

## Chillicothe outlasts Lazbuddie, 36-35 in six-man playoffs

SILVERTON — Riding a 30 mph wind, the Chillicothe punt disappeared into the Lake McKenzie mist before reappearing out-of-bounds near the Lazbuddie 20-yard line.

Lazbuddie calmly marched the ball 58 yards against the wind and into the mist and took its first lead since the game was in its infancy when Brice Foster swept in from 10 yards out.

Two minutes later and trailing by one point, the Longhorns faced the same conditions and nearly the same distance.

Slightly more than three minutes were left. Plenty of time.

Lazbuddie picked up a first down near field but time was getting tight. The clock was closing in on a minute and Lazbuddie was out of time outs.

But on the next play, the Longhorns season came to a sudden stop. Justin St. Clair, who has won so many games in his three years, bobbled a simple pitchout and then was stripped of the ball.

Chillicothe recovered deep inside Longhorn territory and held on for a wild 36-35 win in a regional six-man playoff game Friday at Payne Field.

It was Lazbuddie's fourth turnover of the game.

"When you get this deep into the playoffs, usually the team that makes the least mistakes that wins," Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson said. "Tonight, the best team won. I'm not saying their best team, I'm just saying they were tonight."

"That's what makes this loss so tough is for the seniors . . ." Scisson said. "In our hearts, we felt we were a real good football team and had the opportunities to win, we just had too many mistakes."

The game was expected to a typical high-scoring

six-man game, with the last team with the ball getting the win.

That's what was on Chillicothe coach Galen Smart's mind after the Eagles took the lead on Samuel Pitts third touchdown run.

"Yeah, I was afraid we might have scored too soon," said Smart, with

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## Battle brewing over home health

Local doctor questions Methodist Hospital's intentions

A local physician Thursday told the Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board that the current competition for home health patients with its Lubbock affiliate is unhealthy.

Muleshoe physician Mark McClanahan claims Lubbock Methodist Hospital is using questionable tactics to steal away home health patients, a practice that could one day lead to the hospital district closing its doors.

"I would liken it to a leach that is sucking blood from us," said McClanahan, a member of the Muleshoe Area Medical Center medical staff. "And when you're anemic, you can't afford that."

"In a hospital this size, a few patients can be the difference between keeping the doors open or closing the hospital."

Under contractual agreement, Lubbock Methodist supplies MAHD with its administrator.

"We've heard some of the concerns, but were not sure of the total depth of the issue," MAHD Administrator Jim Bone said.

McClanahan claims when local referral patients to Methodist Hospital are released, they are given virtually no choice of their home health care provider. Instead of being given choice that should include the Muleshoe Area Home Health center, discharge planners simply set up patients with Methodist's home health division.

McClanahan said his complaints about this unfair practice

to Methodist officials has fallen on deaf ears.

"Our home health agency is left virtually out of the equation, and I have a real problem with that," McClanahan said. "The hospital board should be aware that unless Methodist changes its tactics, they are your enemy."

Home health is a lucrative, fast-growing industry as third-party providers like Medicare and insurance companies continue to emphasize shorter hospital stays, a major health care cost.

The number of home health agencies in Texas has grown from less than 200 in 1980 to 3,650 today. The Muleshoe Home Health, which averages between 1,500-1,600 visits a month, totaled more than \$1 million in gross revenues last year.

"It's a darn shame that it has to be as competitive as it is," said Ray Mason, a vice-president with Lubbock Methodist who regularly attends MAHD

department, will not be open Thanksgiving Day and the day after.

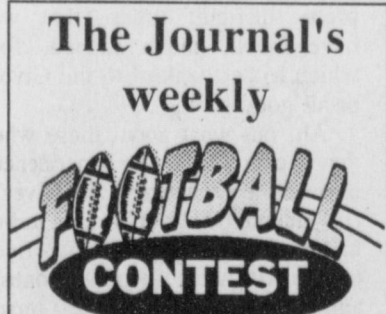
Many other volunteers also delivered meals last Thanksgiving.

"What was good is we won on the road when we weren't shooting the ball well," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "We had to earn everything we got."

Muleshoe shot 32 percent from the field, making just 1 of 16 3-pointers.

