## Mrs. Allie Sweatt Dies Wednesday At Her Home Here

Mrs. Allie Sweatt died at her home in Eldorado at 1:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, August 30, 1950, at the age of 69. She had been ill since last spring and critically ill a month preceding her death.

Funeral services are to be held Thursday afternoon (today) at 4 at the Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. Roy Shilling in charge, assisted by Rev. Hays and Rev. King. Pallbearers will be Marvin McDonald, Ray Jones, W. C. Doyle, Don and Van McCormick, and Rance McDonald. Interment will be in the local cemetery.

Sarah Alice Williams, daughter of Myrtle Edwards and Mark L. Williams, was born June 7, 1881, at Wolfe Crossing, in Llano Co. She spent her childhood at Fredonia in Mason County, and attended the school of that county.

On November 15, 1899, she was married to E. P. Sweatt, and three years later the couple moved to Schleicher County, where Mr. Sweatt engaged in ranching and real estate business, and where his death occurred April 23, 1944.

Mrs. Sweatt is survived by three children, Ernest, of Eldorado; Mrs. Roy Williamson (O'Ella) of Fort Worth; and I. W. (Bill) of Big Lake. Surviving also are five grand children, Mrs. Earl Yates and Mrs. Jack Green of San Angelo; Ernest Sweatt, Jr., of Eldorado; Mrs. Billy Kidd, Menard; and Betty Sue Williamson, Ft. Worth; and two great grandchildren, Sherry Yates and Nancy Kidd.

Also surviving are ten brothers and sisters, Mrs. J. B. Christian, Eldorado; Mrs. Joe Kidd, Mason; Mrs. M. L. Leddy and Mrs. Mauldin Chandler, San Angelo; Mrs. Bryan Shafer, Menard; Donald Appleton, and Ed and Dee Williams, San Saba; Sam Williams, Cherokee; and Bert Williams, Sweetwater. A step mother, Mrs. Ellen Williams, of Brady, also survives.

She was a faithful member of the Methodist Church, joining that church in Fredonia when she was 12, and moving her membership to Eldorado shortly after the family moved to this city. In the local church she was a member of the W.S.C.S. and of the McCormick Class, and was faithful in attendance until she was unable to be present because of illness.

A large number of relatives from out of town are here today to attend her funeral.

## Midway Pump Station For Shell Pipe Line

The mid-way pump station at Eckert, 14 miles north of Fredericksburg, on Humble Pipe Line Company's new 370-mile West Texas line is due to be completed around October 1. Company spokesmen pointed out that with the addition of this new station, capacity of the 18-inch line from Kemper Station near Big Lake to Satusma, near Houston, will be increased from 84,000 barrels to 104,000 barrels a day to meet the large current demand for oil.

Two other intermediate pump stations will be completed later in the year, one near Fort McKavett, and the other near Warda. Each of the three stations will have two 1,000 horsepower motor-driven centrifugal pumps connected in series. With all three stations in operation, line capacity will be 120,000 to 125,000 barrels a day. Eventually another 400 horsepower pumping unit will be added at each station, pushing the total capacity to 135,000 barrels a day.

While pump station construction is going forward, foundations are being poured and towers erected for the microwave radio relay repeater stations between Houston and Kemper Station. On these towers, which will range from 100 to 280 feet in height depending on the terrain, will be mounted steel reflectors to pass on the radio waves. This communications system, soon to be the longest microwave radio relay system in Texas, is virtually a telephone and teleprinter system without wires. There will be a total of 18 repeater stations between Houston and Kemper.

The Kemper-to-Houston pipe line with its added pump stations and modern communications system, will be able to bring more West Texas oil to the refineries on the Gulf Coast in a shorter time, to meet both civilian and military needs.

Frank (Pancho) Bradley, Jr., received his call Tuesday to report September 19 to Brooks Field, as a member of the Air Force Reserve. Bradley who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bradley of Eldorado, is the second reserve called from this county, Delbert Edmiston having reported for duty last week.

It is understood that Bradley will go to Brooks Field, San Antonio, then to Walker Air Force Base in New Mexico.

Bradley served four years and four months in World War II, 2½ years overseas in Africa and Italy, another year a half here, and a stretch in Washington and Oregon. At the time of leaving service he was a Master sergeant, a line chief in a fighter squadron. He will go to the 509th Bomb Wing at Walker Air Force Base.

After his return home September 15, 1945 he started farming between Brady and Coleman, and for the past year has been in Eldorado.

## Shell Co. Employees In First Aid School

Shell employees have been attending a several-day First Aid School, taught by Kenneth Malthin of Houston. The maintenance crew have been attending a similar class at Big Lake, so those present at the school in Eldorado were the operating crew only and their families.

Mr. Malthin of Houston, company representative, was here for the entire school, Monday through Friday. On Thursday and Friday Warden and Smith, of Fredericksburg, assisted with the fire demonstration and inspection, and with the re-charging of all the fire extinguishers.

E. W. Perry is acting as relief engineer in place of J. A. Neill, who has been quite sick but who is improving.

## Republic Installs New Booster Pumps

Republic now has in operation new booster pumps, one of which is located at Huldale, thus doubling the capacity of their pipeline from the Susan Peak field to the Shell Station in Schleicher County.

Republic, which had been delivering 85,000 barrels per month, will now be able to handle 6,000 barrels per day—more than double the previous load. They expect to start with about 5,000 per day.

To facilitate handling of the increased flow, Republic has also built another 10,000 barrel bolted tank at the station.

Republic Vice President Ammermann has been here while work was in progress, also Johnnie Medders, who has been here supervising the job, making the surveys, and ordering equipment for increasing the line capacity.

Other work being done by Republic includes cleaning out of the 10,000 barrel welded tank, by a crew from Snyder.

