Record number of students take college entrance exams 🛊

AUSTIN - The class of 1998 set a new state record when 100,417 Texas students in public and private schools took the Scholastic Achievement Test.

That is an increase of 6,383 from 1997 and the largest increase in 10 years. A record number of Texans also took Advanced Placement Exams, the College Board reported last week.

Reflecting national trends, Texas scores on the SAT remained stable with students earning 494 on the verbal section of the exam and 501 on the mathematics portion of the college entrance exam.
