Two More Resign As School Nears

Resignations of Jack Black, high school principal, and Miss Jeanette Sikes, home economics teacher, were accepted by the Eldorado school board this week. Miss Sikes will take a position in the McCamey schools during the coming year, and Mr. Black will be principal at Iraan.

W. J. Fraker of Kenedy, who has been teaching at Shawnee, and early this month accepted the position of social science teacher, was raised to the principalship, according to action taken by the school board in special session Tuesday. He has had 14 years' teaching experience and is a graduate of Southwest Texas State of San Marcos.

New in the school system here will be Miss Katherine Hill, new social science teacher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Hill of this city. A graduate of EHS, she received her degree from TSCW, with a major in history, and since that time has been teaching in Texas schools. For the past eight years she has been teaching social science in the Senior High School of Port Arthur.

Besides the vacancy in the Home Ec department, positions are yet to be filled in second and third grades. Supt. T. E. Holcomb said earlier this week.

Previously announced is the employment of these other new teachers:

Named as high school Commercial teacher is Miss Jane Overby, who taught last year at Novice. She is from Santa Anna, and holds the BBA degree from Daniel Baker college at Brownwood.

Miss Jo Beth Taylor of Sonora, a graduate of North Texas State at Denton, was elected to teach a section of the Latin American first grade. She has had three and one-half years' experience in schools in California, and in Orange and El Paso, Texas.

Mrs. Irene Thornton of Roby, who taught last year in Littlefield,

was named by the Board to teach fourth or fifth grade. Her college work was taken at Hardin-Simmons and Texas Tech. She has a son who will enter the Junior class.

Mr. Holcomb announced that the first faculty meeting will be Thursday evening, August 30, at 8 p.m. in the school. Students will register the following morning.

School trustees state that the Negro school is progressing nicely and will be ready for opening September 1.

Mittel Field Gets Offsets; 20 Producers at Huldale; More Wildcats to the East

The staking of three offsets to an indicated Pennsylvania discovery—the completion of two new wells at Huldale, bringing the total to twenty—and the announcement of two more wildcats in the east part of the county—are the highlights of the rapidly growing Schleicher oil operations this week.

MITTEL SWABBED IN
Wesley W. West No. 1 Mittel was reported to have started flowing about mid-afternoon Monday after swabbing more than 24 hours on perforations at around 6,322-42 feet in 5½-inch casing cemented on bottom at 6,372 feet. It was turned to storage in the evening when it virtually had cleaned itself of mud.

MITTEL OFFSETS
Location had been cleared and cellar and pits dug for West No. 2 Mittel, to which it is understood the rotary rig of Delaware Drillers will be skidded. No. 2 Mittel will be 890 feet west and 330 feet north of the No. 1 Mittel. Operations will start as soon as No. 1 has been fully completed.

Standard of Texas will dig No. 1-3 Christina Mittel 1,980 feet from north and 467 feet from west lines of section 78, block TT, TC survey. It is contracted to 6,400 feet with rotary equipment.

Pan American will drill its No. 1-B Christina Mittel 660 feet from north and west lines of the southwest quarter of section 78, block TT, TC survey. It will be south of the Mittel discovery well.

EAST WILDCATS

Grey-Wolfe Co., of Houston announced Tuesday their intention to drill two wildcats some 16 miles east southeast of Eldorado. Their No. 1 Edimston will be 1-1.8 miles west and a quarter mile south of the Crosby well, which was abandoned dry in mid-April at 5382 feet in the Ellenburger. The Grey-Wolfe test will be on a farmout from Southern Production Co., successor to Daniger Oil & Gas Co. Hiawatha holds the lease on the southwest quarter of section 34; Union Producing Co., has the east half of section 35, which adjoins 34 on the north.

Grey-Wolfe's second wildcat, due to be started on or before Dec. 1, also will be on Mrs. W. F. Edimston's land, on the west 122.1 acres of section 16, W. A. Binnion survey. Section 16 is a long narrow

strip extending east and west. Other wildcats in the eastern part of the county were announced two weeks ago:—

Los Nietos No. 1 McBurnett is 660 feet from the south and west lines of section 6, block A-2, GH & SA Ry. Co. survey. Projected to 5,600 feet, it is now at a depth of 420 feet. Los Nietos, a subsidiary of Union Oil Co., of California, has 2,310 acres under lease in the area. The wildcat is four miles east of Glove No. 1 Tom R. Henderson, a gas well, and three-quarters of a mile east of the Page (Strawn) field.

G. W. Strake of Houston plans to start by mid-August a southeastern Schleicher County wildcat that is expected to explore the Ellenburger in drilling 6000 feet. The Strake wildcat will be nine miles east and slightly south of the south end of the Page (Strawn) field.

20th PRODUCER

The Huldale, north-Pennsylvania field of central-north Schleicher recently reported its sixth producer. The new oiler is the Oil No. 6 H. F. Thomson estate. It was finished for a daily flowing potential of 124 barrels of 38.8 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 6,169-1. Completion was through a ¼ inch tubing choke and the flow came through perforations at 5638-50 feet.

