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## EHS C-Country boys claim District 2-2A championship

J.V., 7th & 8th grade boys dominant, too

Eldorado's boys cross country team won the District 2-2A Meet Monday placing all six of its runners in the top ten. Daniel Mata led the charge for the Eagles with a 1st Place time of 15:44. Joseph Wink was 3rd at 16:24 while Anthony Pina placed 4th at 16:34. Johnny Lee Arispe finished 7th with a time of 17:16 and Sammy Cabrera placed 8th at 17:27. Joey Bullard rounded out the field for the Eagles with a 9th place finish at 17:41.

The Eagles varsity squad finished the meet with a winning total of 23 points while runner-up Wall had 71. Junction placed 3rd in the standings with 76 points, Ozona was 4th at 89 points, and Forsan was 5th with 91 points.

Next on the agenda for the

Eagles Varsity squad will be a trip to Lubbock on November 7th and an appearance at the Regional Meet. Eagles Coach Harvey Wink is hoping for a strong showing there and a return trip to the State Meet in Georgetown where Eldorado competed only a year ago.

In JV action the Eagles boys also won big at Junction. Josh Taylor placed 3rd with a time of 19:43, followed by Jimmy Aguilar in 4th at 20:04. Thomas Ballew was 8th at 23:55. Frank Martinez finished 9th in 25:08 and Aaron Fuentes placed 10th with a time of 25:12.

The Eighth Grade boys continued the Eagles assault by defeating Ozona, 22 to 33. Nathanael Wolfe won the event in a time of 11:54. Pedro Hernandez was 3rd at



## Ag bill includes Mohair loan program

With passage of the Agriculture Appropriations Bill and signing into law by the President, a recourse loan program was established for mohair. Congressman Henry Bonilla (R-TX) and Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) were instrumental in securing the program.

The program, which will be administered by the Farm Service Agency, will provide a one year interest free recourse loan for FY 1999 on producer owned mohair produced during or before that fis-

cal year. The loan must be repaid at the end of the one-year term. In the event of default, the borrower will be liable for any deficiency between the sale of the product and the amount of the loan.

The Mohair Council of America and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association were instrumental in bringing the plight of mohair producers to the attention of USDA Secretary Dan Glickman and the two Texas congressmen whose districts were most impacted, Henry Bonilla and Charles

Stenholm. Industry insecurity due to phase-out of the Nation Wool Act, coupled with depressed markets, brought about the huge stockpile of unsold product, primarily adult mohair.

Although wool was listed under "other fibers," specifies on wool were not spelled out as they were for mohair because only a portion of the current wool clip remains unsold. Should the wool market continue to decline, industry leaders will address the issue with their representatives.

10 years. She has completed projects in Swine, Clothing, Consumer Judging, Sheep & Goats, Food & Nutrition, Photography and Livestock Judging.




On this date in 1618 English adventurer Sir Walter Raleigh was executed by King James I. In 1923 Turkey became an independent republic after 300 years of rule by the Ottoman Empire. In 1947 General Electric Co. made the first attempt at rain-making from an airplane when pilot Vincent Schaefer dropped small dry-ice pellets into cumulus clouds over a forest fire near Concord, Ma. Although it rained almost immediately, the experiment was not considered a success. In 1956 Egypt nationalized the Suez Canal prompting conflict with Israel in which Egypt lost control of the Gaza Strip.

## Early voting ends Friday General Election is Tuesday, Nov. 3rd

Early voting turnout has been fairly heavy, that according to Schleicher County Clerk Peggy Williams who reported 213 had voted by 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday.

A race between Joe Christian and Bill Clark for the County Commissioner seat being vacated by Kerry Joy seems to be attracting the most attention. However, a write-in campaign by Marie Barrera against incumbent Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle is also drawing voters' interest. All other local races are uncontested as County

Judge Johnny Griffin, County Clerk Peggy Williams, County Treasurer Karen Henderson and County Commissioner Ross Whitten have no opponent.

Statewide, Texas Governor George W. Bush is being challenged by State Land Commissioner Garry Mauro. Lt. Governor Bob Bullock is stepping down and State Comptroller John Sharp and State Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry are embroiled in the showcase race of the season. Closer to

## Beef Check Off Questions

Lately there's been a lot of conversation about the Beef Check Off. Instituted in 1985, it coincided with an upturn in the cattle market that remained good until a couple years ago.

The cattle market has turned sour and producers are looking for someone to blame. The "packing house monopoly" has been at the top of the list as the cause for the low price for beef. But the Check Off has again been targeted as a waste of money; especially in times of economic hardship.

