BALLINGER WINS FIRST PLACE IN FIREMEN'S RACE

Over 200 people, representing fire departments in 13 counties, spent the day in Eldorado Tuesday, attending the sessions of the Hill Country Firemen's Association.

The day's program opened with a parade through the business district at 8:30, followed by registration at the Memorial Building, where many other events of the day were held.

Joe Ed Hill, president of the fire department of the host city, called the first morning session to order, and Charlie Straach of Miles, Association president, was in the chair for the remainder of the morning session. It was voted to discontinue exchanging chiefs with member cities, and Coleman was designated as the meeting place for the next convention, which will be in February. Ballinger, with 28 present, won the attendance prize.

A local cafe served dinner at noon in the banquet hall of the Memorial building.

Ballinger Wins Meet

In mid-afternoon, the group dispersed to the business district, where the contests were held.

Ballinger's six-man team coupled the fire truck to a water hydrant, extended the hose 190 feet, and pumped water in 26.8 seconds, winning first. Sonora was second with 30 seconds, and Eden third with 30.7.

A three-man team from Ozona coupled two lengths of hose and pumped water in 14.01 seconds. Winters was a close second, and Miles was third.

In the water polo finals, Ballinger defeated Ozona.

In women's events, Ballinger won the nozzle race, both first and second places, and Eden won third.

The City, Lions Club, and ex-firemen served the barbecue supper to 800 on the courthouse lawn, and a large crowd attended the dance, which was a concluding event of the convention.

Firemen were on the job early Wednesday morning, cleaning grounds and Memorial hall, in preparation for the annual meeting of REA members Thursday (today).

Afternoon Session

Rev. Walter Leamons of Junction opened the afternoon session with a brief address on faith, using Biblical references in his description of the modern fireman as a busy man, a purposeful man, and an unselfish man. His scripture was the Faith Chapter, the 11th Chapter of Hebrews. Part of this period had been designated for a memorial service, but as there had been no deaths this year among association members, recognition was accorded those who had died in previous years.

Palmer West introduced Betty Patrick of Sonora, a state Auxiliary mascot.

Chester Cherry of Ballinger, a past president of the Association, introduced the speaker, W. G. Burns of Dallas, a nationally known fireman and city fire marshal of Dallas.

He stressed the importance of public relations, naming ways in which the fire department secures and holds the confidence of the entire public, as he opened his address on the general theme of "Betterment of Service."

This is accomplished, he pointed out, through service and protection, the two products which the fire department has to offer to the public, and which it offers through family, neighbor, personnel, and public contacts.

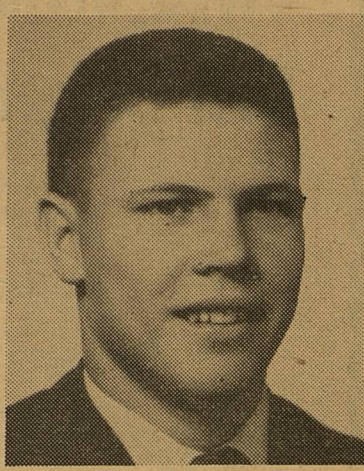
The need of good public relations, he stated, is made necessary by difference in ancestry, living conditions, religion, employment, hobbies, special interests, and finances. Likenesses in people make it easier to deal with them: love, hate, fear, curiosity, vanity, morals, superstitions, selfishness, and hero worship.

He pointed out practical methods of dealing with situations. He brought out the point that man's physical and mental make-up and his environment make a three-sided triangle, on all sides of which the pressure must be equal.

