March 1-3 Is Date Of Angelo Stock Show

This announcement was made by H. E. McCulloch, general chairman for the 1951 show.

Divisions in the cattle department will be Herefords, Aberdeen-Angus, Brahmans, and fat steers.

Tax Issue Carries

The City of Junction was authorized Saturday to issue tax supported bonds totaling \$175,000 for water and sewer extensions and improvements.

For a waterworks bond issue of \$85,000 the votes cast Saturday were 219 for and 43 against.

On the proposed sewer bond issue of \$90,000 the vote was 218 for to 41 against.

It was the second time within a year city residents went to the polls to vote on a city bond issue for such improvements.

On October 29, 1949, a bond issue totaling \$310,000 was rejected.

The city administration has pointed out that extensions and improvements have been recommended by the State Health Department.

The Chamber of Commerce reported that by actual count 145 new homes or apartment units and 30 new business establishments in addition to motels, tourist courts and expanded and remodeled business houses have been built since the war in Junction. Fifty of the new homes are west of 20th Street beyond which no fire plugs are provided. —Junction Eagle.

Fires Of Freedom To Mark Dec. 7th

Governor Allan Shivers today urged all Texans to join with the 777 American Legion Posts in Texas to dramatize Democracy's strength in the lighting of hundreds of "Fires of Freedom" on December 7, proclaimed by him as "Operation Democracy" Day.

State Legion Commander Bill Elkins of Killeen had previously announced that Governor Shivers will set off the first fire at seven o'clock on the night of December 7, on the State Capitol grounds as the signal

for a chain of more than 600 other freedom fires to spring up across the state.

In the Governor's Official Memorandum setting December 7 aside as "Operation Democracy" Day, he described the freedom fires as "symbols of hope to penetrate the darkness behind the iron curtain." He praised the Legion-sponsored campaign for an alert and aggressive citizenry "to make Democracy truly live."

