Editor's Journal

TOP OF THE DIVIDE by Thomas Giovannitti

Have a Happy Easter! I'll leave the sermons to the professionals. Me, I have always enjoyed this whole week of religious services. Growing up, the theater alone in Holy Week was enough to make the most hardened heart thaw.

From Holy Thursday evening services through Good Friday noon to three o'clock quite time. I don't know how it was for you but where I grew up businesses closed from noon until three on Good Friday. There was no commerce more important than honoring the crucifixion.

At about one in the afternoon we would gather at the church for the Good Friday services. This day there would be no Mass, no celebration, but a symbolic, reverent, sacred, solemn, rehearing of the Passion. The Passion, from one of the synoptic Gospels would be read dramatically with the priest reading all of the words of Jesus, other persons reading other individual parts, a narrator, and the people responding where the crowd chanted or yelled. We, the altar boys, would yell with the crowd. It felt eerie to yell, "Crucify Him! Crucify Him!". Having learned in Sunday school that it was my sins that put Jesus on the cross, saying those words out loud made my belief in my own culpability more impressive. How could I have acted so badly that such a horrible end would have to be endured by Jesus? Yet in the end from that very cross He says, "Forgive them for they know not what they do." I always felt I was included in that group. It has given me great comfort to think that God will not condemn us for what we do in ignorance. Let's hope so!

the part about Jesus giving up his spirit we all knelt in silence. The priest would distribute communion and it would be time to move the remaining hosts to a Place outside the main sanctuary, to another room, into a kind of golden tomb called a catafalque where members of the congregation would keep watch until Saturday night. The procession to this altar of repose was very solemn. Many altar boys carrying candles on poles followed by the thurible (a metal pot on a chain with burning incense) and then the priest all draped in black with four men of the parish carrying a black canopy lead the

boy swinging a wooden enormous mystery for me. The allowed) lead the people who followed behind. We sang a song called, I think, the "Dies Ire," which are the first two Latin words of the song, meaning day of sorrow. It is a mournful tune which even if we didn't understand the words left everyone feeling the weight of the loss of Jesus much as the apostles must have felt.

The whole next day, Saturday, was the only day there was no service in our church because the vigil did not start until Midnight, that is the first moment of Easter Sunday. The







Schleicher County Library Book Review

I have long been a fan of Stephen King. Some of his early books I devoured at one setting. Later, I must confess, we rather lost touch with each other and so it was with a little trepidation that I began to read Needful Things and, once again, I was hooked.

Needful Things is early
Stephen King at his best, a
masterful suspense thriller
drawing ever so tautly to the
climax. This is a story so close
to real life, that if you believe
even the slightest in the
supernatural, it could be true.

The setting is again Castle Rock, Maine. The characters are like small town people anywhere except that these are New England small town people, curious about a stranger but not able to admit it. Therefore, when Leland Gaunt opens a new shop, all have to amble by and casually look in the window, just to look.

the window, just to look.

Imagine the excitement when one discovers that their very own hearts desire, the thing they have always wanted the very most in the whole wide world, is for sale in that very window, and so cheap. Of course, there is the "hidden price," that makes it not quite so cheap. But all one has to do is play a practical joke on a neighbor, no one will ever know you did it. But something goes wrong and joke builds on joke ever widening consequences, like a pebble

tossed into a pool of water, until your hearts desire finally becomes the most expensive thing you ever bought. The price is your very own soul.

This is a plain and simple tale, a morality play if you will, of good versus evil and right versus wrong, of God versus the devil. The knight in shining armor is Sheriff Alan Pangborn, a man who is able to see past his own desires to the very core of events. He pits his own soul for the souls of Castle Rock, may every town be blessed with at

least one like him.

Polly Chalmers is the damsel in distress, sweet and innocent, will her love for the sheriff be strong enough to save them both? Leland Gaunt, proprietor of the shop "Needful Things" is the devil himself, banking his victory on human nature, that anything can be bought and sold. These are the pivotal characters upon which this book is anchored.

There are many excellent supporting characters who weave in and out adding depth and flavor to this fine tale. It particularly liked the opening and closing soliloquies of this book, a novel idea, it only sets the stage in the beginning but ties up everything in the end

ties up everything in the end.

Through it all runs these two themes, people see what they want to see, and, the devils voice is sweet.
