
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

Flesh, finish, and the absence of pinfeathers are the important factors which Barrett advises consid ering when selecting quality tur keys. Well fleshed turkeys wil have broad breasts that are wel covered with meat. The thighs will be large and the drumsticks bulg-

Barrett says that some fat over the entire carcass is desirable. He says that the creaminess of the kin on all parts of the carcass in dicates that the bird is well finshed. Turkeys should also be free of pinfeathers. Pins cause difficulty cleaning the bird and detract from the appearance of the carcass Keeping these points in mind when selecting the live bird will help bring a delicious, appetizing turkey to the Thanksgiving table.