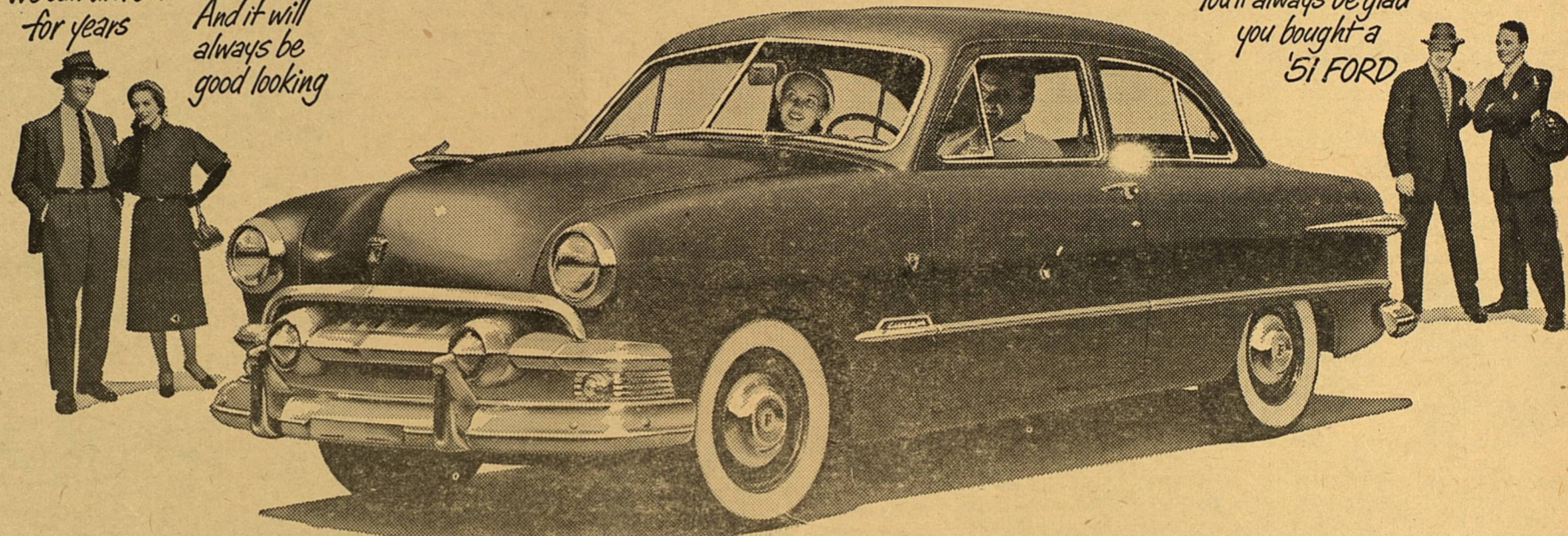

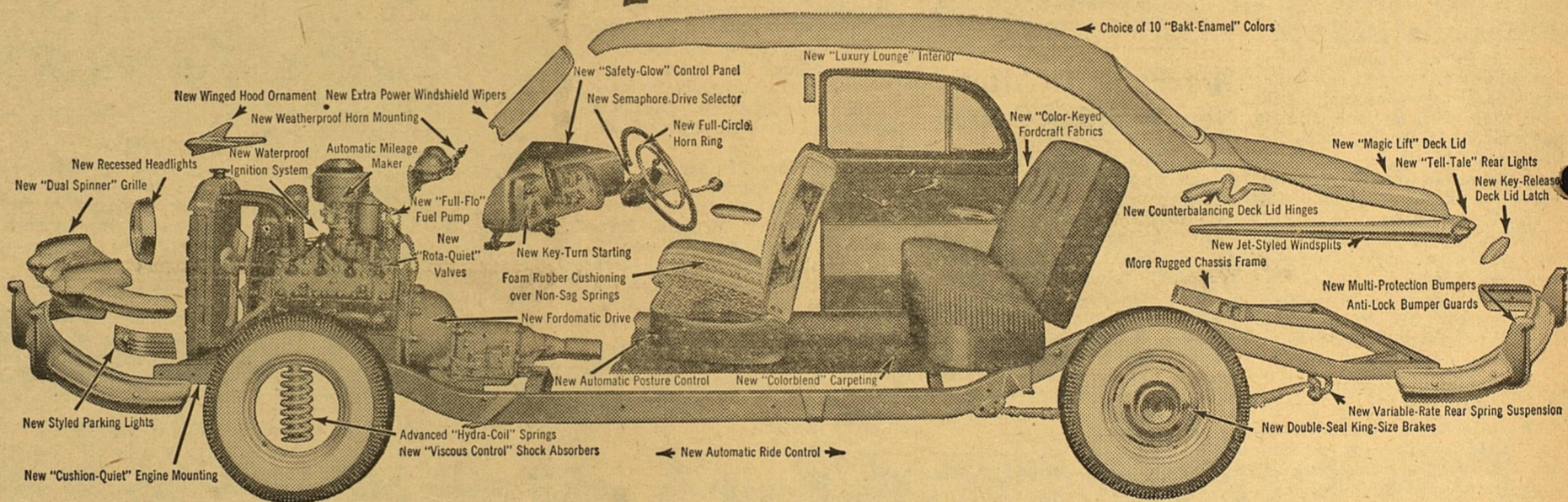

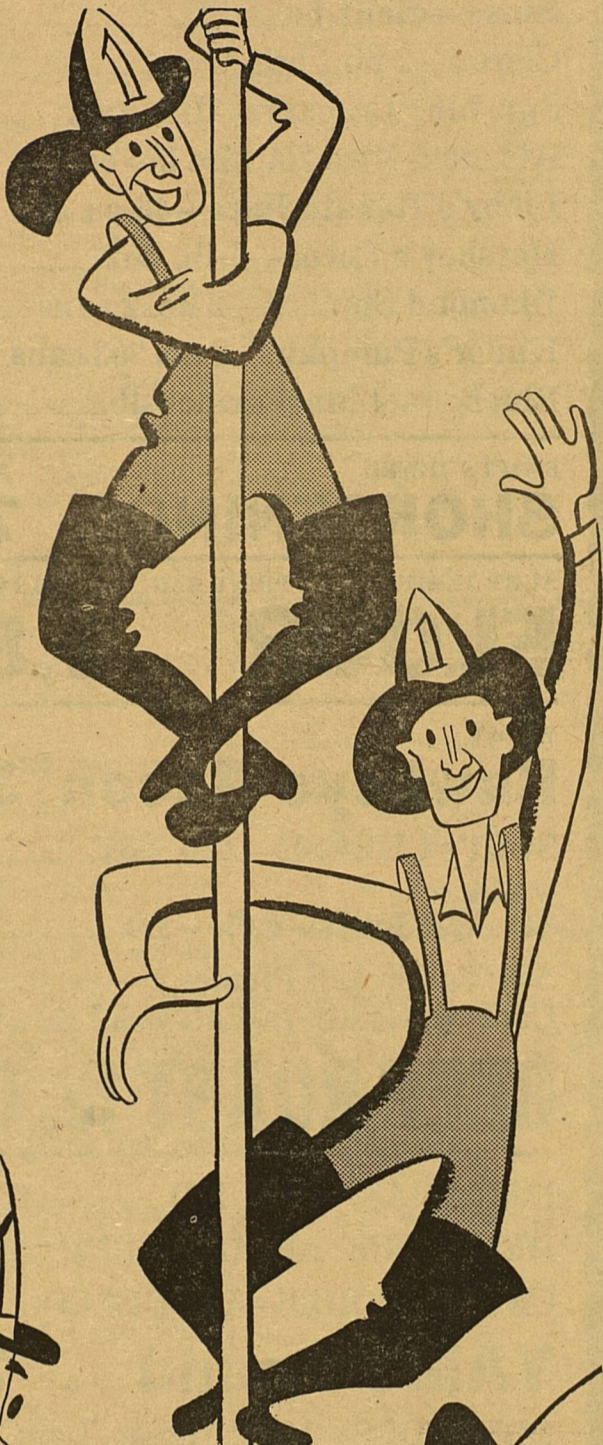

Courthouse Fire

Fire, originating in the office of the Justice of Peace, did considerable damage to the Brewster County courthouse Monday night. The blaze was discovered by Ray Garnett, son of Justice of the Peace R. C. Garnett, and the alarm sounded about 9 o'clock. Cause of the fire has not been determined.

Mr. Garnett said Tuesday evening that practically all of his civil records, and his dockets were lost. Current records, not yet completely filed, were salvaged, he said. Some physical evidence in certain cases was lost. Office furniture, fixtures and the rather large law library were damaged, some of it beyond salvage. Most of the books in the library may be saved by rebinding.

To the building itself, built in 1887, an unestimated amount of damage was done. —Alpine Avalanche.

A tentative list of Sutton County veterans of World War I, or veterans who enlisted from Sutton County in 1917-1918, was released this week by Mrs. Roy E. Aldwell, chairman of the memorial committee, which will place a memorial bearing the names of veterans of both