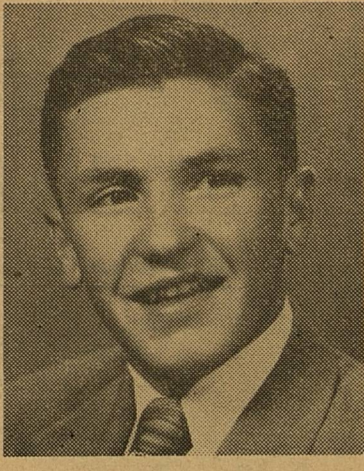
The good fireman may popularize his department still further by appealing to human desires—man's need of approval, attention, self respect, pride in his job, loyalty, will to advance, friendship, confidence and competitive spirit.

To gain the complete confidence and assistance of the general public, the firemen need at all times to make personal contact, through newspaper, radio, service clubs, schools, churches, work of inspection and investigation, fire fighting, and salvage work.

He also stressed the need of strong department loyalty, which causes all members to offer only constructive criticism—and that

During Mr. Brown's period of residence here, he has been an active worker in civic affairs, a member of the Lions Club and Fire Department, and other organizations. His family consists of his wife and two children.

The new administrative officer for this county is D. Wilson Smith of Alpine, who is transferred from the Alpine office to this city. He is a single man, whose mother makes her home with him. He will occupy the house vacated by the Browns. Brown left Eldorado last Saturday and started work Monday, and the new officer will begin work here next Monday.

In conclusion he urged all firemen to return to their homes with the avowed intention of giving special attention to the four phases of good public relations: family, neighbor, personnel, and general public contact.

After conclusion of the speech the resolutions committee extended thanks to the host city for their hospitality. Palmer West read the racing rules as spokesman for the committee, and the registration committee reported that 160 outside members had registered up to that time.

W. K. Regeon Dies In San Angelo Hospital After Long Illness

W. K. Regeon, 51, Eldorado resident for a year and former Sonora resident for six years, died at 12:45 o'clock Sunday afternoon in a San Angelo hospital. Mr. Regeon was a Santa Fe Railroad section foreman and moved here with his family from Sonora a year ago. He has been seriously ill for some time.

Services were held from the First Baptist Church, Eldorado, at 4:00 Monday afternoon and burial was in the Sonora Cemetery. The Ratliff Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements. The Rev. J. M. Hays, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and the Rev. H. B. Coggins of Amarillo officiated at the services; the latter is a former pastor of the deceased.

Pallbearers were Carl Peebles, Raymon Hall, and Tom Davis, all of Sonora, and Gus Love, E. W. Mund, and Palmer West, all of Eldorado.

Lavelle Meckel was in charge of the choir who rendered several numbers at the funeral. The organist was Mrs. Joe Mueller Christian. The Sonora lodge was in charge of graveside rites, using the impressive Masonic committal service. A number of Masons from Eldorado attended the funeral, in addition to members from the Sonora lodge.

W. K. Regeon was born in Hickman County, Tennessee, March 1, 1899, to Mr. and Mrs. David Regeon, farmers in that county. When he was 1½ years old, the family moved to Willis, Oklahoma, then in Indian Territory, Sept. 11, 1900, locating on a farm near Willis. In 1904 the family moved to a farm in Grayson County, and there in 1907, the father died. The family then moved to Ellis County, where they lived two years, then to Dallas County, and later to Jones County.

The youth received his education in the rural schools of Texas. On May 24, 1919, he was married to Eula May Adams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Adams of Jones County, ceremony taking place in the Methodist parsonage at Hawley, the Rev. Killian, pastor of the church, performing the ceremony. The couple started housekeeping on a farm near Hawley.

To this union were born three sons and three daughters, three of whom died in infancy. Surviving are a daughter and two sons, Mrs. Margarette Buhrkuhl of Plainview, W. K. Jr., who is employed at Fuqua Chevrolet Co., at Sonora, and Royce, who is an employee at Wheeler Grocery, Eldorado.

Surviving also are his wife, his mother, Mrs. Anna Regeon of Dalhart; a sister, Miss Lois Regeon of Dalhart; a brother, J. O. Regeon of Hawley, and four grand children, Euletta Ann, Roberta Evelyn, Jeanne Kay, and William Royce Buhrkuhl of Plainview.

