Special from James C. Watson Midland, Texas

A new flowing producer and the locating of two more deep wildcats has sped up the pace in oil-booming Schleicher County. Stanolind Oil & Gas Company and T. L. Williams trustee & E. M. Wahlenmaier, have each staked locations for wildcat explorations. American Republics Corporation has reported potential for its No. 1 H. F. Thomson, second well in the Huldale Strawn field, nine miles north and slightly east of Eldorado.

Stanolind will drill the No. 1 Williams in extreme northwest Schleicher, 660 feet from north and 1,980 from east lines of section 1,204, TC survey and 16 miles NW of Eldorado. It is projected to 8,100 feet with rotary and is to start in the immediate future.

The drillsite is 2 1/2 miles east and three-quarters of a mile south of Frank and George Frankel and Shell Oil Co. No. 1 Williams, discovery and lone producer in the Tankersly Clear Fork field of SE Irion county.

The Williams & Wahlenmaier prospector will be drilled as the No. 1 Geo. Long, 660 feet from south and west lines of sec. 75, block A, HE&WT survey and two and seven-eighths miles south and one mile west of Eldorado. It is projected to a maximum depth of 7,500 feet, or 200 feet into the Ellenburger or production in the Ellenburger at a lesser depth.

Campbell Drilling Company of Eldorado is spudding in the well and Western Drilling Co., of Odessa then will move in rotary and complete the hole. The wildcat is a farmout by Stanolind of the south-west quarter of section 75.

Drillsite is 3 3/4 miles east and three-quarters of a mile south of Stanolind No. 1 R. J. Hill, recently started 7,700-foot Ellenburger wild cat.

American Republics No. 1 H. F. Thomson, the second Huldale producer, was completed for a daily potential of 287.04 barrels of oil and no water. The potential was based on an actual six hour flow of 71.26 barrels of pipeline oil thru 3/4 inch choke. Production is coming from perforations opposite the Strawn at 5,825-40 feet. Gravity of the oil is 39.5 degrees. Gas-oil ratio was 332-1.

The producer is a southeast offset to Delta Gulf Drilling Co., No. 1 H. F. Thomson estate, discovery well of the field.

The Ohio Oil Company No. 1 Thomson, another Huldale prospector which has indicated as a possible producer, is coring below 5,847 feet in lime. It was cored from 5,805 to 5,835 feet. Recovery was 29 feet of lime with porosity and shows of oil. It is an east offset to the field opener.

Pan American Production Co. No. 1 Thomson, south offset to the discovery, is coming out of the hole with a core taken from 5,729 to 5,823 feet after which electric log surveys are to be run.

The prospector recovered eight and one-half feet of shale, two feet of dense, barren lime, five and one-half feet of lime with fair pinpoint porosity and good odor, 29 feet of gray fossiliferous lime and shale with an odor on fresh breaks and six feet of lime with good pinpoint porosity, good odor and stain from the section at 5751-89 feet.

Pan-American yesterday reported a total depth of 5823 in lime, and are setting 5 1/2 in. casing to a depth of 5810.

Delta Gulf No. 2 at Huldale was coring in lime from 5836 to 5851.

Operator is preparing to make a third attempt to drillstem test in Hiawatha Oil & Gas Company No. 2 Runge, northeast offset to its No. 1 Runge, Pennsylvania lime discovery adjacent to Huldale.

The test is to be from 4910 to 4922 feet, where there was a show of gas and some fluorescence in samples. Two previous attempts to test that section failed.

Drillsite is 330 feet from south and west lines of the NE 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of sec. 66, block M.

The Ohio Oil Company is to drill two projects in central-north Schleicher county in the undeveloped area between the Runge and the Huldale fields.

The firm's No. 3 Thomson will be 467 feet from north and west lines of the most southerly northwest corner of section 81. That will make it approximately three-quarters of one mile southwest of the No. 4 Thomson which will be 70 feet from north and 467 feet from west lines of the same section. No. 3 is now rigging up.

Ohio No. 4 Thomson will be 1 1/4 miles northeast of Delta Gulf No. 1 Thomson, the opener of the Huldale field, and 1 1/4 miles southwest of Hiawatha No. 1 Runge, the opener of Canyon-Strawn produc-

COMMISSIONERS VOTE TO BUILD NEW COUNTY BARN; PROVIDE ADDITIONAL FUNDS FOR LIBRARY; OTHER BUSINESS

The county public library will hereafter be open each afternoon except on Sunday and Monday, according to a decision made by the Commissioners at their regular meeting Monday.

A delegation of club women appeared before the court Monday morning and made an appeal for additional financial support for the library and more pay for the librarian. These suggestions were adopted by the commissioners.

Another matter that came before the court were a number of repairs at the Memorial building, and H. W. Scott was engaged to do the work.

Two men from Gaines county appeared before the court and offered to buy some of the Schleicher County school land in that county. The proposition was rejected.

A motion was adopted that the county continue to enforce the

"prairie dog" extermination law in this county.

New Barn

On the question of building a new county barn, the court agreed to provide a structure of this kind. "We don't how big it will be, nor what it will cost," said one of the members, but the commissioners have definitely decided to go ahead and build one. One of the reasons that contributed to their decision was that an oil field mud company has offered \$100 per month rental for the structure that the county now uses. The commissioners are making arrangements this week to vacate the building, and to get started soon on their own new barn.

The new DW-10 road machine, ordered some time ago, was reported at Angelo Monday, and county crew men were to drive it to Eldorado.