The opponents of the Check Off have focused on the way the money is being spent and who is spending it, as opposed to its objective... which is to promote beef to the consumer.

I was an active supporter of the Check Off from the beginning, pointing confidently to eighty cent fats and \$1.10 calves as proof of its value. It's harder on today's market to say, "Yes sir, we've got the Check Off to thank for these 58 cent cattle!"

It doesn't take a Cal Poly graduate to see that the price is directly tied to that old basic rule of supply and demand. So it is legitimate to ask what is the value of the Check Off in a low market.

I could point out that part of the Check Off dollars go to 'non-promotion' programs like research

and education. But its main thrust, to me, has always been advertising.

In the Baxter Black Philosophy of Marketing there are two kinds of ads...institutional and fire sale. Institutional is the kind banks use do to create confidence or appeal - fire sale is used cars and furniture stores.

In good times beef producers can get by with institutional advertising. "Beef... it's what's for dinner". But when the chips are down, like now, maybe we need to be helpin' the supermarket push it out the door. Co-oping with the supermarkets, advertising locally, helping the food chains put big ads for hamburger and steak in the Scott City "News Chronicle" and on the radio. In today's conditions I think that would do more good than a full page ad in "USA Today".

Different times call for different marketing approaches.

Attracting the consumer's attention is a pretty hit-and-miss business considering the number of ad agencies in the phone book and the dollars spent. But the beef industry doesn't have to look far to see advertising at its best. I wonder if it would have the same effect to show a celebrity with a BBQ sauce moustache and a cap sayin' 'Got Beef'.

## Hunting Gators Near Sabine Pass

In Anahuac, Texas, alligators outnumber people three to one. During springtime you see the big gators out on the slopes of bayous. At night you can hear them bellowing.

Alligators used to be an endangered species. No more. They came off the endangered list in 1984. It's quite all right to buy those alligator shoes, briefcases and billfolds.

Texas has more alligators than any other state except Louisiana. September is alligator hunting season in Texas. And it is a much bigger business than you might realize.

I attended my first Gatorfest this fall in Anahuac, a city on the gulf coast between Beaumont and Houston. It is an event that draws about 20,000 people. Not bad for a city with two thousand residents. The number was down a little this year because Anahuac had twelve inches of rain the day before the festival started.

Anahuac calls itself the alligator capital of Texas. The premier event at Gatorfest is the Great Texas Alligator Roundup. Hunters bring in the alligators they have caught and compete for cash prizes. The hunter with the longest alligator wins 500 dollars. This year the prize money went to Kevin Henke of Calhoun County. His gator was twelve feet, nine inches long.

At Gatorfest you can buy alligator feet, eat some alligator and take an airboat ride through marshes where alligators live. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department provides live alligator displays. Two stages offer every type of music from Cajun to Peruvian. When I arrived in Anahuac, I heard the song, "See ya later, alligator!" playing over a public address system downtown.

At Anahuac, I met the main alligator man in Texas. He's Amos Cooper of the JD Murphree Wildlife Management Area near Port Arthur. He let me tag along on an alligator hunt.

Although you can hunt alligators with bow and arrow, most people prefer to do a little fishing and hunting to get their gators. They start off by driving a steel rod into the ground about four feet. They secure a long bamboo pole to the rod, then string the pole with about 80 feet of strong cord. On the end of the cord is a two inch

hook with some rotten chicken meat on it. The meat is suspended over the water about eighteen inches. The alligator smells that chicken, jumps out of the water to get it, then swims of with it.

The hunters then bring in the gator by pulling that strong cord by hand. While one hunter brings the alligator close enough to shore that it raises its head out of the water, the other hunter then shoots the gator in the head. Sometimes the gator thrashes and splashes, spins and turns, trying to get away, making for a difficult target. Sometimes they have to be shot more than once. An alligator is not safe to handle until its eyes are closed.

Once the gator is dead, duck tape is wrapped around its mouth. Then the gator is loaded onto the boat and sold for \$16 a foot. Most of the meat goes to Asia.

At JD Murphree, the poles must be baited by 6 PM. Hunters can't retrieve them until after sunrise the following morning.

## Disaster Aide Approved for Texas Flood Victims

AUSTIN — Responding to a request from Gov. George W. Bush last week, President Clinton declared 20 Central and South Texas counties as disaster areas.

"I thank the federal government and President Clinton for their quick response to the Texas request for aid," Bush said.