Mr. Regeon farmed only one year. In 1921 he started work for the Santa Fe, at Southland, and during the remainder of his life was stationed at various places in First (Slaton) Division. For many years he was Grand Division chairman of the Maintenance-of-way Association of the Santa Fe Railroad.

After six years of residence in Sonora, the family moved to Eldorado last October, making their home in the section foreman's residence. He had been in failing health two years before his death, and seriously ill many months.

He was a faithful member of the First Baptist Church. In Sonora he was Sunday school superintendent. He had been a Mason since 1942.

Because of his serious condition his daughter has been with him since May, assisting her mother with his care. In addition about 180 men of this community were organized to take turns in assisting the family in care of the invalid.

Mrs. Regeon states today that because another maintenance foreman will be moved to this city, she will move soon to Sonora to make her home in a residence which she and her husband bought during their residence there. During the past several months Barney D. Westbrook of Plainview has been acting foreman here and he and his family have been making their home in one of the Santa Fe houses near the depot.

New School Room Equipment Arriving Beginning Aug. 10

Contractors on the new school building are giving possession of some of the new rooms next Monday, August 10, thus clearing the way for moving in of equipment.

Some of the supply companies, including those furnishing shop, stage, seating for the auditorium, lunchroom and kitchen equipment, have been notified that the rooms housing the equipment will be ready Monday, and that they may start moving in materials then.

Some of the equipment comes to Eldorado "knocked down" and it is part of the agreement with the supply houses that the companies will assemble it, and have it ready for installation.

Workmen are putting the finishing touches on some of the rooms, in readiness for the supply houses to take over next Monday or thereafter.

Debris Being Moved

A great deal of the debris on the school grounds has been moved away by truck to dump grounds. Caliche and gravel has been hauled from the job site out to the football field, where the city is furnishing equipment for smoothing it out on the main driveways. The school is paying for the hauling.

Three 22-Year-Olds Report For Physical

Draft Status Change Must Be Reported

Austin.—Filling of the Texas draft quota of 2,513 men for September is being jeopardized by the fact that many men, now classified in 1-A, have failed to report marriages and other changes in their circumstances, Brigadier Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, charged in a strongly-worded statement last week.

"If we fail to furnish the number of men desired from this state, this failure on the part of many men will be the chief factor in that failure," General Wakefield said.

The state director said that many of the local draft boards are reporting that when they issue orders to report for physical examination, many of the registrants are coming in with evidence of marriages that took place "many months before."

General Wakefield pointed out that if these men who have married had notified local boards immediately after the marriage took place, they would never have been sent an order to report for physical examination in the first place.

"We are operating with little time to get the job done demanded of us," the general said. "The local boards, unless they want to declare such registrants delinquent, have to turn around and get out an order to report for physical to the next man in order of age. All this takes time, and our local boards have a short deadline to meet."

Selective Service wants to "be reasonable about this situation," the state director said, "but we know that the patience of our local board members are wearing thin. We just want to point out that it is not mandatory under the law that married men be reclassified into III-A under such circumstances."

"Such men who fail to report change of status, such as marriage, or a change of address legally are eligible to be declared delinquent for failing to comply with the law. A delinquent can be inducted immediately ahead of all others under this law, and if we are forced to do so in order to meet our calls, we will comply with the law to the letter," General Wakefield continued.

The state director concluded with the statement that notifications concerning marriage, change of address, and other changes of status are "the entire responsibility of the registrant," and that notifications of change must be sent to local board in writing over the signature of the registrant.

"Too much damage already has been done," he said. "The time is almost past for men to get things squared with their draft boards."

Twelve men will go for physical examination on the 17th of August, and their names will be released at a later date.

Wheelers are making arrangements to vacate the building. They state that they will re-open in another location if present tentative plans materialize.