Sophomore post Dustin Cleavinger had his biggest night of the year for the Mules (3-0), scoring a game-high 19 points and grabbing 13 rebounds. Douglass

Field and Chris Shelburne added 9 points each.

Mason described the game as "a blood and guts game," with plenty of banging and few whistles inside.

Sundown (0-2) tied the game at 62 with seven seconds left on Jason Holdman's 3-pointer, and had a chance to win it when MHS committed a quick turnover.

Field rebounded an errant Sundown shot as the buzzer sounded and was fouled.

After a heated five-minute debate on whether the foul was before or after the buzzer — and apparently

who was fouled — the officials put McClanahan at the line.

McClanahan (5 points, 10 rebounds) sank both free throws.

"I was confident either one would make at least one," Mason said.

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## New Farm Credit loans exceed \$400 million in '96

AUSTIN — New Farm Credit loans for rural properties thus far this year have surpassed new loan origination volume of any year in the Farm Credit Bank of Texas' history. The bank, which finances rural land and homes through 46 Federal Land Bank Associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, reported year-to-date new mortgage loan originations totaling \$418 million.

"In the first nine months of the year, we already had eclipsed our previous annual new loan record of \$408.2 million set in 1981," said Arnold R. Henson, chief executive of-

ficer. "We project we will exceed \$500 million in new volume by year-end 1996."

Henson attributed several factors to the record-setting new loan growth — a generally favorable economic climate, increased marketing efforts and favorable interest rates through much of the year.

According to third-quarter financial results released today, total loan volume in the district was \$3.85 billion at Sept. 30, 1996, a net increase of 2.3 percent from year end. The district also includes 16 Production Credit Associations

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meetings. "But the competition for dollars is here and it is not going to get any better."

McClanahan said he knows of at least a dozen patients who are not under Muleshoe Home Health care that he feels should be.

"I agree with Dr. McClanahan that this hospital needs its ancillary services to survive," Mason said. "It needs them all. I agree with that."

"But it's hard for me or Dr. McClanahan to know if the patients are being given a choice. They need to be given a choice. But we need to know for sure."

McClanahan said Methodist officials simply won't listen.

"I've talked with St. Mary (Hospital) and Highland (Hospital), and it hasn't fallen of deaf ears," McClanahan said. "For the time being, they've done what we've asked them to do."

"Methodist is supposed to be an affiliate, but they're screwing you," McClanahan told the board.

"That's kind of harsh," Mason fired back.

Later, Mason asked McClanahan if he would would be the same if it was St. Mary that he was talking about?

"I'd do the same thing," said

McClanahan, who is employee by St. Mary.

Board President Buck Campbell said the board has been aware of the problem for years, but is not sure what they can do.

"We've been fighting this directly or indirectly for years," Campbell said.

The board discussed possible solutions, including an advertising and educational campaign to remind area residents of the district's home health service.

McClanahan said it's time to exert more pressure. He wants an administrative directive issued demanding that all

patients be given a choice of home health services.

"Maybe its time we started a grass roots effort among regional outlay hospitals to affect purse strings so we can affect policies," McClanahan said.

He firmly believes patients referred to Lubbock hospitals should be returned to the communities they live in for ancillary and extension services.

"My emotions run high because I have a vested interest," McClanahan said. "We've gone through the typical channels and that hasn't worked. It's time to take extreme measures to affect change because they are jeopardizing our existence."

Watson Junior High School used a twist on the classic fairy tale to win second place at the 1-3A one-act play contest.

