# Car Wreck Saturday Takes Life L. Moore Announces For Commissioner of J. B. Christian, Local Banker

dent of the First National Bank, and pioneer Schleicher County resident, died at 6:00 p.m., March 15, following a car wreck in which Mrs. Christian, driver of the car, was badly injured.

Mr. and Mrs. Christian were returning from San Angelo in their 1950 Plymouth when their car joined momentarily with an automobile driven by Capt. Lawrence James Young, of Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo, who was attempting to pass the Christians car, both going south.

The San Angelo car bumped into the concrete bridge when the driver failed to pass the slow-moving Christian automobile, but remained upright.

The Plymouth went off a grading, turned over, and came to rest on the fence, at the edge of the right-of-way. Witnesses state that Mr. Christian was thrown free of the car, his body describing an arc through the air, until he came down 35 feet away. Mrs. Christian was pinned under the car.

The accident occurred at the concrete Bois d'Arc Draw Bridge six miles south of Christoval.

"The germs gain entrance to the body through the mouth," Dr. Cox said, "and then make their way to the intestines in the same manner in which food does. When they reach the intestines they find conditions favorable to their growth, and there they establish themselves at the expense of the person infected and produce their harmful effects."

Dr. Cox warned that dysentery affects young children more often and more seriously than adults, frequently resulting fatally; however, he said, it may occur at any age. It is usually more prevalent during the summer season, and the great number of cases now being reported are unusual for spring.

"The germ is always expelled with the excreta of persons sick with dysentery and may continue to be expelled for some time after the patient recovers from the dis ease. These persons who still discharge the germs after they recover are called carriers, and they oc cur more frequently in this disease than in the majority of other infectious diseases

# **Check The Canner**

COLLEGE STATION-The time to check the pressure canner is before the spring vegetables are ready to can. Foods and nutrition specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, point out that repairs and replacement of worn parts as well as the adjustment of working parts should be made now. Inspect the canner, they say, for cracks, pits, marks, and corrosion. If these are found, the canner has not been properly handled, used nor cared for.

Check the type of gasket used on the canner. If it is metal to metal, examine for binding. Binding may be caused by dirt or corrosion.

Scour, if needed, with fine powder, never use harsh scouring powders. If this type of gasket leaks, apply a thin coat of salt free fat. If the cooker has a removable rubber gasket, remove it and wash thoroughly in hot soap suds, then stretch it, turn it over and replace on the canner. Then test for a perchase a new rubber gasket, say the specialists, and get the type recommended by the manufacturer. Be sure, warn the specialists,

that the petcock is clean and in good working order. A toothpick can be used to clean the opening. that might be found, soak the parts in perfect working order.




