


Nixons Attend **Family Reunion**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter

The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limita-tions, restrictions, and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of

assistance to: "(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously imning of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously im-mediately preceding the filing of such ap-plication; provided that the maximum pay-ment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per

be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per mont. "Any applicant for or recipient of as-sistance, including the spouse in each in-stance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of assistance; provided, that if such prop-erty was disposed of by bona fide sale and onveyance; and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all pro-person and spouse for normal living ex-penses, or for the purchase of other real property, neither such recipient nor spouse all thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of suid sale have been used by such property, neither such recipient nor spouse of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the ex-piration of the period of time during which here normal living expenses; and in case of and spouse for its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the ex-piration of the period of time during which here normal living expenses had they actual market value been realized there. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 48-c of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establish-ment of rural fire prevention districts so as to provide that the Legislature may authorze an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hun-dred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

The foregoing constitutional am-endment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an elec-tion to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment au-thorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment uthorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation nd establishment of rural fire prevention

and establishment of rural fire prevention districts." Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one ex-pressing his vote on the proposed amend-ment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amend-ment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclama-tion for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an Amendment to the Constitu-tion of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that ad-ministration of said system may be com-mitted to the same body set up to adminis-ter the statewide municipal retirement sys-tem authorized under Section 51f of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI of the Con-stitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be num-bered Section 63, which shall read as fol-lows: **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22**

words: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment au-thorizing a statewide system for retire-ment and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amend-ment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for ap-pointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one un-marked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclama-tion for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for pro-posed amendments thereto. Sec. 4. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creat-ing a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Ats of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact: provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest. "In the sale of any such bonds, a prefer-ential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans Land Board. "The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of pur-

To get the low-down on the new west road to Big Lake we took off Sunday afternoon and drove it through-so now we know.

There are those who aren't even up on Schleicher's part of it-it's all finished to the county line. Just drive on past Henry Moore's Austin stone gateway, with its Aberdeen Angus sign, past the point where the Reynolds road turns off (and incidentally there should be a sign there), and head for the University land country. A few buzzards flying around,

hot winds, no traffic, everything bone dry, highway right-of-way still free of weeds because there hasn't been rain to bring them up; road leads straight west veering a little to the right, stock huddled in shade of a few scrub cedars, grass so dry it looks gray-a few of the white late summer Snow on the Mountains in bloom!