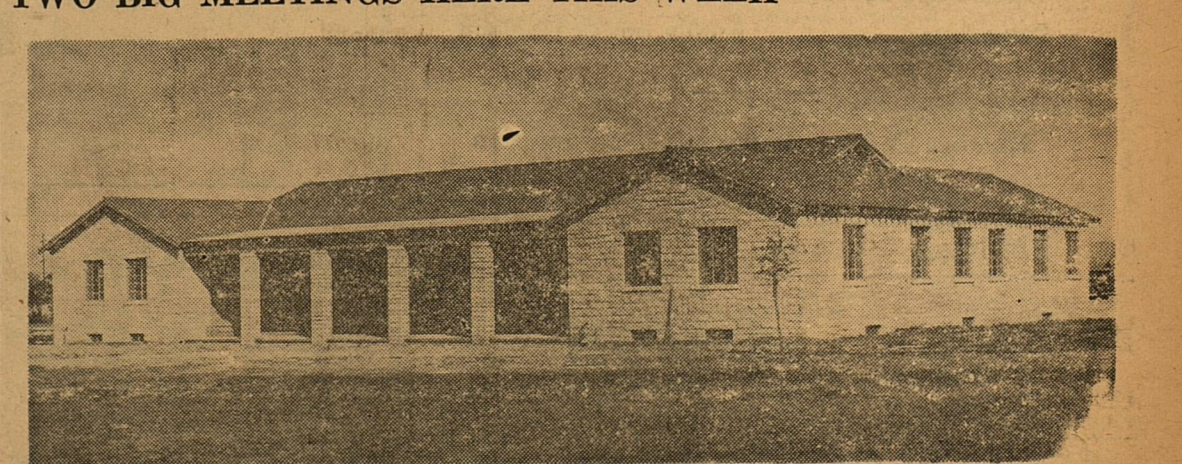



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

Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District News

Range improvement is usually a slow process in these parts, but when good management is combined with excellent growing conditions the results are likely to be surprising. At least that is the case with the C. S. McMillan ranch located 27 miles northeast of Eldorado.

Range Conservationist with the local work unit, in checking the range with C. L. McMillan last week, found that as the rains came so did the grass. A good cover of dead litter was observed on the ground, Little bluestem and Silver bluestem was found in the open. Side-oats grama was seen everywhere as well as Vine mesquite. A few patches of needle grass could be seen where the better grasses had pushed it back. There was an abundance of Hairy grama growing on the thin soil replacing the less desirable Hairy triodia, Red grama, and Needle grass. This we concluded was the best way to eradicate the needle grass; let the better grasses come in and choke the undesirable plants out.

McMillan has completely deferred his Jog Section Pasture since June of this year and has been lightly stocked in his two section pasture during the same period of time.

One fact definitely agreed upon was that range improvement comes about more rapidly during periods of increased rainfall especially where good range management practices are used. The McMillan Ranch has made rapid improvement but McMillan realizes it still has room for more improvement. By proper range management his range will continue to improve and as it improves it pays off in grass.

Conservation plans totaling 7788 acres were approved by the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District supervisors in their regular monthly meeting Friday, Aug. 4.

Ranchers who wrote up conservation plans on their places with the assistance of technicians were Milton and James Morales.

COVER CROPS

The value of cover crops in a conservation crop rotation has long been recognized by most farmers interested in maintaining and increasing the productivity of the soil. In some areas it has been commonly thought that cover crops such as clovers, vetch, and other soil building crops would not grow because of limited rainfall. Co-operators of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District are finding by experience that Hubam and Madrid clover will make good growth for soil improvement as well as furnishing a reasonable amount of grazing and produce a fair seed crop.

The main purpose of cover crops in a well rounded soil and water conservation plan is to maintain or increase the productivity of the soil. Hubam and Madrid clovers increase the productivity of the soil by conserving soil and moisture. Organic matter added to the soil by a good clover crop protects it from wind and water erosion as well as increasing the infiltration rate of water into the soil. The deep roots of clovers aid in breaking up and preventing "hard pan" in the soil and allows water to penetrate deeper.