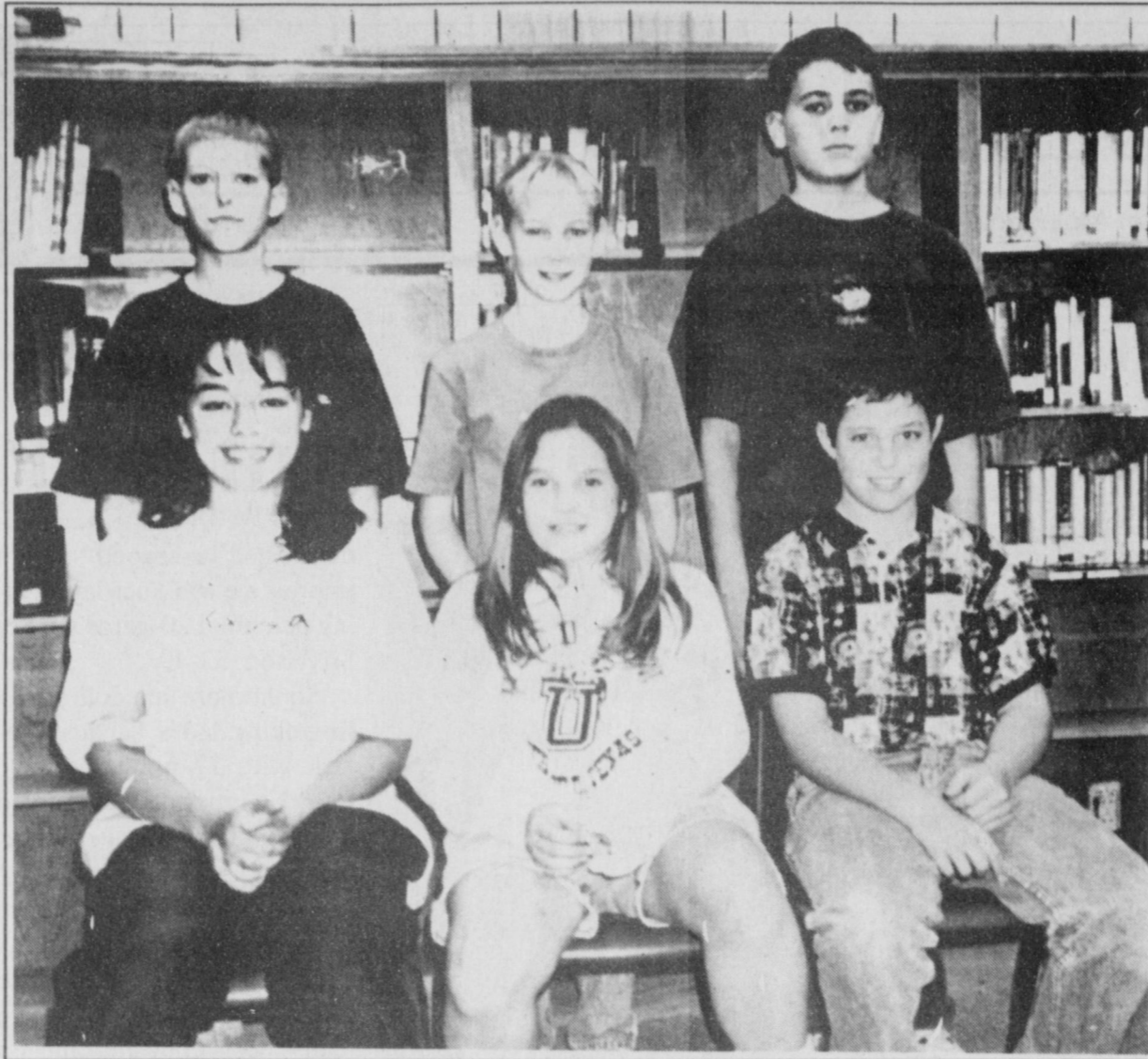
The WJHS theater department presented the play "East of the Sun and West of the Moon."

"This was real important. We needed to experience winning," Gruhlkey said. "We have a lot of tough games coming up, so we need to offset them by winning some of the easier ones."

plays to go 30 yards for the winning score.

Foster finished with 92 yards and scored four touchdowns for Lazbuddie (10-2). St. Clair added 91 yards rushing and a touchdown as the Longhorns finished with 342 total yards.

But the 'Horns normally efficient passing game struggled. St. Clair and sophomore Josh Morris combined to complete just 10 of 26 passes.

"They were not going to give up the pass," Scisson said.

Chillicothe jumped out to a 24-14 lead with 20 second as left in the first quarter behind standout running back Henry Kendrick.

Kendricks, who had Longhorn defenders tackling air early with classic cutback moves, turned a swing pass into a 35-yard touchdown to give Chillicothe a 16-14 lead.