wars in the nearly-completed Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Aldwell pointed out that the list herewith published is as complete as the committee has been able to make it. Draft board records from the first world war are virtually non-existent. —Devil's River News.

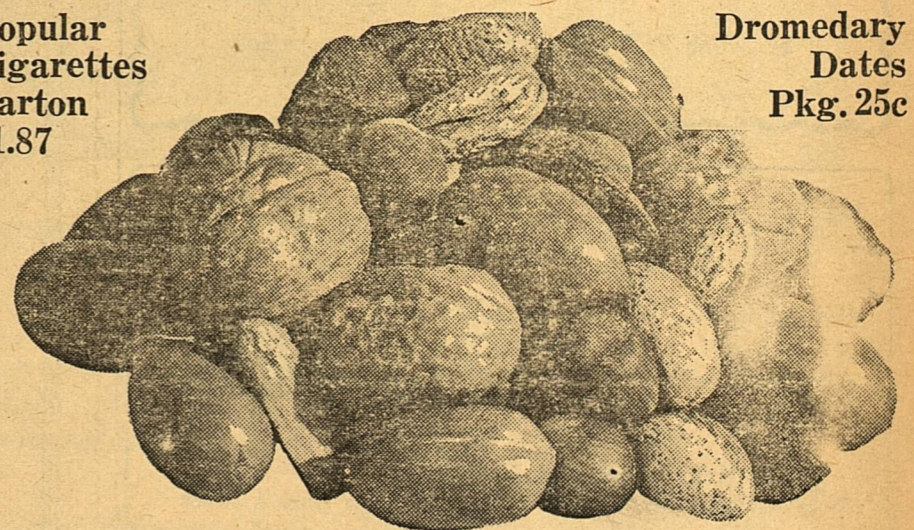
RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Holiday Cookies
Broadcast: December 2, 1950
3 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup soft shortening
½ teaspoon vanilla
1½ cups sugar
¾ cup Pet Milk

Turn on oven; set at moderate (375°). Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Put shortening and vanilla into bowl. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Stir in about ½ of flour mixture. Stir in half of milk. Repeat until all flour and milk are used. Turn out on lightly floured board. Roll ¼ in. thick. Cut into desired shapes with floured cutter. Put on greased baking sheet. Bake on oven shelf slightly above center 10 min., or until brown. Cool before frosting. Garnish, if desired, with colored sugar, silver dragees or candy decorations and strips of candied fruits. Makes about 6 doz. 2¼-in. cookies.
