#### **Directions Given** For Winter Car Care

Winter weather has arrived in exas. The last "blue norther" setled the question. The rapid changes that can be expected in the weaher during the next few months can be taken in stride and without lisrupting the farm chores and operations if farm machinery is corectly winterized, says W. L. Ulich, xtension agricultural engineer of Texas A&M College.

The radiators on all motors that require liquid for cooling should be drained and filled with a good The der head or radiator on the tractor, car, truck or pick-up is not only an expensive way to find out how cold it is on the outside, but delays caused from having the equipment laid-up in the garage may be even more expensive than the actual repair job, says Ulich.

Before filling radiators with antifreeze, Ulich says they should be cleaned. All hose connections should be checked and if the hose is damaged, it should be replaced. Most anti-freeze will leak through holes that do not show up when water is used. Use enough of the anti-freeze to give the motor all of the protection it will need even in the coldest weather, says Ulich. The radiator so unusually cold weather will not way. catch you with a weak solution in the radiators of your machines, says Ulich.







Deer points out that lice cause damage in several ways. Lousy cattle do not put on weight as rapidly as those that are free from lice and they present an unthrifty appearance. Cattle infested with lice usuhymn. After a short business ses- ally have an unthrifty looking coat of hair for the irritations caused by the lice cause them to scratch or rub their bodies against trees, or other structures. Dairy cattle, heavily infested with lice, fall off in production even when they are fed well, says Deer.

He says that the degree of cattle louse infestation is also closely correlated with the amount of anemia present in cattle. Animals that have anemia do not do well because of a shortage of blood.

Deer recommends two methods of control. Beef cattle, he says, may be dipped or sprayed with a mixture of five-tenths percent DDT plus three-hundredths percent gamma BHC. If lindane is available, Mrs. O. C. James and son of Big Deer says a mixture of eight pounds of 50 percent wettable DDT and one pound of 25 percent lindane per 100 gallons of water may be used. A spray containing five-tenths percent toxaphene is also recommended for controlling lice on beef cattle.

Since sprays or dips containing DDT are not recommended for use on dairy cattle, Deer says that a mixture containing eight pounds of 50 percent methoxychlor and one bound of 25 percent lindane in 100 gallons of water may be uesd. This mixture should be applied as a spray.

Deer says Texas livestock producers are losing millions of dollars annually because they are not controlling the lice that infest their animals. At the present time, only about 30 percent of the cattle in Texas are treated to control these parasites. He suggests that you ask your local county agent for a copy of B-158, "External Parasites of Livestock" and that you also discuss with him the problems related to the control of external livestock parasites in your area.



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



**Holiday Cookies** 

Broadcast: December 2, 1950 3 cups sifted, all-purpose flour 4 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt

Turn on oven; set at moderate (375°). Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Put shortening and vanilla into bowl. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Stir in about ½ of flour mixture. Stir in half of milk. Repeat until all flour and milk are used. Turn out on lightly floured board. Roll ½ in. thick. Cut into desired shapes with floured cutter. Put on greased baking sheet. Bake on oven shelf slightly above center 10 min., or until brown. Cool before frosting. Garnish, if desired, with colored sugar, silver dragees or candy decorations and strips of candied fruits. Makes about 6 doz. 2¾-in. cookies.