Hubam and Madrid clovers may be planted in the fall or spring. For fall planting on oat or wheat land the land should be broke soon after the grain is harvested. A smooth firm seed bed is necessary. The clover should be planted at the rate of 3 to 5 pounds per acre in 36 to 40 inch rows. The seed should be inoculated with a good grade of inoculant, and planted 1/2 to 1 inch deep. Fall planting should be made early in September.

Two District-owned clover planters are available to cooperators for planting clover in the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District.

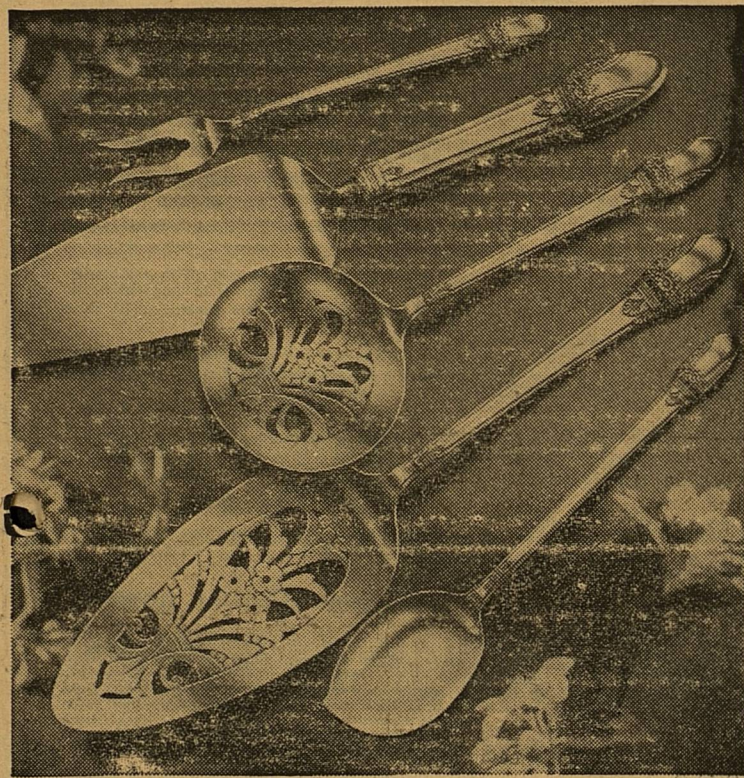

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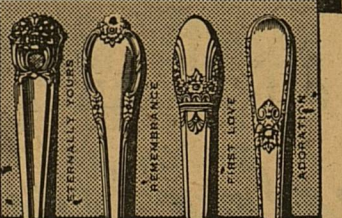

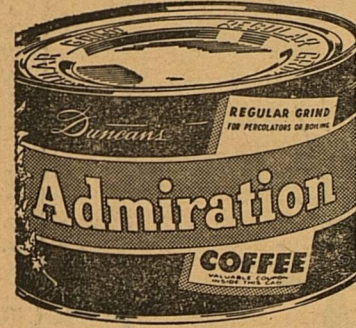

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Peach Ice Cream Cake

1 cup canned sliced peaches, drained
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup Pet Milk
2 thin slices plain cake, 4 in. square

2 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
3/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind
Put peaches and 1/2 cup sugar into saucepan; mash. Boil vigorously 5 min., stirring often. Chill. Chill milk until ice cold. Line bottom of refrigerator tray with cake slices. Spread chilled peach mixture on cake. Add 2 tablesp. sugar to chilled milk. Whip with cold rotary beater until fluffy; add lemon juice and rind. Whip until stiff. Put on top of peach mixture. Freeze, without stirring, in automatic refrigerator at coldest temperature until firm. Makes 4 servings.

*3/4 cup drained, crushed pineapple also can be used if sugar is reduced to 1/4 cup.