Marking a short east extension to the Huldale-Strawn field in central north Schleicher county, Ohio No. 11 H. F. Thomson was finished for a natural daily flowing potential of 355 barrels of 38.6 gravity oil. It is the 14th well in the above field and brings the total producers in that area, including north Huldale, to 20—not counting the Mittel well, which is considered a new separate field.

HULLDALE OPERATIONS

Ohio has recently spudded in three tests in the Huldale field. Depths given yesterday were:
Ohio No. 17 at 242 feet.
Ohio No. 15 at 565 feet.
Ohio No. 14 at 550 feet.
Ohio No. 12 was drilling below 4102 feet in shale.

Standard of Texas No. 2-1 Mrs. Frances May Thompson, on the northwest side of the North Huldale field, had not reached the reef in drilling to 5,617 feet in sand and shale.

Delta Gulf No. 1 Spence, wildcat east of Eldorado, had no shows in drilling to 6,363 feet, where it topped the Ellenburger.

Schleicher wildcats, Hiawatha No. 1 Harkey was drilling at 3,735 feet in shale and sand. E. B. Fletcher No. 1 Robinson at 5,551 feet in lime and shale.

JOINS OHIO

C. E. Decker has moved to Eldorado and joined the Ohio staff as a petroleum engineer. Mr. Decker graduated from the U. of Texas in June and has moved here with his wife and 4-year-old daughter. They are making their home in a rent house owned by Mr. Graves.

Homecomers Take In Day's Events, See Parade, Dance 'Til 2:00 O'Clock

Eldorado ex-students from as far back as 1895 flocked back home last Saturday for the second annual Homecoming. Starting with registration and program in the morning, exes and their families had dinner in the Memorial building at noon, lined Eldorado streets late in the afternoon to watch the parade, had a Coke party in the Corral, and ended the day with a dance at the Memorial building.

Program In Auditorium

Homecoming Day started at 10 a.m. with Carol Ratliff as master of ceremonies at the general program. Rev. Clifford Nelson gave the invocation, and musical entertainment was provided by the Eldorado Quartet; Mrs. Gus Love, Irvin Mund, Nolan McDonald, and Bob Faught; and two piano selections by Bob Ratliff. T. E. Holcomb, new school superintendent, spoke briefly.

Mrs. Helen Blakeway reported that 316 registered just before the morning program.

Corsages Awarded

Corsages were awarded to early day teachers and pupils, and to others who had taught the longest. Carrol Ratliff honored Mrs. J. E. Connor who taught here in 1908, as the earliest teacher. Runner-up was Mrs. L. M. Hoover who taught in 1914.

Mrs. Frances Robinson Tracy of McAllen was recognized as the ex-teacher coming the farthest distance (450 miles) to be present. Joe Turner Hext came 429 miles from Lamarque.

Recognized as pupils with the earliest dates of attendance in Eldorado schools were Pearl McCarty-Jones, 1895, and Mrs. Ethel K. Long, 1897.

Mr. Long, who is stationed at Bremerston, Washington, with the Air Corps, came 2330 miles, farther than any other ex-student. Katherine Montgomery Humphrey came 1734.

Mrs. Payne Robinson was cited as having taught the largest number of pupils in her years of teaching in the Eldorado schools.

Mrs. Gus Love, as general chairman of Homecoming arrangements, also received a corsage.

Speaker for the program was Houston Smith, a member of the EHS graduating class of 1910, and now a practicing attorney and county judge at Ozona. Mr. Smith recalled that he graduated shortly after the old high school building

was completed, and that then as now the new building was a mark of progress in the educational system of the county. He reviewed the progress that had been made since then, stating that as long as our students could learn fundamentals of government in school, we had nothing to fear from the "isms" of our day.

Mr. Smith was introduced by Edwin Jackson.

Homecomers lined the parade route which extended from the school house down the highway to Main street. Sheriff E. H. Sweatt and others on horseback led the procession, followed by Lum Burk with the fire truck.

The Boy Scouts, in uniform, were followed by the Class of 1895 wagon, the Mias Amigas, and early faculty floats. Classes from 1920 on came in succession. Some classes had mule-drawn wagons, a number had crepe paper decorated trucks and cars, and some had enclosed cars.

First prize went to the Class of 1930, whose boat-shaped float represented the Ark. It was made by Elizabeth Ballew, Jack Elder, and others from the class. The Class of 1944 took second place with their Little Red Schoolhouse float, while the Class of 1935, with Happy Kerr in charge, took third with their float, decorated on the football theme.

Exes were shown through the Corral youth center with a Coke party, and ended the day dancing until 2 a.m. to the music of John Carrico and his band outside the Memorial building.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6
Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and pay for the maintenance of needy aged persons of the State of Texas who are aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years, needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for the acceptance of financial aid for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide assistance to and pay for the maintenance of needy aged persons of the State of Texas who are aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years, needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for the acceptance of financial aid for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation and publication."

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that such property was disposed of bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of said sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom."

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds for old age assistance shall not exceed the amount per month from Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year."

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditures from Federal Funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy blind persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditures from Federal Funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purpose each year."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8
Proposing an Amendment to Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts; to provide that the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levying of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levying of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22
Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay a retirement or disability benefit authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body or bodies as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay a retirement or disability benefit authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body or bodies as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."
Each voter shall strike on one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment."

"Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto."
Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, and shall be made by the Governor thereof."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37
Proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new section after Section 11a, thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in addition to securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, not shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2
Proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased from One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation."

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund."

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities as such terms and under such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law."

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of the State of Texas, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 31, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 31, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 31, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval of the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and the laws of this State."

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Post Script

To get the low-down on the new west road to Big Lake we took off Sunday afternoon and drove it through—so now we know.

There are those who aren't even up on Schleicher's part of it—it's all finished to the county line. Just drive on past Henry Moore's Austin stone gateway, with its Aberdeen Angus sign, past the point where the Reynolds road turns off (and incidentally there should be a sign there), and head for the University land country.

A few buzzards flying around, hot winds, no traffic, everything bone dry, highway right-of-way still free of weeds because there hasn't been rain to bring them up; road leads straight west veering a little to the right, stock huddled in shade of a few scrub cedars, grass so dry it looks gray—a few of the white late summer Snow on the Mountains in bloom! That's the view through there.

From the front of the Eldorado Success to the county line where the paving ends is exactly 22.6 miles.

Enter Crockett and the new strip of roadbed, still of dirt, but with piles of gravel in place at intervals, stakes to indicate where surfacing will go—then evidence of rain, and a showing of greenery in the pastures and puddles along the road.

Seven miles from the county line begins the laying of caliche and here is located the heavy machinery, rock crushers, etc. A mile of this, then the road smooths out again, still wet, but the going now good, with the road bed ready for the final topping.

Comes the Barnhart-Ozona road for our west road to intersect—34 miles from Eldorado. Cross the road, and note that the intersection of these main highways will be well finished, with lots of surfacing for safety's sake.

Go right on west, where there is again a dirt base, and this stretch evidently farther behind in construction. We went that far before we'd met a car!

This road is well traveled, with quite a few cars out. Just 39 miles from Eldorado the work begins to look more finished. Pass the Shell camp, the Chambers lease, and within the next few miles you find evidence that you are in the oil country. There is quite a lot of road equipment along here, a couple of workmen's camps, mainly Mexicans, and 45 miles from Eldorado the road is all smoothed out, all ready for the final surfacing. A couple of miles farther on you top a hill and get quite a nice view of hills in all directions—and the soil gets rockier again.

Then comes end of construction. There has been a stretch of around 30 miles from the end of the paving and the county line to this point!

This blacktopped stretch soon turns north, and you go on it about

20 miles into the city of Big Lake, through Crockett and Reagan counties. Total trip, 72 miles.

We understand the construction must all be finished in September.



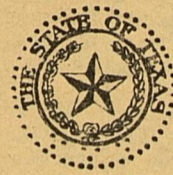

GREETINGS:

The percentage of farm homes in Texas receiving central station electric service has increased from 2.3 per cent to 90 per cent during the past 16 years, largely through the stimulation of the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) program.

More than 282,000 rural families of Texas now enjoy the benefits of electric lights and power through cooperatives which they themselves own and operate.

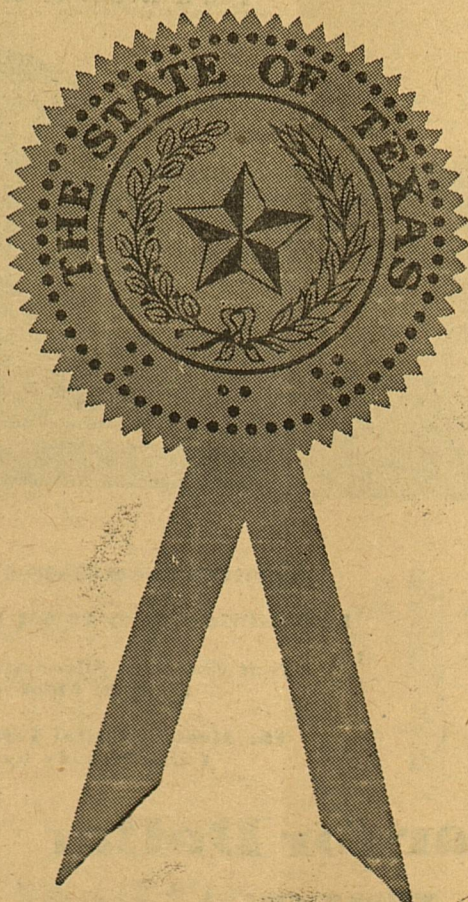
Each of the 77 rural electric cooperatives in Texas is a free and independent, tax-paying business enterprise, chartered under the laws of the state of Texas, and owned and controlled by the farmers and ranchers who receive service along its lines.

The availability of electricity has brought about a wholesome revolution in farm methods, production and living standards; has lightened the drudgery of farm tasks and increased farm output and profits; has been instrumental in keeping young people on the land, and has promoted the general welfare not only of rural people, but of urban residents as well whose prosperity and well-being depends upon a sound and prosperous agriculture.

THEREFORE I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby proclaim the week of August 19th to 25th, inclusive, as
