Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran and Chief Deputy George Arispe arrested two juvenile males at Eldorado Middle School on Tuesday, December 8th and charged them with possession of a firearm on school property. The pair were handed over to Juvenile Officer Gary Smith from San Angelo. A .25 caliber automatic pistol was confiscated by the officers from the home of one of the juveniles.

According to Sheriff Doran the arrests stemmed from a recent incident at a basketball game where the pistol was observed in the possession of one of the juveniles.