Then with LHS focused on stopping the sweep, Kendrick pulled up and threw a 34-yard

scoring pass to Joseph Blevins to make it 24-14.

Kendricks finished with 101 yards on 17 carries, but wasn't much of a factor after the first quarter when Lazbuddie defenders started staying home to guard against cutbacks.

Chillicothe stretched its lead to 30-21, taking advantage of

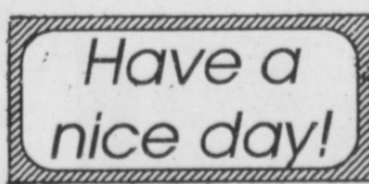
another Morris fumble deep inside Lazbuddie's own end.

Muleshoe's 3-0 start is somewhat of a surprise on the heels of a 5-23 season.

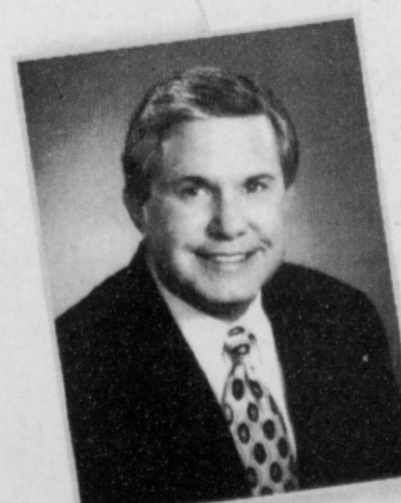
"I started 3-0 my first season here," said Mason, in his third year at MHS. "I'd like to go ahead and top that."

## "809" area code scam sweeping the country

People should be suspicious of ads or recordings referring you to call phone numbers with an 809 area code - it could cost you \$100 or more! The 809 area code is not located in the U.S. and therefore it is not covered under any U.S. regulation for 900 numbers which require that you be notified and warned of charges and rates involved when you call a pay-per-call number. The scam works several different ways - one is sent via e-mail typically with a subject line of "Alert" or "Unpaid Account". Another version is a phone or pager scam.

It works like this: You receive a message on your answering machine or pager which asks you to call a number beginning with area code 809. The sender uses tactics like making it sound like an emergency OR you may be told you have won a wonderful prize.

Remember, no matter how you get the message, if you are asked to call a number with an 809 area code that you do not recognize, or were not expecting, give us a call or simply disregard the message.

## Grain markets dive after summer highs

Grain markets are taking a dive after this summer's high prices.

The high grain prices earlier this year prompted foreign growers to plant more land. Their bumper crops are decreasing demand for U.S. grain exports, helping send U.S. crop prices down and reviving old trade tensions, the Wall Street Journal reports.

The price received in October by U.S. corn farmers sank 18 percent from September to \$2.91 a bushel, partly because the harvest underway in the Midwest is bigger than forecast. Some traders have increased their corn harvest estimates by 8 percent to about 9.2 billion bushels, a 25 percent bigger crop than last year's.

A harvest of that size would

replenish the U.S. stored-corn supply, which was 426 million bushels on Sept. 1, the lowest level in two decades. Some analysts say there will be enough corn left over from the new crop for a billion-bushel cushion next-year.

Grain traders and economists disagree over whether corn prices are headed back toward the low \$2-per-bushel level of the early 1990s. Corn farmers are expected to plant near their full capacity next spring. With good weather, that could generate a record crop of more than 10.1 billion bushels, which could lift stockpiles to the levels they were in the early 1990s.

However, some analysts speculate that corn will settle

at a higher price than earlier in the decade because demand is stronger now - in part because the United States exports more corn-fed meat. David Nelson, an agribusiness analyst at NatWest Securities Corp., says U.S. farm-level price for corn might stabilize around \$2.85 a bushel for the rest of the 1990s.

