## **Statement Submitted On County Salaries**

The County Judge and members of the commissioners court this week submit the following statement in regard to the present salary schedule of county officials:

The Commissioners Court meeting in regular session on January 14, 1952 voted to approve the county budget for 1952 as recommended by the county auditor.

Schleicher has operated on a fee basis in the past, but recent legislation enables counties of this size to go on a salary basis, and after much thought the Court decided that it's unfair to some county officials to continue the fee system. Hereafter all fees from all county officers will be turned in to the officers' salary fund. Salaries of the elective officers were set as follows:



Your present Court has also seen fit to raise the road employees' salary to about \$300.00 month. The employees at the court house have also had salary increases under the present Court.

We have at this time a valuation of about 8 million dollars, and it is possible that in 1952 our valuation will raise to 10 millions-a conservative figure. The Court has made quite a few progressive steps in the past year, such as the new county warehouse, several new 14 ft. cattle guards, new roads-to mention a few. We were paying \$75 per month rent on an old warehouse before we built our own county barn. We now save the rent money and provide a better place for our tools, supplies, and equipment. The new barn is paid for, and there are no old outstanding bills. All operating funds are in better condition than a year ago; that can be checked by consulting the quarterly reports which are printed three months. The public is



Out of 35,000 lives lost in traffic accidents in 1950, 26,700 were sacrificed on the altar of carelessness. Speed—excessive, killing speed—accounted for nearly half that number. Speed, claiming 13,300 dead and 475,000 injured victims in a single year, is the nation's Killer No. 1.

While all traffic deaths declined rom 1946 through 1949, even then fatalities on the open road kept creeping up. In 1950 a deadly spurt of speed accidents claimed 3,200 more victims in rural areas than it had the year before. Last year speed deaths again mounted.

Why do drivers race so heedlessly to destruction on the highway? Hardly to save time. Scorching at 70 is an invitation to disaster. Over any distance, 50 m.p.h. takes only a few minutes longer and offers a better chance of a safe arrival.

When you start out with your family or friends, discount speed before you take off. Give yourself and others in your car an extra margin of safety by leaving earlier and holding your speed within bounds. It's your responsibility to them and to others on the road.

Remember-more than one out of every three fatal accidents is due to speed.

The plot will be curbed next week with the City of Sonora, Sutton county and the Sonora Lions club each bearing one third of the \$550 cost.





In addition to the students listed above who earned the averages shown for all credit subjects, there were 62 other students who made honor roll grades in one or more subjects; 17 who made such grades in two or more subjects; and three who received grades of honor roll caliber in three subjects. Thus, in summary, we find that, from a total enrollment of 232 students, 34 or nearly 15% earned honor roll grades in all credit subjects and these together with the 62 others referred to above make up a total of 96 students who earned honor roll grades in one or more subjects, Fraker concluded.

"On my honor I will do my best To do my duty to God and my country, and to obey the Scout Law.



As the district had several pounds of seed on hand for trial plantings of this nature, it was agreed that the district would furnish what seed they

had if she would buy the additional amount of seed needed to plant the 31-acre field to grass. Reaching this agreement we began making plans to make the planting some time in March, 1950. Soil conservation service technicians recommended the kinds and amount of seed needed to plant the field and suggested they be purchased in ad-

vance of the planting time. March 22, 1950, Mrs. Finnigan hired Howard Mittel to plant the grass seed with his dad's grass drill. The grass seed were planted in the middles of the previous year's grain sorghum stubble on a firm seed bed. Technicians helped Mittel plant the grass at the proper depth and made adjustments to see that it was covered with the right amount of soil. This planting

consisted of 93 rows of King Ranch bluestem, 60 rows of blue panicum, 36 rows of green sprangletop, 16 rows of weeping lovegrass, 12 rows of Lehman's lovegrass and 78 rows of Madrid sweet clover.

Very little rain fell until August 1951, when 3.6 inches fell in just a few hours.

The sprangletop seemed to have turned green overnight. It wasn't but a few days until seed heads began to appear. Mrs. Finnigan nad just finished hoeing the sprangletop when the rain came. The grass was plowed a few weeks after the rain to eliminate com-petition. In a few days it looked as if the grass had completely turned to seed.

Technicians assisting the district helped Mrs Finnigan harvest the seed on October 8 and 9, with a "Nisbet Bug Catcher" belonging to Henry Mittel. The seed was recleaned by sifting it through a fine screen wire. When weighed it totaled 34 pounds of clean seed. This amount of seed was harvested from approximately four acres. Considering the small amount of rainfall received during the year this was determined as a good vield.

After the seed was harvested the gate was opened and cattle and sheep were all allowed to graze the field. In just a few days the spangletop was grazed to the ground. Several ranchers saw the grass

Mrs. Finnigan set a price of \$3.00 per pound for the seed and gave the nursery the option of buying all or any part of it (34 pounds), which they bought every pound at the quoted price.
