Special from James C. Watson Midland, Texas

Tuesday, May 15:—

Staking of two wildcat explorations highlighted this week's oil activity in Schleicher County.

Six miles north of Eldorado and in North-Central Schleicher County, Sunray Oil Corporation will drill its No. 1 T. C. Meador as a 7,100-foot test.

Drill site is 330 feet from south and 990 feet from east lines of the southwest quarter of section 59, block LL, TC survey.

That puts it about four and one-half miles south of the Huldale-Strawn field.

The Ohio Oil Company will drill its No. 1-E A. L. Baugh as a Strawn exploration one mile northwest of the one-well Baugh-Strawn field which was opened in 1949.

Location for the new project was made 660 feet from north and west lines of section 18, block M, GH&SA survey. The projected 5,900-foot test is slated to start drilling immediately.

The lone Baugh field producer, Ohio No. 1 A. L. Baugh, is averaging about 40 barrels of oil per day plus about 300 barrels of water on the pump.

Location is seven and one-half miles northeast of Eldorado and four miles south of the Huldale-Strawn field.

The Ohio Oil Company has completed its No. 3 H. F. Thomson Estate as an important stepout north of the Huldale-Strawn field of North-Central Schleicher County.

Operator reported a daily flowing potential of 409 barrels of high-gravity oil plus four barrels of water. Production is from perforations opposite the Strawn at 5,773-85 feet. The seven-inch casing is cemented on bottom at 5,795 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 597-1. Flowing pressures were 625 pounds on tubing and 240 pounds on casing. Location is 467 feet from north and west lines of the most southerly northwest quarter of section 81, block TT, TC survey.

Operator reported a daily flowing potential of 820 barrels of 40-gravity oil for G. W. Strake No. 1. Forrest Runge, second well in the Huldale, North-Lower Canyon field in Central-North Schleicher County.

The potential was based on a nine-hour gauge of 307.8 barrels through a 24/64-inch tubing choke. Production is from perforations at 5,611-26 feet and from open hole at 5,628-33 feet.

Flowing pressure was 525 pounds on tubing and 480 pounds on casing. Gas-oil ratio was 636-1.

Ohio No. 2 H. F. Thomson Estate, southwest offset to the discovery of the above field has indicated as another producer for the field. Flowing oil developed on a drillstem test from 5572 to 5586 feet in the reef lime which was topped at 5542 feet, datum point of minus 3344 feet.

Casing has been perforated from 5609-15 and from 5620-26. Ohio today is preparing to bring in its No. 2.

Ohio No. 5 is drilling at 3655. Ohio No. 7 is 820 deep and is nearing to set casing to case off a cavity.

J. C. Hawkins of Dallas has made location for his fourth prospector in the Huldale field. The project is No. 4 Frances May Thomson, 590 feet from north and 620 feet from west lines of section 80, block TT, TC survey. It is to be drilled as a west offset to production in the field.

Approximately one-half mile northeast of Ohio No. 3 Thomson, the same operator will drill No. 9 H. F. Thomson. It will be 467 feet from west and 1322 feet from north lines of section 81. That makes it a south offset to No. 4 Thomson which was recently plugged on total depth of 5779 feet. That prospector, which is between the two fields in north Schleicher Co., developed only sulphur water in the strawn.

Ohio No. 10 Thomson is another west project in the Huldale strawn field. Location is 467 feet from west and 2574 feet from north lines of section 81. The No. 1 rig is being moved today to this location.

Wildcats

T. L. Williams & Wahlenmaier No. 1 Geo. Long, three miles south west of Eldorado, was drilling in barren Ellenburger yesterday at close to 7500 feet, which is contract depth. It will probably be abandoned.

Stanolind No. 1 R. J. Hill, 4 1/2 miles southwest of Eldorado, was drilling around 6500 in shale and sand, apparently not doing any

Mrs. Edwin Jackson is one of the 52-member group of PTA officials of Texas who go in a special car to the National Parent-Teacher Convention in Miami Beach, Florida.

D., head of the department of psychiatry, Temple University Medical School, Philadelphia, Pa., who will lead discussion of "The Needs of Youth"; Dwayne Orton of Washington, D. C., assistant administrator for training and education, Civil Defense Administration, who will lead a section meeting on "Our Part in Civilian Defense."

He states that in his own country both English and Afrikaans were used and understood—and that the latter is spoken in his own home.

It seems that while the young man is studying our agricultural practices he is at the same time serving as an ambassador of good will from his home country, about which we all know too little. An intelligent and well-educated young man, he speaks English with a British accent, expressing himself well, and sensing the things we like and need to know—then too he shows a willingness to learn, yet has a high regard for his own country and its high standard of living.

Court of Honor Cites Fourteen; Committeemen Are Recognized

Fourteen Boy Scouts of Troop 18, Eldorado, were recognized at the Court of Honor held Monday night in the Scout Hall. Range Notes

By W. G. GODWIN

New varieties of grain sorghums look promising for Schleicher County. Five new grain sorghums varieties have been developed by the Texas Experiment Station. They were named and released to farmers and seed producers in 19-50. Three are combine varieties, Combine Kaffir 60, Redbine 60, and Redbine 66. One is a forage variety named Hi-Higeria, and the other is a pop-sorghum.
Combine Kaffir 60 was developed by crossing Double Dwarf Kaffir Selection to Texas Blackhull Kaffir and back crossing to Texas Blackhull Kaffir. This gives Double Dwarf height, earliness, and adaptation to combine harvesting. The yields are heavy. The seeds are white with black specks. It blooms in about 60 days, about a week earlier than Plainsman.

Redbine 60 and Redbine 66. Both are red seed varieties rather similar except for their maturities. Both are a cross between Martin and 7008. Redbine 60 blooms in 60 days. Redbine 66 blooms in 66 days. Redbine 60 is a little surer in production because of its earliness; while Redbine 66 will yield better under favorable conditions.

Hi-Higeria is a tall variety developed for forage. It is obtained by crossing Hegaria with a tall mutation in early Hegaria and selecting the recombination of extra height and Hegaria maturity. It has the same grain yield as Hegaria but yields 20% more forage. It will be the ideal bundle feed producing high quality forage and is more palatable to livestock.

Pop sorghum was developed by crossing two foreign flinty varieties. It is about as hard as popcorn and expands 32 to 1 when popped. The advantages of pop sorghum is that its puffs lie close together; more flavorful and just as nutritious as popcorn. It is definitely a substitute for popcorn. It definitely has possibilities in its use in caramels and candied confections, for puffed breakfast cereals, for flour and meal, and for packing fragile articles for shipment.