"I hope the news of federal help will provide some relief to the thousands of Texans whose lives have been turned upside down by this disaster," he continued, adding that he was touched by the many churches, friends and neighbors who pitched in to help those forced to evacuate their homes.


The federal declaration cleared the way for federal aid to residents and businesses in affected counties through such programs as the Disaster Housing Assistance Program, the Individual and Family Grant Program, Farm Assistance, Disaster Unemployment Assistance and Small Business Administration Disaster Loans.

### Floodwaters at Record Levels

As of this writing (Oct. 22), a dollar amount for anticipated losses had not been determined due to the ongoing flood emergency.

Last week, rivers crested at record levels. At Gonzales, the Guadalupe River crested at 51.8 feet — 2.5 feet above the previous

record set in 1929. The San Antonio River near Elmdorf crested at 64.59 feet — almost 10 feet above the previous record set in 1986.

Rainfall totals in the hard-hit areas of Bexar County and Comal County ranged as high as 22 inches.

After taking an aerial tour of the flood zone, Bush said "It was devastating to see. It's hard to imagine how swift and powerful the current was.

### Termite Remedy Maker Sued

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales last week joined the Federal Trade Commission and seven other states in a lawsuit to stop the makers of a do-it-yourself home defense system against termites from making false claims about the product.

"Terminate" is sold in the form of stakes to be planted in the ground around a home. The government alleges that in its advertising United Industries Corporation, the maker of Terminate, made deceptive and unsubstantiated claims about the product.

The lawsuit also says the company failed to disclose that bait stakes do not work against drywood termites.

### TNRCC Denies License

The three-member Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission on Oct. 22 denied the license application of the Texas Low-level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority to build a waste-storage facility on a 500-acre plot near the West Texas town of

Sierra Blanca.

The decision will be reflected in a written order to be prepared by TNRCC General Counsel Geoff Connor and issued no earlier than Oct. 27, the agency stated in a post-hearing news release on Oct. 22.

### Bullock to Receive Pacemaker

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock will enter an Austin hospital this week for surgery to insert a pacemaker, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

Bullock said that after a recent gall bladder operation, his doctors recommended that he have the pacemaker inserted to regulate an irregular heartbeat.

A recovering alcoholic and a heavy smoker who has battled nicotine addiction, Bullock had one-third of his right lung removed in 1972 because of two non-malignant tumors. He suffered a heart attack in 1979 and underwent heart bypass surgery shortly before the 1994 midterm election, in which he won a second term as lieutenant governor.

### Other Capital Highlights

Guided by his latest Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators, state Comptroller John Sharp last week said Texas should expect lower economic growth over the next few months.







"Winning all four titles says something special for the dedication these young men put into their running," Wink stated.







## County Commissioners meet OK change in meals program

Schleicher County Commissioners met Monday, October 26th and gave their final approval to Sheriff David Doran's plan to begin meal preparation for the Meals for the Elderly Program in the county jail. Doran was present for the meeting and told the commissioners that District Judge Barbaña Walther had agreed to the plan and would issue a bench warrant for two Texas Department of Corrections (TDC) prisoners to be moved to the local jail. The TDC prisoners will be trained cooks, according to Doran and will be transferred to Schleicher County Jail for a period of at least two years.

County Judge Johnny Griffin noted that there would be some start up costs affiliated with the

meals program. "I don't see how we can do any worse than we're doing now," Griffin said. "There will be some expenses at first but I think the worst we can count on is a break even deal and at least the money stays here."

The employment status of Sr. Citizen Director Cindy Stuckey was also discussed. Stuckey currently is payed with Concho Valley Council of Government (CVCOG) funds through Kimble County's meals program. The commissioners asked that the Sr. Citizens Center board of directors make arrangements to move Stuckey onto their payroll.

Sheriff Doran told the men that he was looking for a larger cook stove and an additional freezer for the jail in order to handle the increased cooking required by the program.

The exact date program will begin in the jail has yet to be determined.

Present for the meeting were County Judge Johnny Griffin,



Commissioners Johnny Mayo, Steve Minor and Ross Whitten. Commissioner Kerry Joy was absent.

In other business the commissioners also approved the creation of a new jailer/dispatcher position in the jail. The extra jailer will allow for daily supervision of prisoner work details in the community by an armed guard.

Sealed bids for a transport load of diesel fuel were then opened. Regal Oil's bid of 70.56¢ per gallon was unanimously accepted by the group.

The commissioners next approved a request by property owners in the Edgefield II subdivision to amend deed restrictions to allow double wide (permanently affixed) mobile homes.

