ENSUS SHOWS FARM PHONE NUMBERS ALMOST BACK TO LEVEL OF 1920

The percentage of American farms with telephones is almost back to the level of 30 years ago, according to an analysis by the U. S. Department of Agriculture of preliminary 1950 census statistics. The analysis was made Rural Electrification Administration, which in 1949 was given responsibility for the telephone loan

Census takers last year found that 38.3 percent of all United States farms had telephone service, according to preliminary returns, as compared to 38.07 percent in 1920, the first year the census included farm telephone statistics.


Numerically, 400,000 fewer farms had telephones in 1950 than in 1920. Preliminary reports show that last year there were 2,059,474 telephones on farms. In 1920 there were 2,498,493 farms that had telephones.

Emergency Resolution

Motion by C. C. Henderson, seconded by Ray Hudgens, to amend the minutes of July 12, 1949, in which the tabulating of the trash hauling election passed by 74 in favor and 10 against, stipulating the amounts to be charged to the users of this service.

This including all residences within the City limits, all water users outside the City limits; and all trailer houses. The fee shall be fifty cents (50c) per residence, and the business houses shall have a two-dollar and fifty-cent (\$2.50) service, scaling the fee down to one dollar (\$1.00) according to the service rendered.

Business houses to be serviced daily and residence section of town to be serviced twice a month.







COLLEGE STATION - Should ing? This question is the one most cultural Extension Service. Farm The average dopester seems to housewives especially are interest ing time to preheat, cool and drain

Jimmie Dell Harris, foods and nutrition specialist, answers saying that scientists have conclud ed from many experiments that scalding is a necessary step in preparing most vegetables for freezing, regardless of how long they are to be stored. Scalding stops certain undesirable changes such as loss of quality and vitamin content. Heating gives a brighter color, shrinks the food, further cleans the product and stops the action of

Scientists of the Minnesota Experiment Station made tests of three vegetables, asparagus, green beans and corn, which often mature at the same time. One lot of each vegetable was prepared by the recommended scalding while another lot was frozen without preheating. Ears of corn were shucked, packaged and frozen, while others vere frozen in the shuck.

All the vegetables frozen with out preheating developed off flavors within a month, but those scalded before freezing showed litle or no change Unscaided and frozen green beans and asparagus lost their attractive color as well
