The steel is scheduled for delivery the last week in August, and lumber at the same time, after which work of erecting the stadium will proceed, in time for completion before the first game in mid-September.

Ground Breaking Ceremonies Tuesday For Baptist Annex

Formal launching of the First Baptist building program took place Tuesday morning, when ground-breaking ceremonies were held on the site of the new educational annex.

The program opened with songs and prayer, and Mrs. L. M. Hoover gave the history of the church, beginning with the year 1901. This was followed by brief devotionals, after which the group went out-of-doors, and witnessed the breaking of ground by D. C. Hill, senior deacon, J. C. Ratliff and J. A. Halbert. Pictures were taken of the scene by Bernard Carr, local photographer.

There are only two living charter members of the church. One of these, Mrs. J. A. Whitten, was present, but the other, Mrs. Joab Campbell was unable to attend because of illness.

The church has grown from a small group of charter members to a present total membership of 502. The Sunday school enrollment is 295, and Training Union has 120 on roll. The new annex will provide Sunday school space for an additional 100.

At the close of the ceremonies, those present went to the basement of the church, where the women served refreshments.

Actual starting of this building program culminates several years of planning and preparation on the part of church members. A building fund, started some time, has been steadily growing, and a substantial part of the cost of the proposed new annex has already been raised by subscription.

4-H Feeding Barn On Fair Grounds Nearing Completion

The 4-H feeding barn will be ready to put into operation by next Monday, August 21st. All is complete except a watering trough and enclosure where the lambs will be collected for distribution by 4-H boys.

Beginning August 21, lambs from different flocks will be selected in the county. 4-H members desire as many producers be represented as possible. The next few weeks will be used to get the lambs together.

On Thursday, August 17 (today) at 8:00 4-H boys and dads will meet at the recreation building to discuss and make final arrangements for securing lambs and operating the project.

W. G. Godwin makes the following explanation of 4-H club work:

For your information 4-H Club work is a national organization, supported by the United States Government, the State, and the County; therefore your boy does not have to pay to join a club. Its purpose is to develop within the boy the finer things of life. The training which your boy receives along agricultural lines will help him through life whether he expects to follow agriculture or not. The club gets its name "4-H" from the fact that the work trains the Head for clearer thinking, the Hands for greater service, the Heart for truer loyalty and finer sympathy, and the Health for efficient living for his community, his country and his God.

Every boy who can, is expected to carry on during the year a demonstration with livestock or crops or both. This is where the boy and myself need your help and co-operation. We are asking all boys who can take a project to select it this month. Some will want to take a sheep. Others may want to take an acre or more of corn, cotton, wheat, oats, or some other crop or both livestock and crops. Some boys will want to take a garden or an orchard as their project or demonstration. In addition your boy can study wool and mohair or livestock judging.

Will you please sit down and take a little time and help your boy decide what he should take. To get the most out of the work he needs something at home to work with and take care of throughout the year. My office will be willing to assist at all times if you and your boy show that you are interested.

Co. Commissioner Precincts Each to Include Part of City

Redistricting of the four county commissioner precincts occupied the attention of the Commissioners Court in session early this week.

With the courthouse as a focal point, the commissioners precincts will each have a corner at or near that point, and each commissioner will have approximately one-fourth of the city in his precinct. A map is being worked out, and it is expected that the city vote will be divided about equally four ways. A great deal of discussion and preliminary work has preceded this action. Further details of the new boundaries will be published as soon as they are available.

Rural areas will not be greatly affected by the change, as commissioners will still serve most of the same voters as before in their respective precincts. Previously only one commissioner, that of precinct one, had city votes in his precinct, which means that three quarters of the city voters will be placed in the other three precincts.

Another important act of the court was ordering of a bond election for Schleicher County for a sum of \$40,000 for road construction and right-of-way fencing in this county. Voters are urged to read the legal notice on page two of this issue of the Success, announcing the date of the election, the voting boxes and election judges.

Group Orangizes Against New Taxes

A representative of the Texas Employers Association addressed a group of about 50 business people in the Memorial building in Eldorado Tuesday afternoon, in the interest of organized opposition to increasing certain types of state taxes.

At the close of the meeting, a local unit was organized with Joe Muller Christian and Pete Parker, Eldorado businessmen, as co-chairmen.

BOARD ELECTS TWO TEACHERS MONDAY NIGHT

The school board discussed building plans, employed two teachers, made a tour of inspection of the new buildings, and discussed routine business matters at their regular meeting Monday night.

Miss Patsy Ruth Keffer was elected to teach language arts in the Junior High School. She is a former secretary of Ken Reagan, in Washington, has been Chamber of Commerce secretary at McCamey, and this summer has been a counselor at Camp Mystic, near Kerrville. She is an Odessa resident, and a graduate of Texas Tech with a major in English.

Mrs. Jimmie Lou Taylor, another new teacher elected Monday, will be assigned to teach in the grades, probably sixth grade. She is a graduate of Sul Ross, has done post graduate work on her Masters, and has had teaching experience at Rankin.

Mrs. Mary (Bill) Davis has tendered her resignation as a teacher in the school system.

Two vacancies, in first and sixth grades, remain to be filled. When completed there will be a teaching corps of 30 as compared with 26 last year.

The board made a tour of the new plant Monday night, to check on the progress of the work.

During the business session the board voted to purchase a commercial type of vacuum cleaner, for use in the buildings during the year.

A committee, composed of Archie Mittel, Dee Love and Supt. C. A. Reynolds, was appointed to expedite building of restrooms on the football field, at the new stadium.

There was discussion of a proposed Open House and dedication at the school, to be held a few weeks after the formal opening of school. An all-day affair, with entertainment to include a football game, is planned. The date will probably be in mid-October or early November.