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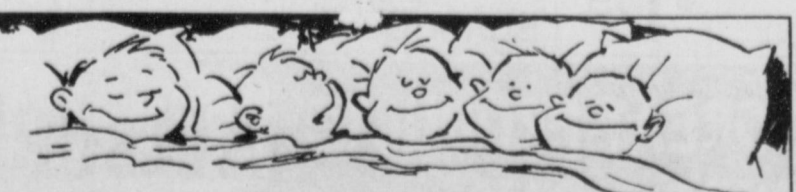
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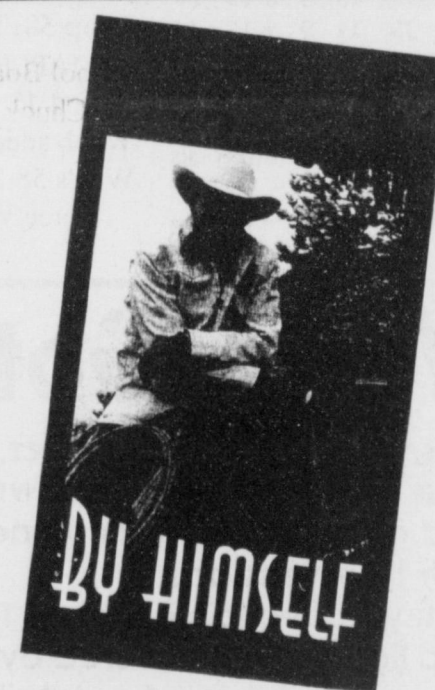
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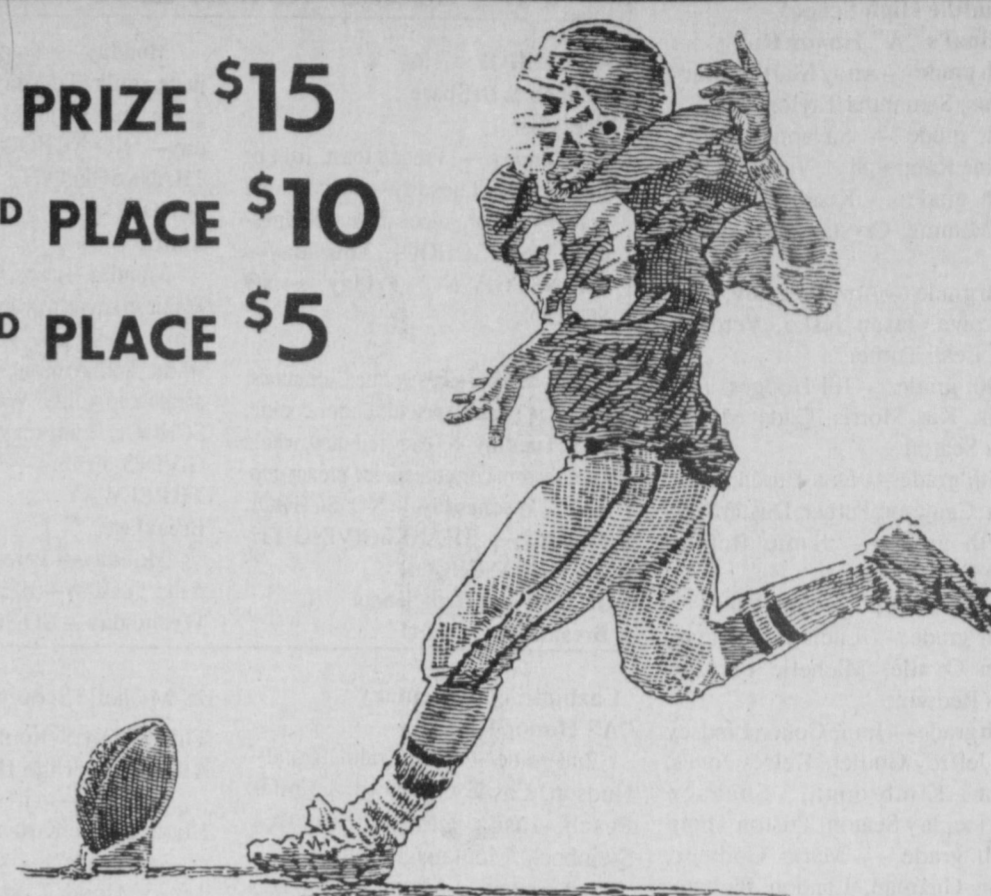
