

Irrigation Water Cost Is Figured

COLLEGE STATION - It costs between \$4,000 and \$5,000 to dev elop and equip a new irrigation well on the High Plains of Texas, according to a study just published by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

These averages are based on installation and operation costs re ported during 1947, 1948 and 1949 in a study of a yearly average of 176 wells in Lubbock, Hockley, Hale, Floyd and Swisher counties. Present costs may be somewhat higher than during the period of the study.

Installation costs included the drilling, casing an dspillway for the well, which averaged \$1,272. Purchase and operating costs are given for four types of power units ed by the careful execution of a used to pump irrigation wells. These were electric engines, small and large automobile engines and industrial engines. Respective initial costs during the period of this study were \$720, \$485, \$782 and

An average of 126 acre-feet of was operated with electricity, butane, gasoline or natural gas. Price ranges are shown for each kind of

The study, reported in Bulletin 745, briefs the historical development of irrigation from wells on the Texas High Plains. About 1,-860,000 acres of Plains land were irrigated in 1950 from about 14,-000 wells. Most of this development has taken place since 1934, with the greatest expansion since 1945. Well drilling continued at a rapid rate

Cooperating in the study were the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology of the Texas Station and the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

A well drawn contract is designed to avoid the unfortunate disputes which are usually based on honest misunderstanding, and not the most important functions servcontract is the preservation of busmess friendship.

Nearly every day all of us are making agreements with our fellow citizens. We base our plans and decisions on the faith that such agreements will be carried out. The the faith of our employer's agreefree enterprise and trade is based, to a large extent, upon mutual agreements or promises to do something in the future.

Oral or written, such agreements are usually contracts. Probably the great majority of contracts that we enter into are never put into written form. Generally speaking, you can enter into a verbal agreement that is just as binding as a written contract. The important thing for each party to remember is to make the agreement or understanding perfectly clear whether it is oral or written. Usually you will find that the best way to do this is to put it into a written contract. Exact terms of an oral contract may be difficult to establish if a disagreement arises.

It is easy enough to define a contract as an agreement between two or more people where each of the parties does something or promises to do something in return for the act or promise of the other. The real problem is to be actually certain what each party has agreed

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



But, points out the specialist, not all terraces can be placed next to the house, sometimes it is better to build them around a group of trees for shade.

The terrace may be covered with grass, native stones cemented together or it may be made of conerete or brick. Sand is used some times, but this is undesirable be cause the sand is tracked into the house. Many terraces are covered with grass but after a spring shower it may be several hours before it can be used.

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
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
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