A scheduled 7,100-foot rotary wildcat has been scheduled in extreme north central Schleicher County, 1 3/4 miles south of the Tom Green County line.

C. L. Norsworthy, Jr., No. 1 Ethel Williams will be 660 feet out of the southwest corner of section 77-M-GH&SARR survey. Beginning by March 18, the project will be 18 miles northeast of Eldorado and 2 1/4 miles northeast of the Huldale North lower Canyon field.

Woolen Mill Observes Tenth Birthday Here

West Texas Woolen Mills recently observed its tenth birthday, Joe M. Christian, manager, announced recently. Christian and other Eldoradoans still recall the big crowd at the mill's formal opening, Feb. 27, 1939. This was attended by the Governor and other notables.

Since the first blanket was completed on Nov. 27, 1940, about 68,250 blankets have been turned out, including 24,000 for the Army during World War II.

The mill has made gradual and steady progress during the past ten years, Christian points out. These include the addition of 42% more floor space, machinery to double original capacity, and incorporation of the concern in 1950.

With the closing of the blanket mill at San Marcos some time back the West Texas Woolen Mills at Eldorado reverted once again to its status as only blanket factory in the Southwest. The mill here has some of the equipment from the old mill at San Marcos.

The "El Dorado" trade mark has become well known among wool growers, both large and small, over this part of the country. Christian has developed a unique custom service to the growers.

At the present time the mill is undergoing a complete paint job inside and out while blankets and dress materials continue to come off the looms. A large new line of ladies' woolen and worsted materials will be finished in time for fall and winter sewing, Christian said.

In checking at the city hall today it was revealed that no additional candidates have come forward seeking places on the ticket in the city election, Tuesday, April 3.

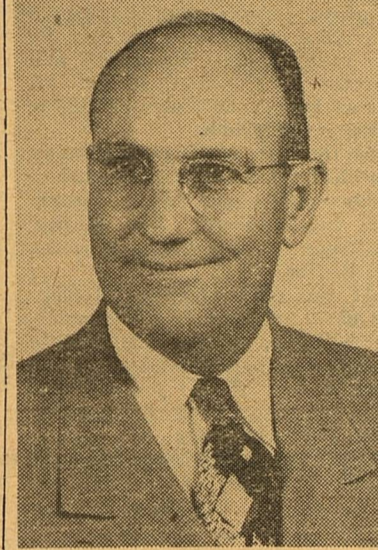

Area Firemen Battle Pasture Blaze Monday In West Schleicher Co.

Heavy loss was sustained in a grass fire out in the University land area of Schleicher County Tuesday. Four or five sections of grass and many miles of post were lost in the blaze which caught in the locality of the new highway.

Fire departments from Eldorado, Sonora and Ozona, Texas Rangers, West Texas Utilities with their wireless communications system, REA, ranchers from everywhere with their sprayers, city foggers, highway construction men with graders and maintainers, the Moore gin neighborhood—a crowd of fire fighters estimated at several hundred battled the high flames and brought them under control.

Four fire alarms were sounded in Eldorado. The first fire occurred in the morning, and then the blaze broke out again that afternoon. The place of origin was on the Henry Speck Ranch and before the fire was extinguished the Mary Davis Coupe place, the Ford Oglesby, Will Blaylock, Odes Harris, J. T. Jackson, Marvin McDonald, and other areas were involved. It was stopped at the Odes Harris place. As far as is known at this time, there was, fortunately, little loss of livestock.

The wind was high, driving the flames across the highway.

A smaller grass fire was put out Wednesday on the Royster ranch.

Q. Will VA increase my disability compensation if I go to a VA hospital for treatment of a service-connected disability?

A. After you have been in the hospital for 21 days or more for treatment of your service-connected disability, VA under certain conditions may pay you a 100 per cent disability rating, which you would continue to receive for as long as you remain hospitalized for such treatment.

Q. May I use a GI business loan to buy a car, and thus be exempt from credit restrictions that now apply to such purchases?

A. The only condition under which you could get a GI business loan to purchase a car would be if the car were essential to your business. You could not get a loan for a car used for pleasure or to travel to and from work.

Q. The beneficiary of my National Service Life Insurance policy formerly was my father. Recently I got married, and want to name my wife as beneficiary instead. Do I have to get my father's consent to change beneficiaries?

A. No. You have the right to change beneficiaries at any time. There is no need to obtain your father's consent.

Q. Can you tell me how to apply for the special Special National Service Life Insurance dividend I understand VA is going to pay in 1951?

A. No application is necessary for the second special dividend. Instead, payments will be made automatically. If VA has any question as to your address of record, it will mail you a two-part return card for verification of your proper address.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Easter Ham Dinner

Broadcast: March 17, 1951

- 4 medium carrots, cooked
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
- 1/2 cup Pet Milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons finely cut onion
- 1 lb. ground ham, smoked or cooked
- 1 cup bread crumbs (2 days old)
- 1/2 cup catsup or chili sauce
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 2 tablespoons water

Cut carrots in half lengthwise; arrange on bottom of greased 1 1/2-qt. loaf pan. Mix rice, 1/2 cup mushroom soup, 1/2 cup milk, salt, pepper and onion. Press lightly on carrots in pan. Top with mixture of ham, crumbs, catsup, 1/2 cup milk and mustard. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 1 hour, or until brown. Remove from oven; loosen sides of loaf with knife. Let stand 10 min. Heat rest of mushroom soup with water until steaming hot. Turn out loaf; serve with the mushroom sauce. Makes 4 servings.
