Are Still In Demand

Calls for elementary teachers still are most numerous on the University of Texas Teacher Placement Service's request list, Director Hob Gray reports this week.

Next in demand are high school teachers, college teachers, and administrators, such as superin-

tendents and principals, in that order. Of 387 July calls, 178 place-ments were made by the bureau. In June 520 calls were received and 59 placements made.

The Placement Service also reported numerous September openings in YWCA work in communities and on college campuses. Most of the positions demand personnel between the ages of 25 and 35 with teaching, social work, or administrative experience. Salaries range up to \$4,000.