Before adjourning the men declined an offer of \$125 from Southwest Petroleum to purchase any mineral royalty interest the county might own in the Keeny 77 lease.

They also agreed to fence off a five acre portion of a caliche pit on the Spencer Ranch and return control of it to the landowner.

## Focus on the Family

### Concentrate on Truly Important Issues When Raising an Adolescent

**QUESTION: When discussing adolescence, why do you often focus your comments on parents? It's the kids who do crazy things.**

**DR. DOBSON:** I'm particularly concerned about idealistic and perfectionist moms and dads who are determined to make their adolescent perform and achieve and measure up to the highest standard. In so doing, they rock a boat that is already threatened by the rapids. Perhaps another child could handle the additional turbulence, but the unsteady kid — the one who lacks common sense for a while and may even lean toward irrational behavior — could capsize if you're not careful. Don't unsettle his or her boat any more than you must!

I'm reminded of a waitress who recognized me when I came into the restaurant where she worked. She was not busy that day and wanted to talk about her 12-year-old daughter. As a single mother, she had gone through severe struggles with the girl, whom she identified as being very strong-willed.

"We have fought tooth and nail for this entire year," she said. "It has been awful! We argue nearly every night, and most of our fights are over the same issue."

I asked her what had caused the conflict, and she replied, "My daughter is still a little girl but she wants to shave her legs. I feel she's too young to be doing that, and she becomes so angry that she won't even talk to me. This has been the worst year of our lives together."

I looked at the waitress and said, "Buy your daughter a razor!"

That 12-year-old girl was paddling into a time of life that would

rock her canoe good and hard. As a single parent, Mom would soon be trying to keep this rebellious kid from getting into drugs, alcohol, sex and pregnancy, early marriage, school failure and the possibility of running away. Truly, there would be many ravenous alligators in her river within a year or two. In that setting, it seemed unwise to make a big deal over what was essentially a nonissue. While I agreed with the mother that adolescence should not be ushered in prematurely, there were higher goals than maintaining a proper developmental timetable.

I have seen other parents fight similar battles over nonessentials such as the purchase of a first bra for a flat-chested preadolescent girl. For goodness sake! If she wants it that badly, she probably needs it for social reasons. Run, don't walk, to the nearest department store and buy her a bra. The objective, as Charles and Andy Stanley wrote, is to keep your kids on your team. Don't throw away your friendship over behavior that has no great moral significance. There will be plenty of real issues that require you to stand like a rock. Save your big guns for those crucial confrontations.

Let me make it very clear, again, that this advice is not relevant to every teen-ager. The compliant kid who is doing wonderfully in school, has great friends, is disciplined in her conduct and loves her parents is not nearly so delicate. Perhaps her parents can urge her to reach even higher standards in her achievements and lifestyle.

My concern, however, is for that youngster who could go over the falls. He is intensely angry at home and is being influenced by a carload of crummy friends. Be very

careful with him. Pick and choose what is worth fighting for, and settle for something less than perfection on issues that don't really matter. Just get him through it!

**QUESTION: Do you think you should spank a child for every act of disobedience or defiance?**

**DR. DOBSON:** No. Corporal punishment should be a rather infrequent occurrence. There is an appropriate time for a child to sit on a chair to "think" about his misbehavior, or she might be deprived of a privilege, or sent to his room for a "time-out," or made to work when she had planned to play. In other words, you should vary your response to misbehavior, always hoping to stay one step ahead of the child. Your goal is to react continually in a way that benefits the child, and in accordance with his or her "crime." In this regard, there is no substitute for wisdom and tact in the parenting role.

**Windbreak tree program for Schleicher County producers**

Seedling applications for conservation windbreaks are now available to Schleicher County landowners through the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery or local Soil and Water Conservation District. Several varieties of evergreens and deciduous trees and shrubs are available.

Each year, West Texas Nursery provides adapted windbreak seedlings, at cost, to assist producers in incorporating conservation windbreaks into their farming and/or ranching operation.

Windbreaks create permanent,

natural protection and habitat for wildlife, reduce erosion, and increase land value and aesthetics.

Evergreens are sold in boxes of 30 for \$52 and the hardwoods in bundles of 1009 for \$48. All prices include shipping and handling. Seedlings ordered this fall will be shipped or delivered in the spring of 1999.

Wildlife packets for habitat establishment also are available. Each of the four wildlife packets contain 100 bare-root trees and shrubs which cater specifically to the habitat needs of quail and pheasant, deer, turkey or squirrel. Each wildlife packet is \$46.

Producers are encouraged to purchase seedlings this fall before preferred stock is sold out.


