## **Insect Control Steps** Suggested By Agent

Gardeners should have and keep on hand a variety of insecticides to keep the vegetables, fruits and shrubs free of insect pests.

Here are common garden and fruit insects that the vegetable grower will encounter in the county. Control measures are given Flea beetles: 5% DDT dust or

Leaf hoppers, leaf beetles and thrips: 5% DDT dust.

Web worms and leaf eating insects: Cryolite, rotenone 1%, 5%

Aphids: 3% nicotine dust. Thrips: 0.1% pryethins. Cut worms: poison baits. Stink Bugs, harlequin bugs and squash bugs: Sabadilla dust 20%. Blister beetles: Cryolite dust. Crickets: Poison bran mash.



## Fixed Time (Stop and Go) Highway Traffic Signals

What do you know about highway traffic signals? If your knowledge is limited to the fact that you go when the signal shows green and stop when it shows red, you can make the problem of traffic control an easier one for your public officials by knowing more about traffic signals.

You can help bring about uniformity of traffic signals by learning to identify the standard traffic signal and then encouraging your officials to use only standard types when they install new signals or replace existing non-standard signals. Wouldn't it be much easier for you to understand the indicaions given by traffic signals if they were all of the same design and safe flow of traffic. On the n every town and state? The standard position of the lenses is not only helpful to every motorist, but it is especially helpful to the color blind who can tell whether to stop or go by the difference in brightness of enses when they cannot distinguish

Another common fallacy is that a single stop and go signal can control speed, and this belief has resulted in a number of unjustified signals. The signal may slow down the speed demon or even stop him while the signal is red, but while the signal showing green, it only offers a challenge for this speed demon to go faster to get by it before it does turn red. ## Surplus Material from White House To Be Sent To All the States

By Cong. O. C. Fisher Surplus material being removed from the White House will be disposed over the Nation, mainly to museums, schools and other organizations, according to the Commission on Renovation of the Executive Mansion.

Senators and Congressmen have been asked to invite such groups in their states and districts to apply. In processing all applica-tions, the Commission will be guided by these factors.

1. An equitable nationwide, nonpartisan, non-sectarian, and non-commercial distribution, based on population quotas.

2. Major items of high historical importance should be allocated to the larger museums or similar institutions of a public character.

3. The costs of distribution should be self-liquidating.

4. No charge will be made for the material, but the recipients should pay the costs of packing, shipping and transportation.

Other than the museum pieces,

the material comprises the usual defective lumber, bricks, etc., which would result from the reconstruction of any building. There will be stone, brick, pine timbers, floor boards, oldfashioned nails, wrought iron bands, hand-hewn lath, and small plaster ornaments.

The handling costs, which will include classifying, selecting, cutting, wrapping, etc., will vary with the demand and with the size of the articles. They may run from 50c for a small article to as much as \$100 for enough stone to face a fireplace or a shrine.

All applications must be filed with the Commission before June 15. If eligible applicants in our district should be interested in being considered, they may so indicate to me and the Commission will be advised.

Belief In Christ

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish but have everlasting life." This, a beautiful passage in the Bible points out the first step a man must take in becoming a Christian. We must all believe in Christ in order for us to be saved. There are several points that I wish to discuss in regard to believing in Christ. They concern some modern conceptions of the act.

modern conceptions of the act.

First of all, many professed Christians today claim to have been saved by faith, and faith only. Their key passage is John 3:16. They believe that all you have to do to be saved is believe in Christ. Yet, these same people know that you must repent in order to be saved, yet John 3:16 says nothing about repentance. Now we read in Luke 13:3, "Except ye repent you shall all likewise perish." Both of these commands are binding on us today, yet neither mentions the other. So a man cannot be saved by merely believing and not repenting can he? No, for the "Devils-believed and trembled." James 2:19. Now if we can see that we must repent before we can be we can see that we must repent before we can be saved, yet it isn't found in John 3:16, could we not see that other things not found there would be just

as binding?
Next, I'd like to take up the thought that a man

is justified by faith ONLY and not works. To advance this thought, I shall let the Apostle James speak and you may judge for yourselves. The word of God is so clear that it needs no comment, James 2:14-26. "What doth it profit brethren though a man say he hath faith and have not works? Can faith save him? '. Even so faith, if it hath not works is dead, being alone. Yea, a man may say thou hast faith and I have works; show me thy faith without thy works. being alone. Yea, a man may say thou hast faith and I have works: show me thy faith without thy works, and I will shew thee my faith BY MY WORKS. Thou believeth there is one God, thou doest well: the devils also believe and tremble. But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith WITHOUT WORKS IS DEAD?

Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith ONLY. . . As the body without the spirit is dead, so FAITH WITHOUT WORKS IS DEAD ALSO." In Heb. 11:6 we find "But without faith it is impossible to please him . . ." So we cannot please God without faith. Yet a dead faith cannot please God without faith. Yet a dead faith cannot please him, it must be alive. What makes it alive? WORKS!! Hence we cannot please God without a living faith made so by works. "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified and not by faith only." Friends we are justified in the sight of God by our works. 
For the stew the homemaker may have her meat dealer cut uniform cubes from the round or shoulder of veal. To make the stew the veal cubes are browned in hot fat, the meat is covered with liquid and seasonings such as bay leaf, peppercorns, and cloves are added. The cooking utensil is tightly covered and the meat allowed to slowly simmer for 2 to 21/2 hours or until the cubes are tender

So the vegetables will be just on the done side, they are added near the end of cooking time. Vegetables which may be added are meat with cream-style corn. In new potatoes, carrots, onions, green pepper. To keep their bright color, new peas or green beans are cooked separately.