## LEWIS BALLEWS BUY PAGE DRUG; IN CHARGE FRI.

Robert Page has sold his drug store to Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Ballews, who are assuming charge of the business Friday (tomorrow) Sept. 1st. Mr. Page has no definite plans for the future but will continue to maintain his office in the rear of the drug store building. He also states that he may go into the ranching business, but is not sure at this time.

He returned from service five years ago, and soon afterward opened the drug store.

The new owners are well known in this community, as they are life-long residents of the county. In taking over the business, they state that they expect to carry out the policy of their predecessor in keeping a complete stock of standard cosmetic and drug items, and maintain the fountain service as usual. ## Forbid Enlistment After Draft Call

Austin.—"Will I be able to enlist after I'm notified to report for physical examination by my draft board?"

This is a question which a lot of men are asking Selective Service local boards in Texas.

The answer is "no," Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, said recently.

General Wakefield referred to Section 15 (d) of the Selective Service Act of 1949, which prohibits acceptance of a registrant for enlistment after he has received orders to report for induction.

The state director quoted from the following regulation (Local Board Memorandum 11) issued by Selective Service national headquarters:

"The prohibition contained in Section 15 (d) of the Act against the acceptance of a registrant for enlistment after he has received orders to report for induction has been interpreted by the National Military Establishment to mean that no person shall be accepted for enlistment after he has been notified to report for armed forces physical examination by a Selective Service local board."

This does not in any way prevent any registrant from joining an organized unit of a reserve component (which includes the National Guard) after he has received an order to report for physical examination, General Wakefield said.

"The registrant may join such a reserve unit as far as Selective Service is concerned," the state director pointed out. "If an Army, Air Force, or Navy reserve unit will not accept him, it is a matter outside our control."

"But he cannot enlist for a tour of active duty in the Army, Air Force, or other department of the National Military Establishment after he receives his order to report for physical examination," General Wakefield concluded.

## Reservists Allowed 10 Days To Report

New Orleans, Aug. 29.—Orders are still orders in the Navy. When you get 'em, you've got to go, even though some hard-hit naval reservists may get temporary delay in reporting for active duty.

That is the word from Eighth Naval District headquarters here, which controls naval reserve affairs in Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mex., Oklahoma and Texas.

Ten days, including travel, are usually allowed for recalled reservists to report, Rear Admiral W. K. Phillips, USN, district commandant, said.

In exceptional cases longer periods are being granted, but each case is carefully considered by a board of senior officers and no delays are granted for more than six months. The average is much less, the Admiral said.

Requests for deferment must be submitted in writing within 48 hours after orders are received, he warned. Department of Defense policy, announced in Washington several weeks ago, is closely followed to determine eligibility for deferment.


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



**Appropriation Bill Biggest In History**

By Cong. O. C. Fisher  
Pointing to an early September adjournment or recess, the House turned on the steam last week and approved numerous bills and resolutions. These included appropriations and a measure, already approved by the Senate, to provide living allowances for dependents of enlisted servicemen.

Speaker Rayburn has said he favors adjournment after the President's war emergency program has been enacted. Many of the members, however, think the Congress should remain in session or stand by for any emergency legislation that the war in Korea or other developments may require. But even if there is a recess or adjournment, the Congress could, of course, be called back if necessary to deal with new problems that might arise.

The House last week approved the conference report on the big one-package appropriation bill — the largest in peace-time history. The omnibus appropriation to run the government another year, including national defense, totaled \$36.1 billion.

After passing the omnibus bill, the House put its okay on a \$17 billion emergency supplemental spending measure—brought on by the international crisis.

In debate it was pointed out that these two bills, along with some items of interest on the public debt, and certain contracting author-

ity, would raise federal spending for fiscal 1951 to a possible \$59.5 billion.

All in all, the Congress has appropriated this year \$25 billion for the Department of Defense. An additional \$11 billion has been voted for foreign economic and military assistance, the Atomic Energy Commission, stockpiling of strategic materials and the like. All of this, added together, means we have appropriated this year for national defense in one form or another the sum of \$36 billion.

It is all a part of the terrific price we are paying in our colossal struggle to stem the tide of world communism and aggression, which unless effectively contained and repulsed threatens to engulf and destroy us.

And on the home front it means more sacrifices, more taxes, and more cuts in non-essential federal spending.





**Shell Employees Get Liberal Benefit**

Shell employees going on military leave are assured of financial protection and job security by a new benefit plan just inaugurated by the company, F. O. Prochaska, Station Chief Engineer announced here this week. The new plan is intended primarily to protect families of employees from financial hardship but it also includes features for employees without dependents. According to Mr. Prochaska the benefits provided are even more liberal than those in effect during World War II, when Shell paid out over \$8,000,000 to over 5,500 employees and their families.

Under Shell's new plan, each qualified employee entering military service receives a lump sum payment equivalent to two months pay. Beginning after his second month in military service, an allowance making up the difference between his government base pay and his normal company earnings will be paid monthly to his family. This monthly family allowance, however, is limited to 50% of the employee's normal company pay.

During the first month of military service, a qualified employees' group life insurance policy is continued by the company. Thereafter, Shell will reimburse him for premiums for National Service Life Insurance for the entire time of his military service, up to the amount of his company group life insurance.

Employees serving in the Armed Forces continue to accumulate accredited full credit toward retirement under the Shell pension plan.

Cut peppers in halves, lengthwise; remove seeds and fibers. Mash lunch meat with fork. Mix in the bread crumbs, milk and celery. Divide among pepper halves. Cook onion slowly 5 min. in hot shortening in skillet. Add soup. Put filled peppers in skillet, meat side up. Cover; cook over low heat 25 min., or until peppers are tender. Makes 4 servings.
