held in said County on the 30th day of June, 1951, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property tax-paying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

Proposition Shall the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding Forty-five (.45c) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding Fifteen (.15c) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding Five (.5c) cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County;

Not exceeding Fifteen (.15c) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements.

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (.15c) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has been heretofore, or shall hereafter, be authorized by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

"AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

Ozlesby Jr. 4-A-Reynolds School House, J. W. Davis

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State relating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and attested by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.