Rationing Idea Slowly Gaining Ground In Congress

By a vote of 383 to 12, the House last week passed and sent to the Senate the expanded bill, giving the President sweeping powers to control the nation's economy. The measure includes permission to impose wage and price controls and rationing. The use of these powers would be discretionary with the President. There is no mandatory requirement that wage and price controls be imposed at the same time.

This failure to tie wage and price controls together was, in the minds of many of us, a mistake. Repeated attempts were made to amend the bill so as to make it mandatory that the President control wages if he should control prices. We know from past experience that if prices are controlled but wages left free to go up, the result is increased cost of production and a scramble to the black markets.

The bill goes further to empower the President to require acceptance and priority fulfillment of all national defense contracts, and authorizes him to requisition any materials or facilities he considers necessary to the defense effort.

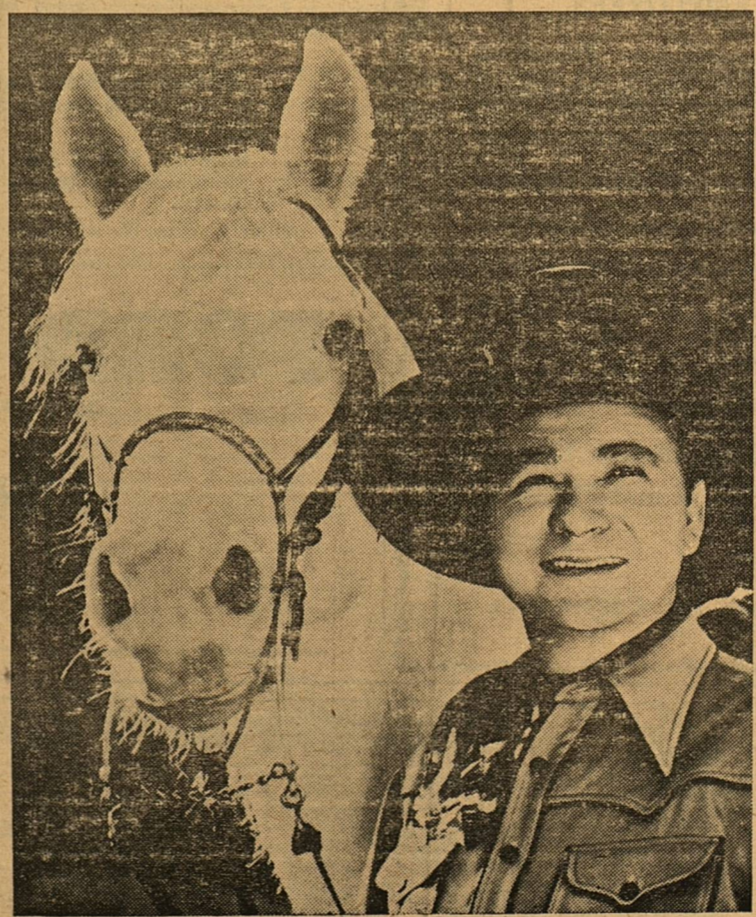
The President could set up a system of priorities and allocations to insure a supply of critical materials for defense plants. He could also either make or guarantee loans for defense purposes up to a total of \$2 billion.

The measure also includes authority to control consumer credit, but restricts the control of real estate credit to new construction or extensive renovation. And it would be a criminal offense to hoard food, clothing or other "necessaries."

In addition to credit controls in an effort to curb the trend toward inflation, new taxes are believed essential. A new war-time tax measure is now in the making, and we can all expect our income tax bill to be upped during the life of this emergency.

The question of whether price and wage controls and rationing will be resorted to by the President will probably depend upon the success of the other controls to stem the tide of inflation and will also depend upon the people themselves. Hoarding and excessive buying means shortages and that in turn means higher prices. Enough of this, including the abuse of credit, can, of course, cause high-price spirals which, when applied to necessities can have a serious impact upon the average family and upon the nation's economy.

Steen and 93 other persons, praying that an election be ordered to determine whether or not bonds shall be issued by said Schleicher County, Texas, in the sum of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed three (3%) per cent per annum, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed twenty (20) years from date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon all the taxable property in Schleicher County for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity;

And it appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpaying voters of said Schleicher County, Texas, who own taxable property within said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation;

And it further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real real property of said Schleicher County;

It is Therefore Considered and Ordered by the Court that an election be held in said County on the 9th day of September, 1950 which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said County shall be issued in the amount of Forty Thousand (\$40,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed three (3%) per cent per annum, maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed twenty (20) years from date thereof; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon all the taxable property in Schleicher County for the purpose of paying the interest

on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, Revised Statutes, 1925, and only legally qualified voters of this State and of this County, who own taxable property within said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
FOR the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof.
AGAINST the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof.

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

The polling places and presiding officers for said election shall be respectively as follows:

At the Court House, in Eldorado, Texas, Election Precinct No. 1, with Joe B. Edens as Presiding Officer.

At the Eldorado High School building in Eldorado, Texas, Election Precinct No. 1A with W. N. Ramsay as Presiding Officer.

At the John I. King Ranch home in Schleicher County, Election Precinct No. 2, with John I. King as Presiding Officer.

At the Adams School House Building, in Schleicher County Election Precinct No. 3 with Jim O'Harrow as Presiding Officer.

At the R. B. Anderson Residence in Schleicher County, Election Precinct No. 4 with Oran Enoch as Presiding Officer.

At the J. Forrest Runge Ranch House, Schleicher County Election Precinct No. 8 with J. Forrest Runge as Presiding Officer.

At the Reynolds School House, in Schleicher County, Election Precinct No. 9 with J. W. Davis as Presiding Officer.
